2005 Muckrace #9

Over 70 birders competed in the ninth annual Montezuma Muckrace held Friday and Saturday September 9 & 10th in the Montezuma Wetlands Complex. The 16 teams from throughout New York including two youth teams, both first time competitors, together tallied 181 species during the 24-hour event, not quite matching 2004's total of 184.

Thanks to all the participants and sponsors who helped make the 2005 Muckrace the best ever with over \$1650 raised for projects at the Wetlands Complex by birders. Last year's money will be combined with money from this year to go towards a shorebird habitat project within the Montezuma Wetlands Complex.

The weather was sunny and cool with no precipitation in sight and an excellent night flight followed by heavy morning fog. Several teams mentioned seeing the first migrant warbler flocks of the fall during the day.

Pterdromas, sponsored by CLO - Information Services Department won number nine with a record breaking 144 species. Second place (143) also broke the previous record and went to the Knotcatchers sponsored by the Cornell Birding Club. Third place (136) was a tie between long time competitor the Windbirders from Rochester and Vermont and another Cornell team the Macauley Muckracers sponsored by the CLO - Macaulay Library.

The youth category was won by the Cayuga Bird Club's Downy Chicks with 67 species. The eight year old birder of Team Hummer identified 49 species in 11 hours of birding. Birders participating in the Muckrace this year saw 17 species of waterfowl, 12 species of raptors, 19 species of shorebirds, and 24 species of warbler. Warblers were evident although not abundant and once more sandhill cranes made the count. All but two teams saw the American White Pelican that has been hanging around all summer just to get on the Muckrace species list - one of four new species seen this year.

New Shorebird Area

The new shorebird area at the beginning of the wildlife drive at the Montezuma refuge was filled recently and the shorebirds have responded quickly. With the drawdown of May's Pt this year and Benning Marsh the next two years, this may be the best accessible place for shorebirds.

According to refuge manager, Tom Jasikoff, a viewing area is in the works for this new area. Until then, birders need to remain in their vehicle.

There are also plans to disc May's Pt so that it should return to good shorebird habitat in 2006.
