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# **Illinois Grain & Livestock Market News**

#### GRAIN PRICES TURN HIGHER FOR THE MONTH OF DECEMBER

FEED GRAINS: Prices paid to producers of shelled corn ended the reporting period 68 cents higher, with sorghum values up 49 cents. December was a slow news month for grain prices; however prices rose substantially. Export activity has been slow for corn, but very good for soybeans. As shown in the USDA's Supply Demand report released December 11, the corn export forecast was trimmed by 100 million bushels. The 300 million bushels drop in the ethanol estimate also helped to boost the carryout figure for the 2008-2009 US corn crop to 1.474 billion bushels, up from the 1.124 billion bushels forecasted in November. In the December Supply Demand report, the USDA also lowered the average price forecasted from 4.40 per bushel down to 4.00. There was an increase seen in the USDA's World Supply Demand forecast. The December forecast estimated the world corn carryout at 123.83 million metric tonnes, up substantially from last month's estimate of 110.12 mmt. When corn was combined with sorghum, oats and barley under the category of Global coarse grains that stock number went up sharply in the December report too. The global coarse grain stocks for 2008-2009 were projected at 165.5 million tons, up 14.6 million from last month, and highest since the 2004-2005 crop year. To show how slow corn exports have been so far this marketing year, they are 310 million bushels behind last year's pace. From the Grains Inspected for Export report, for the week ending December 25, 2008, corn inspected for export totaled 514.7 million bushels, compared to 824 million last year. One positive note for corn in December was the development of a hot and dry weather pattern for South America. Many areas in the corn and soybean growing regions have experienced stress during their growing stages. At the Central Illinois Corn Processors bids gained 68 to 69 cents during the month of December to range from 3.90-4.02, with basis up 10 to 11 cents at -17H to -5H. At the Illinois River terminals south of Peoria, cash corn bids advanced 77 to 82 cents to 3.87-4.02, with basis up 19 to 24 cents to -20H to -18H. Cash corn bids to producers of shelled corn at the Illinois River terminals north of Peoria advanced 78 to 80 cents to 3.84-3.88, with basis gaining 20 to 22 cents to range from -23H to -19H. Cash corn bids to producers at country elevators in northern and western Illinois gained 70 to 72 cents at 3.60-3.72, with central Illinois locations up 67 to 74 cents to 3.70-3.87, and in southern Illinois corn bids advanced 67 to 78 cents to 3.73-3.86. Cash sorghum bids at the country elevators in southern Illinois were 52 to 56 cents higher at 2.72-3.15. Bids for new crop corn at the Illinois River terminals south of Peoria gained 49 to 62 cents during December to range from 3.93-3.94, with basis mixed ranging from -58Z to -57Z. At the Illinois River terminals north of Peoria new crop bids gained 59 to 62 cents to range from 3.78-3.85, with basis up 4 to 6 cents at -73½Z to -66Z. New crop bids to producers at country elevators in northern and western Illinois locations gained 51 to 54 cents to 3.75-3.91, with central Illinois locations up 47 to 58 cents ranging from 3.71-3.93, and in southern Illinois bids increased 51 to 68 cents to 3.75-4.02.

SOYBEANS: Prices gained 1.35 for the month of December. Prices posted only small gains most of the month, but during the last two weeks of the year, prices climbed almost 1.00 per bushel and finally ignited some farmer selling of cash soybeans. Before soybean harvest had a good start and bids went below 10.00 per bushel, many farmers had become limited sellers, only selling enough to cover financial needs. The USDA's Supply Demand report did little to move the market this month. The December 11th report left the 2008-2009 soybean carryout at 205 million bushels. Besides the poor economic news that influenced prices in October and November, there was other fundamental news to stir the market in December. The country of China was the main buyer of soybeans during the month. Many weeks in the USDA's Weekly Export Sales report, China was listed as a major buyer. Export inspections for the current marketing year have been running above the levels posted one year ago. From the Grain Inspected or Weighed for Export report for the week ending December 25, 2008, there had been 493 million bushels of soybeans weighed for export, compared to 440.8 million bushels for the same period last year. Also in December, traders were becoming more concerned with hot and dry weather conditions in South America. This is their planting and growing season and they are vulnerable to crop scares. Already in December, the USDA has lowered their forecast for the Brazilian soybean crop from 60 million metric tonnes to 59 mmt. For the month both the soybean bids and basis ended higher. The Central Illinois Soybean Processors bids to producers for cash soybeans were up 1.34 to 1.36 to range from 9.72-9.85, with basis 8 to 10 cents stronger at option F to +13F. Soybean meal also posted strong gains during the month up 47.20 to 50.20 per ton for 48% truck meal on a cash basis to range from 304.50-309.50. At the Illinois River terminals, south of Peoria, cash soybean bids advanced 1.37 to 1.38 for the month to range from 9.74-9.83, with basis up 11 to 12 cents to +2F to +11F. Bids to producers at the Illinois River terminals north of Peoria gained 1.31 to 1.37 to 9.67-9.76, with basis 5 to 11 cents higher at -5F to +4F. Cash soybean bids to producers at country elevators in northern and western Illinois were up 1.27 to 1.36 to range from 9.34-9.61, with central Illinois locations gaining 1.35 to 1.42 at 9.51-9.65, and in southern Illinois bids advanced 1.35 to 1.36 to range from 9.48-9.62. Bids for new crop soybeans for October delivery at the Illinois River terminals, south of Peoria went up 1.39 to 1.43 to range from 9.34-9.35, with basis 8 to 12 cents higher ranging from -73X to -72X, At the Illinois River terminals north of Peoria, new crop soybean bids gained 1,26 to 1,39 with bids ranging from 9.34-9.36, with basis mixed at -72X to -70X. New crop soybean bids to producers at country elevators in northern and western Illinois gained 1.31 to 1.39 to range from 9.19-9.42, with central Illinois locations up 1.33 to 1.48 to range from 9.37-9.56, and in southern Illinois new crop bids were up 1.15 to 1.21 to range from 8.91-9.32.

WHEAT: The average price paid to producers of Soft Red Winter Wheat ended 87 cents higher this month. Wheat prices had more negative fundamental news than positive, but strength from the soybean market and export demand was enough to lift values. The USDA's December Supply Demand report placed the 2008-2009 wheat carryout at 623 million bushels, up from 603 million for November. This forecast was above trade expectations and helped to keep a lid on values. Carryout numbers for the World Supply Demand report also had an increase. Due to larger crops for the US and Canada, the world carryout was increased to 147.35 million metric tonnes, up from the 145.25 mmt estimate from November 2008. In the same Supply Demand report, the USDA did show an increase for the Canadian Wheat crop. Their estimate was increased from 27.3 mmt in November to 28.6 mmt in December. Though last year's export pace was very good, this year US shipments are running behind that pace. From the Grains Inspected and Weighed for Export report for the week ending December 25, 2008, there had been 654 million bushels shipped, compared to 785 million last year. The US export market had been slow in November, but began to pick up in early December. Though many believed US wheat was priced too high, the sharp decline in ocean freight could make them competitive. Also, positive news late in December was the concern with the wheat crop in Argentina. Due to hot and dry weather conditions their crop has been under stress. Late in December the Agriculture representatives in Argentina acknowledged their growing crop would be smaller than earlier estimates. The Illinois wheat crop was in relatively good shape in December. From the Illinois Ag Statistics Service, their report placed 67% of the Illinois wheat crop in Good to Excellent shape, with 30% Fair and only 3% Poor. Cash bids to producers at country elevators in southern Illinois bids were up 79 cents for the month to 5.14-5.34. New crop bids to producers at country elevators in central Illinois ended

# Eastern Cornbelt Direct Feeder Cattle

Compared to last month, Eastern Cornbelt (Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, and Ohio) feeder cattle sold mostly 4.00 to 11.00 lower. December's limited feeder cattle movement resulted from continued concerns about the US economy along with holiday shortened weeks. Demand and offerings light. December's supply was made up 24% steers; 12% heifers; 64% Holsteins; with 62% over 600 lbs.

Trade and demand mostly moderate. Offerings light to moderate. December's supply was made up 70% lambs; and 30% ewes. Total monthly sales were 2970 head of lambs and ewes, with an additional 4,793 head of goats.

# Eastern Cornbelt Hogs

Barrows and gilts in the Eastern Combelt on a carcass basis traded 3.20 lower from 39.50-49.25, with a weighted average price of 48.09. In Illinois on a live basis barrows and gilts sold from 32.00 to 35.00 in the month of December, mostly steady to 2.00 higher than last month. The pork carcass cutout value was 3.16 lower at 55.32. Year to date slaughter figures at the end of December totaled 115,470,000 head compared to 108,770,000 head last year.

For the month sows sold 8.50 to 11.00 higher. Slaughter boar prices were steady to firm. Trade was light to moderate throughout December. At the beginning of the month demand for light weight sows mostly moderate and very good for heavy weight sows. End of month demand light to moderate. Offerings were light to moderate.

The demand for Illinois hay was light to moderate, as sales activity was slow to moderate and prices were steady to weak. Hay sales this month have been slower due to holiday schedules and the sellers wanting to wait for the new tax year. The winter weather conditions have made the delivery of hay a challenge due to snow, ice and mud. The premium and good quality have have kept their value this month; however, some of the lower qualities have lost some of their value. Demand for straw was moderate to good, with most of the interest coming from the livestock interests

Northern: Northern Illinois hay trading was slow to moderate with prices steady to weak. Demand was light to moderate with moderate to heavy offerings. Straw prices were steady, with moderate demand and moderate offerings. Premium Alfalfa 160-200, 185-225 in big squares; Good Alfalfa 160-180, 175-190 in big squares, 100-120 in big rounds; Fair Alfalfa 120-140, 120-150 in big squares, 80-100 in big rounds; Utility Alfalfa 80-100, 100 in big squares. Premium Mix 160-180, 165-180 in big squares; Good Mix 140-170, 140-160 in big squares, 100-120 in big rounds; Fair Mix 120, 110 in big squares, 80-100 in big rounds; Utility 80-100, 80-100 in big squares, 60-80 in big rounds. Premium Grass 160-180; 140-180 in big squares; Good Grass 120-140, 120-140 in big squares and 80-100 in big rounds; Fair Grass 100-120, 100-120 in big squares, 80-100 in big rounds; Utility 80-100, 80-100 for big squares and 50-75 in big rounds. Straw prices were 2.00-2.50 per bale in small squares, 100-120 per ton in small squares, with large squares 70-90 and large rounds at 55.

Central: Central Illinois hay sales were slow to moderate with prices steady to weak. Demand was light to moderate with moderate to heavy offerings. Straw prices were steady, with moderate demand and light to moderate offerings.
