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Invulnerable?

Definitions

 Vulnerable – open to being wounded, as with a weapon, criticism, etc.

Application...

- A Vulnerable subpopulation may be hurt by an insult where the general population would either not be hurt, or the damage would be substantially less, by the same insult.
- This may be because of inherent sensitivity, because they're already stressed, because they're unprepared, or because they can't get over it

Vulnerability

- Susceptibility/Sensitivity
- Differential exposure
- Differential preparedness
- Differential ability to recover

Who Does Vulnerability Assessments?

- Population vulnerability to famine
- Computer Systems
- Banks
- Hospitals
- Ecological Assessments
- Correctional Facilities
- Etc.

Definitions

 Susceptible – especially liable to being affected by something

 Sensitive – highly responsive to certain agents

Susceptibility/Sensitivity

- A susceptible or sensitive individual or subpopulation is one where equal exposures or stressor insults result in substantially higher incidence or severity of effects than those usually seen in the general population
- Not usually within normal variability in a population

Does one size fit all?

Susceptibility/Sensitivity

- Biological causes
- May have different dose-response
- May be at a particular life stage, such as infancy, pregnancy
- May have become sensitized
- Prior exposure may have caused damage

Differential Exposure

- Differences in position on doseresponse curve can mean different response to equal exposure insult
- Previous exposure, reflected in body burden, etc.
- Different background exposures

Result of "Background" Exposure

Yet Another Definition:

Vulnerability = exposure to threat + inability to cope

Coping with Famine

 Households can often cope to some extent with the effects of a crisis

Household Famine Coping Mechanisms

- Draw-down on household stocks and assets
- Transfers from family members working in other areas
- Reduced food consumption
- Wild/less preferred foods
- Assistance from community/religious support mechanisms
- Government safety net programs

Coping with Famine, continued

- Coping mechanisms effectively seek to augment resources
- Households often diversify consumption
- Exposure to multiple risks, or risks of high frequency, duration, and intensity, often undermine the capacity of households to cope with future crises
- If unchecked, recurrent crises can lead to a downward spiral of vulnerability

What does "Coping" have to do with Risk?

Inability to cope changes risk

• For example, Chester, PA breast cancer statistics

Differential Preparedness

- Hurricane preparedness
- Influenza shots
- Regular health checkups
- General health of ecosystem or person

Differential Recovery

- Disease states
- Compromised immune system
- Lack of access to health care

Vulnerability Analysis

- Much precedent, especially ecological
- Who are we protecting?
- Inferences from health data
- May be difficult, qualitative
- May meet resistance
