Transparency: a working definition



The posting on a public web site all spending information, including:

- Recipients of funds
- Itemized accounting of what is purchased in goods or services
- Terms and conditions (and preferably a copy) of every grant or contract
- Regular progress reports on fulfilling those terms by each grantee or contractor
- Aggregation of data into tables of how much total is spent on types of activities or procurement, by country
- Documented progress program- and country-wide against measurable outcome indicators.

Why Transparency?

- Impossible to argue against.
- Doesn't take sides.
- Exposes true quality of management of a program.
- Eviscerates spin.
- Exposes the true priorities of a program.
- Enlists the public in the oversight workload.
- DETERS BAD BEHAVIOR.

The Transparency Timeline

- Outside experts or whistleblowers criticize a program alerting Congress;
- Congress seeks corroboration;
- Agency denies the charges, without proof;
- Agency fights back attacks/impugns critics;
- Congressional oversight exposes info that agency doesn't know;
- Agency embarrassed;
- Agency reform begins voluntarily or political will grows to force reform.

• Congress alerted by scientific community





Criticisms: bad drugs, ineffective prevention

• **USAID** denies







The Spin Cycle

- "Contrary to popular belief, <u>USAID does support use</u> of DDT in its malaria control programs. In most countries in Africa where USAID provides support to malaria control programs, it has been judged more cost-effective and appropriate to put U.S. government funds into <u>other</u> <u>malaria control activities than IRS</u>...in countries in which circumstances support the use of IRS (including DDT) USAID <u>has funded and supported</u> such malaria control programs."



President George W. Bush's Malaria Initiative

The New Standard for Transparency :



•Commit to full transparency: (<u>www.fightingmalaria.gov</u>);

•Appoint a key coordinator with authority over the policy AND the funding;

•Set measurable goals.

Case Study #2: UN Headquarters Renovation

Congress alerted



• Back-door shenanigans to obtain US loan

- Helms-Biden prohibits US loan to UN
- Approps staffer slips in Helms-Biden waiver
- US to pay itself back *with interest* for about a quarter of principle



Simple questions

- What is the real cost?
- What do we get for that?
- Corrupt procurement?

- Italian architectural design firm
- Contingency fees
- Build temp building, then tear down

Promises, Promises

- Web site
- Fire design firm
- New coordinator
- Periodic meetings

Status: UN Procurement as Usual

- Shoddy web site
- Cost estimates still rising (>\$2B now)
- No independent audit entity
- No procurement policies
- "Scope" options

Any hope?

- The UN must be opened up to independent auditing and programmatic reviews.
- All budget and procurement information must be made public.
- The only way to achieve this is through conditioning funds on it.



Case Study #3: Iran Broadcasting



- BBG structure \rightarrow no accountability
- Language barrier to content oversight
- Congress is alerted
- Oversight begins
- Broken promises
- Proliferating whistleblowers





- No dog-and-pony show hearings
- Legislate programs with proaccountability management structure
- Write transparency into EVERY bill
- Write measurable targets into every bill
- More funding for IGs
- Ensure Federal FAT Act Compliance
- Never give up!



Role for Think Tanks, Other Policy Experts and Activists



- Make noise (academic lit & mass media)
- Ask Congress to get info from agencies
- Tell us what you know!
- Suggest nominees
- Keep demands simple and realistic
