Section 307(b) Showing

The instant application, filed on behalf of Cox Radio, Inc. (“Cox”), requests that the Federal Communications Commission (“FCC” or “Commission”) grant a minor change to station WHIO-FM (Facility ID Number 73908) (the “Station”). Specifically, the Station seeks, *inter alia*, to change its community of license from Piqua, Ohio to Sharonville, Ohio (“Proposed Change”). Pursuant to the Commission’s Rules,¹ this exhibit demonstrates that the Proposed Change is in the public interest under Section 307(b) of the Communications Act (“Section 307(b)”). Section 307(b) requires the Commission to ensure a “fair, efficient, and equitable distribution of radio service...among the several States and communities” in the United States.² To implement this mandate, the Commission has established certain allocation priorities it considers in making its Section 307(b) determination, in the following order of priority: (i) first full-time aural reception service; (ii) second full-time aural reception service; (iii) first local aural transmission service; and (iv) other public interest matters.³

The Proposed Change will result in a fair, efficient and equitable distribution of radio service for several reasons. First, the Proposed Change will provide Sharonville with its first local aural transmission service. Further, after the Proposed Change, there will continue to be an operating full-time commercial station, WPTW(AM), licensed to Piqua. Furthermore, changing the Station’s community of license to Sharonville will not adversely impact Piqua because there will continue to be numerous full-time commercial FM and AM stations providing primary coverage (60 dBu) to the community of Piqua as demonstrated in Table 1 below and in Figure 1 appended to this Exhibit (“Other Aural Services Study”).

Thus, it is clear that after the Proposed Change, Piqua will continue to receive abundant full-time aural reception services.⁴ Further, the Proposed Change will not create any “white” or “gray” areas; *i.e.*, the Proposed Change will create no geographic areas that will be served by fewer than two aural reception services.⁵

Therefore, applying the Commission’s allocation priorities to the instant application, the Proposed Change will not implicate either of the first two allocation priorities (*i.e.*, (i) first full-time aural reception service; or (ii) second full-time aural reception service) because Piqua will

receive abundant aural reception service both before and after the Proposed Change. Application of allocation priority (iii) to the Proposed Change demonstrates that moving the Station from Piqua to Sharonville is in the public interest, as the implementation of the Proposed Change will provide Sharonville with its first local aural transmission service while still leaving one local aural transmission service in Piqua.

In sum, the Proposed Change is consistent with Section 307(b) and furthers the public interest because it will result in: (i) the provision of a first local aural transmission service to Sharonville; and (ii) the continued availability of one local aural transmission service and an abundant number of full-time aural reception services to Piqua.

Sharonville is also an independent community deserving of a first local service preference. In evaluating a community's independence, the Commission is guided by the following three factors: (1) signal population coverage, that is, the degree to which the proposed station will provide service to both the suburban community and the larger metropolis; (2) the size and proximity of the suburban community with the metropolis; and (3) the interdependence of the suburban community with the metropolis, as gauged by a number of indicia.⁶ All three factors indicate that Sharonville is entitled to a first local service preference.

1. Signal population coverage.

The proposed 70 dBu contour for Channel 239A at Sharonville encompasses 50.8% of the land area and 52.7% of the population within the Cincinnati urbanized area.⁷

2. Population and proximity in comparison to Cincinnati.

The Commission has stated that the requirement of community status is generally satisfied if the proposed community is incorporated and listed in the U.S. Census.⁸ Sharonville is an incorporated city with a population of 13,804 persons according to the 2000 census.⁹ This population represents approximately 4.16% of the population of Cincinnati.¹⁰ As to proximity,

Sharonville is located 12 miles from Cincinnati.¹¹ As demonstrated below, Sharonville is a substantial community that is separate and distinct from Cincinnati. Moreover, the Commission has granted channel change petitions where the proposed community's population as a percentage of that of the central city was considerably smaller¹² and where the community was located far closer to the central city of the urbanized area.¹³

3. No Interdependence.

Where an applicant requests a priority (iii) (*i.e.*, first local transmission service) preference, the Commission will require a *Tuck*¹⁴ analysis if the community is part of, or located near to, an Urbanized Area.¹⁵ In the instant application, grant of the Proposed Change will move the Station's community of license to Sharonville, Ohio, which is located within the Cincinnati, OH-KY-IN Urbanized Area. Under *Tuck*, when the Commission reviews such requests, the Commission's primary consideration is the interdependence of the proposed community to the Urbanized Area.¹⁶ In *Tuck*, the FCC set forth eight factors in assessing the independence of a specified community: (1) the extent to which community residents work in the larger metropolitan area, rather than the specified community; (2) whether the smaller community has its own weekly newspaper or other media that cover the community's local needs and interests; (3) whether the community leaders and residents perceive the specified community as being an integral part of, or separate from, the larger metropolitan area; (4) whether the specified community has its own local government and elected officials; (5) whether the smaller community has its own zip code or telephone book provided by the local telephone company; (6) whether the community has its own commercial establishments, health facility and transportation systems; (7) the extent to which the specified community and the central city are part of the same advertising market; and (8) the extent to which the specified community relies on the larger metropolitan area for various municipal services such as police, fire protection, schools, and libraries.¹⁷ The Commission has considered a community as independent when a majority of these factors demonstrate that the community is distinct from the Urbanized Area.¹⁸

As demonstrated in the table below, a majority of the eight *Tuck* factors support a determination that Sharonville is independent from the Cincinnati Urbanized Area. Cox thus respectfully submits that Sharonville should be considered independent of the Cincinnati Urbanized Area for purposes of the *Tuck* analysis. As a result, Cox's request for priority (iii) preference is appropriate.

Sharonville, OH Community Data (Application of Tuck Factors) (see generally attached at Exhibit A)

(1) *Extent to which community residents work in the larger metropolitan area, rather than the specified community*

- Sharonville is located in Butler and Hamilton counties in Ohio at a prime location between I-75, I-71 and I-275, and is approximately 18 miles north of the Ohio River.
- According to the United States Census Bureau, the city has a total area of 25.5 km² (9.9 mi²).
- Sharonville has a residential population of approximately 14,000 and a work population of approximately 37,000 (*i.e.*, approximately 23,000 commuters live outside of Sharonville and commute to Sharonville for work). As of the 2000 census, there were 6,211 households, and 3,589 families residing in the city.
- There are approximately 4,476 residential homes and approximately 20 apartment buildings with more than 2,200 units in Sharonville.

(2) *Whether the smaller community has its own weekly newspaper or other media that cover the community's local needs and interests*

- Local weekly newspapers provide coverage of the Sharonville community, as well as neighboring communities, including the *Tri-County Press* and *Northeast Suburban Life*.

(3) *Whether the community leaders and residents perceive the specified community as being an integral part of, or separate from, the larger metropolitan area*

- The Town of "Sharon" (later changed to "Sharonville") was established in 1799 and Sharonville was incorporated in 1962.

- Sharonville has its own historic society, The Society of Historic Sharonville. A museum is home to a variety of Sharonville memorabilia.
- Sharonville refers to itself as the "City of Progress".

(4) Whether the specified community has its own local government and elected officials

- Sharonville is an incorporated city with a Mayor and City Council.
- The Mayor is Virgil G. Lovitt, II and has a four-year term. The Mayor reports to the City Council on the management of the city and presides over Sharonville Board of Health and the Sharonville Planning Commission. The Mayor appoints the Safety-Services Director, who runs the city on a day-to-day basis.
- City Council members have a two-year term. One council person is elected from each of the city's four wards and three are elected from the city at large. The City Council is the legislative body of the municipality. The City Council sets the budget each year for the operation of the city and sets all salaries and authorizes all contracts for expenditures of municipal funds. Each council person also heads a committee to report current matters to the City Council and, in addition, serves on two other City Council committees relating to the operation of the city.
- The City of Sharonville has a Mayor's Court, presided over by a magistrate, that hears cases involving traffic violations and minor misdemeanors.
- Sharonville's government includes a Building and Planning Department, Health Department, Public Works Department, Parks and Recreation Department, and Tax Department. Sharonville also has an Office of Economic Development.
- Sharonville collects a 1.5% tax on earnings to fund the city government.
- Sharonville operates a website (<http://www.sharonville.org/>) that provides information and residential services, including an online service request system that allows visitors to request information, submit service requests, and submit comments for review by the city government.

(5) Whether the smaller community has its own zip code or telephone book provided by the local telephone company

- Sharonville has its own ZIP code, 45241, and post office.

(6) Whether the community has its own commercial establishments, health facility and transportation systems

- There are over 20 hotels, over 50 restaurants and approximately 1,200 businesses in Sharonville.
- Sharonville has two shopping malls – Home Center Shopping Mall and Loehmann's Plaza Shopping Center.
- There are 20 office buildings and 4 office parks in Sharonville.
- Although there are three hospitals located within 10 miles of Sharonville, Sharonville does not have its own hospital. Numerous doctors' offices and other health facilities are located in Sharonville.
- Sharonville has its own Chamber of Commerce.

(7) *The extent to which the specified community and the central city are part of the same advertising market*

- Sharonville businesses can target advertising to residents of Sharonville through local newspapers including the *Tri-County Press* and *Northeast Suburban Life*.

(8) *The extent to which the specified community relies on the larger metropolitan area for various municipal services such as police, fire protection, schools, and libraries*

- *Fire Department* - Sharonville has its own fire department with three fire stations.
- *Police* - The Sharonville Police Department is an independent full-time (*i.e.*, 24-hour patrol), full-service law enforcement organization. The department currently is staffed by 49 full-time employees, 40 of whom are sworn officers.
- *Schools* - Sharonville is part of the Princeton consolidated school district encompassing the neighboring communities of Evendale, Glendale, Lincoln Heights, Sharonville, and Springdale. The school district's high school, Princeton High School, is located in Sharonville, as is Sharonville Elementary School.
- *Library* - Sharonville has had its own library since 1966. The current library is a 15,000 square foot facility built on land donated by the City in 1993. The library is affiliated with The Public Library of Cincinnati and Hamilton County.
- *Public Parks and Recreational Facilities*: Sharonville has 5 multi-use buildings, 17 ball fields, 2 community centers with pools, 5 parks, 5 tennis courts, 2 reservoirs, 2 golf courses, a re-developed downtown, and a convention center.
- *Other Facilities*: Sharonville has a Convention Center, 10 churches and numerous civic organizations (see attached Exhibit B).


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Current News





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Living Here

Sharonville is a city located in Butler and Hamilton counties in Ohio. As of the 2000 census, the city had a total population of 13,804.

Geography

Sharonville is located at 39°16'53" North, 84°23'50" West (39.281259, -84.397253). According to the United States Census Bureau, the city has a total area of 25.5 km² (9.9 mi²). 25.4 km² (9.8 mi²) of it is land and 0.1 km² (0.1 mi²) of it is water. The total area is 0.51% water.

Demographics

As of the census of 2000, there are 13,804 people, 6,211 households, and 3,589 families residing in the city. The population density is 543.3/km² (1,407.7/mi²).

There are 6,526 housing units at an average density of 256.9/km² (665.5/mi²).

The racial makeup of the city is 88.74% White, 4.82% African American, 0.12% Native American, 3.80% Asian, 0.02% Pacific Islander, 0.96% from other races, and 1.54% from two or more races. 2.30% of the population are Hispanic or Latino of any race.

There are 6,211 households out of which 24.3% have children under the age of 18 living with them, 45.0% are married couples living together, 9.2% have a female householder with no husband present, and 42.2% are non-families. 36.5% of all households are made up of individuals and 12.5% have someone living alone who is 65 years of age or older.

The average household size is 2.17 and the average family size is 2.85.

In the city the population is spread out with 20.6% under the age of 18, 7.8% from 18 to 24, 31.0% from 25 to 44, 23.5% from 45 to 64, and 17.1% who are 65 years of age or older. The median age is 39 years. For every 100 females there are 92.7 males. For every 100 females age 18 and over, there are 88.7 males.



1876: Town renamed "Sharonville" due to confusion with another town named "Sharon" in eastern Ohio.







- **COUNCIL**



Council authorizes the budget each year for the operation of the city and sets all salaries. Council authorizes all contracts for expenditures of municipal funds. Each person also heads a committee to report current matters to council. In addition, serves on two other council committees relating to the operation of the city.

down and leave yourself additional room for stopping. If you do start to skid straight and you have anti-lock brakes, just continue to hold the brake pedal down and let the anti-lock brakes do the work. If you don't have anti-lock brakes, you will need to pump the brake pedal. If your car starts to slide sideways, remember to turn the wheel in the direction of the slide and let off of the gas.

Parents, you may want to consider taking your new drivers to an empty, unplowed parking lot, that is closed to other traffic, and let them practice driving in the snow. They will be better off practicing under a controlled situation as opposed to learning on the roadway. Just remember, there is a big difference between practicing stopping and turning in the snow as opposed to being reckless. Going slow is the key!

If you do find yourself in the unfortunate situation of being involved in an accident during a snow fall the police may not be able to respond because of the increased number of auto accident calls. When you call to report the accident, the dispatcher may tell you that if the cars are drivable and there are no injuries just exchange information. Otherwise it may be a long time before an officer is available to get to your call. There is nothing wrong with this, just remember that if you later determine that you need an accident report, you will need to respond to the police station with the other person involved to file a report.

Winter Driving

It is that time of year again. Time when we can go to bed with the streets dry and clear only to wake up for work in the morning with several inches of snow on the ground. After scraping your windows and brushing the snow off of your car you hit the road. You quickly become frustrated because you are stuck behind a line of cars driving 15 mph and you know at this point that you are going to be late for work. Avoid this frustration and the increased danger created by your haste by taking a few simple steps and making preparations. It is bad enough for an adult to be stuck on the side of the road in the cold. You certainly need to be prepared if you are traveling with small children. Keep in mind that they are more susceptible to cold weather related injuries such as frost bite.

First of all, make sure that your vehicle is mechanically ready for the cold weather. Some basics for this are to check your battery, wipers, antifreeze, and tire tread. In addition, make sure that you have a full tank of gas. This can be very important if you get stuck in the snow and have to wait several hours for a tow.

There are a few supplies that you may also want to make sure are stored in your vehicle. It is a good idea to have a blanket in your car just in case you break down. It can get very cold sitting in a car without heat. A small shovel can be handy if you slide off of the road and become stuck in the snow. Sometimes just clearing away the snow around the tires can be enough to get you going again. You also may want to consider placing a sand bag in the trunk if you have a rear wheel drive vehicle. Not only will this add weight for traction while driving, but also if you do get stuck, you can place some sand on the ground in front of the tires for traction.

Now that you are properly equipped to head out into the snow, you need to remember one small piece of information. Snow and ice are slippery. I know that sounds like a simple concept, but there are some people that just can't fully grasp the idea. You know who they are. Last winter you saw them stuck off the side of the road. You saw them waiting for the police after they ran into the car in front of them. And then there is my personal favorite, you see them driving past you in four wheel drive vehicles thinking that they can somehow stop faster than other cars because they have four wheel drive. In today's cyber savvy world most of us are aware of what a threat computer viruses pose. We also probably know how spyware can inhibit a computer's performance, and that a computer with high speed internet access should have a firewall in place to stop would be hackers. But how many people are aware that a seemingly innocuous e-mail message from a bank, or store can really be a scam to gain access to your personal information and money?

You may have received an e-mail in the past from a retail store as an example stating that a large purchase that you never ordered is about to ship. The e-mail instructs you to follow a hyper-link in the message to login to your account if the order is incorrect. If you click the link a web page opens that appears to be the legitimate business website login area. If you enter your account information then the person who created that site now has your personal data.

This is called phishing and it is becoming more and more prevalent in today's world. Whether the message comes from a popular online auction site, a major banking company or an electronics store, people fall prey to this scam daily.

The following tips will help you prevent becoming a victim to a phishing scam:

- If you receive an e-mail message that asks you to go to a website and divulge any personal information, do not respond. Legitimate businesses are very aware of phishing scams and should not solicit your information online.

- Never use the link in a message to open a web page, instead type in the company name to go to the real website.

- Never e-mail sensitive personal or financial information.

- Use and update virus scanning, anti-spyware, and firewall software.

- Use caution when opening e-mail attachments.
- If you believe you have been a victim visit <http://www.consumer.gov/idtheft> the Federal Trade Commissions website for identity theft.

Sharonville Elementary Unlocks a Treasure From the Past

A letter found in the 1898 Time Capsule written by the Sharonville blacksmith who soldered the time capsule shut: September 10, 1898

To be opened and read by the next generation or when a new school edifice shall be erected perhaps about 1930 when in all probability most of our people in our present will be under the sod. So that the debts now being paid forth by our community in the cause of education shall bear good if it and then when you open this that you will be so far in advance of us that you will be the leading educational community in the township.

This year 1898 has been an eventful one. History has been made. The United States has conquered Spain and taken possession of her vast colonial possessions across seas. Read about it and if I am not alive remember Joe Long, Blacksmith, Sharonville, Ohio. General repairs..., satisfaction guaranteed.

Sharonville Elementary Principal Gary Tyler and Princeton City School district's Construction Manager Fred Pensinger had been waiting for this moment for over two years. In front of them was the terra cotta cornerstone taken from the old Sharonville Elementary School, which was built in 1926. They were hoping a time capsule would be found inside, and they were not disappointed. After chiseling away a layer of cement, they found a copper box measuring about 2.5 feet long, a foot wide and a foot deep. They cut the copper and pulled it open to find not only artifacts, but also a second sealed copper box! Princeton Archival Museum of Education director Beth Ecker was called in to assist with sorting the contents and opening the second box. Inside box number two they found artifacts dating back to 1898 and evidence that this time capsule had been originally stored in the cornerstone of Sharonville's 1898 schoolhouse, also known as the Sharonville School, District 2 building. The contents were visibly fragile, many stained a deep purple presumably due from the American flags that were in each box. Ms. Ecker used a metal spackling tool to carefully lift and separate the documents.

"I think what is of particular interest," said Ms. Ecker, "are the numbers of artifacts that are in both boxes. They both have current newspapers, American flags (one with 46 stars and one with 48), coins, class rosters, membership lists from local organizations and business cards." There is only one copy of the program from the 1926 Cornerstone dedication, which took place nearly 80 years to the day the new Sharonville Elementary was dedicated on October 22, 2006. Even the events themselves were similar – America the Beautiful sung by the school children, a selection by the band, a song performed by the P.T.A. and addresses by various local officials, including Mayor Harry McGrew and the P.T.A. president Mrs. C.C. Gardent.

Other standout items are two advertisements from the restaurant and tavern The Victor House, one from 1898 and one from 1926. The September 24, 1898 editions of the Miami Valley Review & News and a copy of The Commercial Tribune were in one capsule. The 1926 capsule included the October 31 edition of the Cincinnati Enquirer with the headline, "Democrats to Make Sweep." Families valued great bargains at the turn of the century, too. A 1898 coupon "Good for One Loaf of Bread" was contributed by W.H. Mosher and the Kroger Grocery & Baking Company donated a coupon in 1926.

The YMCA contributed a letter carefully folded over a 1826 Liberty half dollar. The letter states the coin is a "token of loyalty to school from the Big Four YMCA, Sharonville, Ohio." In the 1898 capsule there was a half dollar coin from that year. A beautifully preserved Sharon Theater program from Friday, October 22, 1926 listed all the films being shown that week.

One of the most fascinating items is a handwritten letter by F.S. Sotcher, who identified himself as the builder of the wooden box time capsule, which was stored in the 1898 building. Tyler and Ecker believe that the first time capsule was made out of wood as a piece of it signed by Sotcher was included in the 1926 capsule. "I believe the contents of the 1898 wooden box were transferred into a copper box, which was then soldered and placed

inside the large 1926 copper box." Mr. Sotcher left behind a handwritten biographical sketch that begins, "To whom it may concern, I, F.S. Sotcher was born in St. Bernard, Ohio June 6, 1851." He goes on to give his life history including his move at age 9 to a log house about a mile and half north east of Sharonville.

Both capsules contained a number of business cards, many in excellent condition. From 1926 are cards from Farris E. Beekley, M.D. (of Beekley Woods), C.W. Coleman Grocers, Igler Drug Company of Sharonville & Hartwell, Confectionary & Soft Drinks, C & D Auto, The Sharonville Bank and Sharonville Battery Service. In 1898, Jones & Smith Collectors, The Victor House Barber Shop and E.H. Huffman Agricultural Implements included business cards. It cost \$.30 for an adult to ride the Valley Bus Company from Sharonville to Cincinnati stopping at Reading, Lockland, Wyoming, Hartwell, Carthage, Elmwood, Spring Grove Avenue and Chester Park along the way. The business card of Wm. Koviaik, Timman, was included with a notation that in 1926 he soldered the copper box containing the 1898 time capsule contents.

Both time capsules are currently at the Princeton Museum of Education, where Beth Ecker is carefully registering their contents. Principal Gary Tyler hopes to restore each item and properly preserve them for generations to come. "I think we are meant to be stewards of these items for a short time. My hope is we can pass forward the experience our students have had by creating a third time capsule to be opened in another fifty years." Funds will be needed to preserve the 1898 and 1926 contents and purchase a time capsule for the old and new items. Anyone interested in making a donation to the time capsule fund, may contact Gary Tyler at Sharonville Elementary, 864-2600. In addition, amateur historians will enjoy taking a look at a history of Sharonville Elementary schools, which is on display in the front lobby of the new school at 11150 Maple Street.

The office is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. The location and mailing address of the Sharonville Tax Office is 11641 Chester Road, Sharonville, OH 45246. **A drop box is also available for your convenience.**

of the 4th month following the end of the fiscal year.

TAXABLE INCOME

- Qualifying wages (see below), tips, commissions and other compensation including sick pay, vacation pay, supplemental unemployment benefits paid by the employer (SUB PAY), severance pay, settlements, income from wage continuation plans (includes retirement incentive plans and buyouts), contributions made by or on behalf of employees to non-qualified or qualified deferred compensation plans (e.g. 401K plans), bonuses, directors fees, fringe benefits (e.g. car allowance), disability pay if received as a benefit from employment (includes third party plans), stock options as indicated by amount on Form W-2.

- All City of Sharonville residents are required to register with the Tax Office and to file an annual Sharonville income tax return even if no tax is due. Adolescents/students with earned income are also required to file.
- All non-residents with income earned within Sharonville or with income taxable to the City of Sharonville that is not fully withheld by an employer are required to file a Sharonville income tax return.
- All non-residents engaged in a business within the City of Sharonville who have sales, services performed or rental property must file a tax return whether or not tax is due.

- All entities operating a business within or doing business within the City of Sharonville must file an annual Sharonville income tax return on net profits/losses.

FILING DUE DATES

- Individual Returns: On or before April 16.*
- Business Returns: On or before April 16* or the 15th day of the 4th month following the end of the fiscal year.

- Withholding Reconciliations: On or before February 28.*

* *If the due date falls on a weekend or a federal holiday, the due date will be the following business day.*

* *Filing early is highly recommended as those requesting assistance from the Tax Office increases dramatically as the tax filing deadline approaches.*

EXTENSIONS

- An extension for filing the annual Sharonville income tax return may be requested by any business or individual by submitting a written request or providing a copy of the Federal extension to the Tax Office on or before the due date for filing the return. The extension, if granted, only extends the filing date of the return. The extension does not extend the due date for payment of the tax. Payments are due on or before April 15* each year or the 15th* day
- Alimony received.
- Military pay and allowances.
- Social Security benefits, welfare benefits, unemployment insurance benefits, workers' compensation.
- Pensions, proceeds from qualified IRS defined retirement plans.

TAXABLE INCOME

- Qualifying wages (see below), tips, commissions and other compensation including sick pay, vacation pay, supplemental unemployment benefits paid by the employer (SUB PAY), severance pay, settlements, income from wage continuation plans (includes retirement incentive plans and buyouts), contributions made by or on behalf of employees to non-qualified or qualified deferred compensation plans (e.g. 401K plans), bonuses, directors fees, fringe benefits (e.g. car allowance), disability pay if received as a benefit from employment (includes third party plans), stock options as indicated by amount on Form W-2.

- Gambling winnings as reported on Form W-2G and/or Form 5754 as well as Form 1040.
- Net profits from profession and/or business operations, rental property, partnerships, enterprise or other business activity.

- Qualifying wages: Usually the amounts in the Medicare wage box of the W-2s are the qualifying wages. Qualifying wages for the municipality includes wages defined in Section 3.121(a) of the IRS code plus any amounts not included in the Medicare wage due to some Medicare exemptions (e.g. government employees employed by an entity prior to April 13, 1986).

Note: Income taxable by the city may differ from income taxed by the IRS.

TYPES OF NON-TAXABLE INCOME THAT SHOULD NOT BE ADDED TO NOR DEDUCTED FROM TAXABLE INCOME

- Interest, dividends, capital gains (unless considered ordinary income), royalties (if derived from intangible property).

CREDITS

- Credit for taxes withheld/paid to other municipalities is available to residents of the City of Sharonville and is limited to 1.5% of the amount of taxable income on which tax was withheld/paid.

- No credit is given for county taxes paid.

DECLARATION OF ESTIMATED TAXES

- A declaration of estimated tax must be filed by all individuals and business entities who may reasonably expect to have taxable income, if the tax on this income is not or will not be withheld by an employer or employers.

- A taxpayer's final return for the preceding year may be used as the basis for computing the declaration of estimated tax for the current year.

- The declaration and first quarterly payment are due by April 16 or four months after the start of the fiscal year.

- The remaining quarterly payments are due by July 31*, October 31* and January 31* for calendar year taxpayers or every three months of the fiscal year.

- Estimated tax payments are required and penalties are assessed for insufficient declaration payments.

Note: If at least 90% of a taxpayer's tax liability is not paid by the 4th quarter due date, the difference between 90% of the tax liability and the amount of estimated tax paid on or before the 4th quarter due date shall be subject to the interest and penalty provisions of Section 171.10 of the Income Tax Ordinance.

OBTAINING SHARONVILLE INCOME TAX RETURNS

- Returns are mailed by early January of each year to all residents and businesses on file as of mid-December. If a return is not received, forms are available on the Sharonville website or by contacting the Sharonville Tax Office.

ITEMS TO BE INCLUDED WITH THE RETURN

- W-2 form(s).
- 1099 form(s).
- Page 1 of the applicable federal form 1040.
- Applicable schedule(s) and/or form(s) for income on form 1040 lines 12, 17, 18 and 21, other federal form(s)/schedule(s) and supporting documentation as appropriate.

- Annual tax questionnaire update form included with the return envelope.
- Payment of tax due (checks are to be made payable to City of Sharonville Tax).

EMPLOYERS' RESPONSIBILITIES

- All employers within or doing business within the City of Sharonville are responsible for withholding the tax of 1.5% on the qualifying wages of their employees and remitting the withheld tax on a monthly basis to the City of Sharonville on or before the fifteenth (15th) day of the month following such withholding. In addition, employers are required to withhold the tax of 1.5% on 100% of the wage amount for all employees who are Sharonville residents.

- All employers who do business both inside and outside the jurisdiction of the City of Sharonville are required to withhold the tax of 1.5% on all compensation earned by their employees who work within the City of Sharonville.

- Payments are to be reported on Form W-1. If a pre-printed form was not received, a generic form may be obtained from the Sharonville website or by contacting the Sharonville Tax Office.

- Employers who conduct no business activity within the City of Sharonville may choose to voluntarily withhold the Sharonville tax for those employees who reside within the City of Sharonville. Withholding for Sharonville residents should be an amount sufficient to bring their total local withholding to 1.5% (credit is given to Sharonville residents for local taxes paid to other municipalities up to 1.5%).

PROPERTY TAXES

- The collection of property taxes (whether it is for residential property or business property) are the responsibility of Hamilton County or Butler County. The City of Sharonville does not receive property tax dollars from city residents or businesses.
- For further information on the collection and payment of property taxes, please contact either the Hamilton County Auditor's office at (513) 946-4000 or the Butler County Auditor's office at (513) 887-3154. Links to the Hamilton County Auditor's office and Butler County Auditor's office are also available on the Sharonville website.

SCHOOL DISTRICT

- The City of Sharonville is within the Princeton School District. The code for the Princeton School District for state income tax form purposes is 3116.

How To

The Sharonville Fire Department would like to remind everyone that if an emergency happens, call 911.

Emergencies don't happen very often. But when they do, you want to get help fast. No one wants to spend time looking up the phone number. That's why 911 was created - to make it easy. In the United States and Canada, dialing 911 on your telephone is the fastest way you can get help for yourself or someone else. Other countries may use another three numbers. In Great Britain, for instance, it's 999.

The seven digit number 563-0252 of the Sharonville Fire Department is for non-emergencies and daily fire department business only. Always call 911 if it is an emergency!

Most people will only call 911 once or twice during their lifetime. Having the necessary information will aid the 911 dispatcher in sending you the appropriate resources quickly and efficiently.

Steps

1. Take a few deep breaths to calm yourself.
2. Dial 9-1-1
3. Remain Calm
4. Listen to the dispatcher
5. Be prepared to tell the dispatcher what type of emergency you are calling about.
6. Know the address of the emergency and the nearest intersection (cross street) or be able to provide directions for the dispatcher to relay to the emergency responders.
7. Know the phone number you are calling from. This enables the dispatcher to call you back for further information or directions, and allows the dispatcher to call you back should you get disconnected.
8. Remain Calm.
9. Be able to describe the problem (the reason for your 911 call) to the dispatcher, this helps the dispatcher determine the appropriate resources for your emergency.
10. Follow the dispatcher's instructions while waiting for help to arrive.
11. Do not hang up until the dispatcher instructs you to do so.

Tips

- If nothing else, know the location of your emergency. Without this information, the dispatcher does not know where to send the emergency responders.
- Remain calm. Take a few deep breaths if you feel yourself losing control. By remaining calm, you are best able to provide the dispatcher with the information they need to best help you.
- Respect the 911 system, but do not be intimidated by it. You will be speaking to a live person, trained to help you through this emergency.
- 911 can be dialed on public pay phones for free.
- If you have to use a cell phone, tell them your location right away as you may need to be transferred to the appropriate call center and have to start over with a new operator.

- Be mentally prepared to follow instructions; most 911 centers will be able to provide you with instructions that will be able to ensure the safety of the patient as well as yourself (e.g., don't put anything in someone's mouth if they're having a seizure, CPR instructions, the Heimlich, etc.). If you are not physically able to or are afraid to carry out the instructions given to you, see if someone else who is there with you will.
- If it is night time, be sure that the address of where you are with the patient can be clearly seen so we can easily locate you.

Warnings

- Do not call 911 with false emergencies! This puts a strain on resources, and can also land you some jail time. Also be sure to educate your children on the proper use of 911.

When Do You Call 911?

- Examples of when to call 911 are:
- When you see smoke or fire.
 - When someone's life and/or property are in immediate danger.
 - When you see a crime being committed.
 - When rescue or emergency medical assistance is needed.
 - When you are not sure, call & let trained personnel decide.

What If I Dial 9-1-1 By Mistake?

- DO NOT HANG UP! Before you hang up, be sure to tell the dispatcher that you have dialed 9-1-1 by mistake, and that you do not need emergency help. Anytime the dispatcher receives a 9-1-1 "hang-up"; the caller must be contacted to be sure that no actual emergency exists. If the dispatcher is unable to contact anyone from that number an officer must then be dispatched to the address.

Are Pay Phones Any Different?

You may dial 9-1-1 for an emergency at any pay phone, without needing any coins. The phone number and location of the pay phone should show up on the 911 screen.

What About Calling 9-1-1 From My Cellular Phone?

While we encourage people to use cellular phones to dial 911 in emergency situations, people also need to be aware that location information does not come up on the Dispatchers screen as it does on a call from a landline phone. Technology is advancing in this field, but currently the only information displayed on the 911 screen is the cellular company provider name (i.e. Verizon or VoiceStream, etc.) and the phone number of the cellular phone. If you dial 911 from your cellular phone, we will not know where you are; you will have to give us location information to get units to respond.

When you dial 911 from your cellular phone, you will be routed automatically to the 911 center closest to the cellular site you are using which may not be the correct center for your exact location. For example: you may be in Hamilton County and the site your cell phone signal is using is in Butler County. Always tell the dispatcher your exact location and if necessary they can connect you to the correct 911 call center.

Should I Program My Phone To Dial 9-1-1?

While it is not against the law, we strongly advise against doing this. Automatic dialing of 9-1-1 can result in accidental calls to the 9-1-1 dispatcher. Speed dialing can malfunction, and stop working, which would delay precious response time. In addition, if you are training your children to press a one-button speed call number in an emergency, they may not know how to call for help from another phone.

If You Were Injured , Would Your Child Know How To Get Help?

Make sure your child knows the following information:

- Name (yours and the child's)
- Address (including name of apartment complex and apartment number if applicable)
- Phone number
- Directions to your home from the nearest main road, intersection or major landmark

Other Things To Think About...

- Make sure your address and phone numbers are posted by the family phone(s), so they can be read by anyone using the telephone in an emergency. In times of emergency, even those who have lived in their houses for 20 years have been known to forget their information.
- Make sure your house number is visible at night from the street and is clearly posted where your driveway joins the main road.

Snow Season is Upon Us!

The Public Works Department takes pride in keeping Sharonville's roads as safe as possible during the winter. There are a few guidelines that residents could follow that would help our department to maintain our roads in the best condition possible. During a snowstorm, please remove vehicles from the roadways, to allow for full road width snow removal. The Public Works crew has very limited time to remove the snow in a major snowstorm and cars parked out in the roadway create additional obstacles and restrict visibility. We apologize for any inconvenience that the build-up of plowed snow causes along the road leading into driveways. Wherever practical, we will attempt to keep the snow build-up to a minimum. Unfortunately, due to limitations of time and manpower, we will not be able to remove plowed snow from in front of everyone's driveway. This ultimately is the responsibility of the homeowner. Please shovel snow responsibly, by not shoveling your snow into the roadway. Have a safe and happy winter!

Christmas Tree Recycling Program: When you take your Christmas tree down at the end of the holiday season, please put it out at the curbside and we will pick it up for you. We will be by once a week to pick up your trees. Please check our website at www.sharonville.org to find out what day we are in your area.

Roadway/Sidewalk Improvements: Please notify the Public Works Department of unsafe conditions of curbs, streets, sidewalks, or storm drainage problems in your neighborhood. The Department maintains a list of problem areas that need to be fixed. Based on the condition and safety criteria, the City makes every attempt to correct the identified safety problems in a timely manner, as long as our budget allows. The number to call is 563-1177.

Recycling: We have FREE Recycling of mixed paper, plastic, glass, metal & aluminum, located at the West side Fire House 1663 Circlefield Road, North Fire House 7150 Fields Ertel & at the Community Center 10990 Thornview. They are open 24 hours. Paint recycling has been discontinued, due to the recycler no longer being in operation. Disposal of latex paint may now be done by allowing it to dry out and then throwing it away with the regular garbage. Please leave lids off of the paint cans. Information regarding hazardous materials is available by calling the Hamilton County Household Hazardous Materials Hotline at (513) 946-7700 or by visiting their website at www.hcdoes.org. Butler County residents may contact the Butler County Department of Environmental Services (BCDES), at (513) 887-3066, or visit their website at www.butlercountyohio.org/des.

Rumpke Service:

Normal pick up hours start at 7 a.m., Monday thru Friday.

The contract with Rumpke does not require them to follow the exact same schedule of pickup time each week. Vacation schedules or illness of their employees may cause the pickup times to change. It will always be the same day, but the time may vary a bit, depending upon circumstances. Christmas Day and New Year's Day are the only days that the garbage will be picked up the following day. Always have your trash out the evening prior to the pick up date. If your trash does not get picked up because it was not out by 7 a.m., we will not ask Rumpke to make a special trip back to get it.

Please keep these thoughts in mind when putting out garbage:

- Carpet needs to be cut into 4 foot or shorter lengths, rolled, taped or tied.
- Carpet weighing more than 75 lbs, will not be picked up.
- Boxes need to be flattened. Do not put trash in empty boxes.
- Trash containers and furniture items need to be out by the curb.
- Collectors are not permitted to go on private property.
- No containers are to be heavier than 75 lbs., unless you have a Rumpke, 95 gallon waste-wheeler.
- Do not pack containers so tight that the garbage will not easily fall out when they are dumped.
- All garbage needs to be in some type of container or bag. No loose garbage is to be set out.
- Appliances such as refrigerators, dehumidifiers and air conditioners will be picked up if the appropriate documentation is attached, certifying that the CFC's were appropriately removed. *Paperwork may either be picked up at the Public Works Department located in the Administration Building or on Rumpke's web site at www.rumpke.com.*

Many residents complain of raiding critters digging in their trash. Containers having locking lids or containers with bungee cords will make it much more difficult for a creature looking for an easy meal. This will also prevent contents from spilling in the event of weather related high winds.

Proper photo identification will be required for a Sharonville Community Center membership.
