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#### Title: Accounting Practices and Principles

**Abstract:** Section 401 of the Postal Accountability and Enhancement Act required the Secretary of the Treasury to develop recommendations for accounting practices and principles that will govern the operation of the Postal Service's Competitive Products Funds and the determination of an assumed income tax to be imposed on competitive products' income. That report was provided to the Commission on December 19, 2007. Upon receipt of that report, 39 U.S.C. section 2011(h) requires the Commission to give the public the opportunity to comment on that report and tasks it with the responsibility to develop regulations to establish the accounting practices and principles to govern the operation of the Competitive Products' income. This regulation will fulfill the Commission's statutory responsibility with respect to those tasks.

## Regulatory Plan:

**Statement of Need:** A modern system of regulating rates and classes for market dominant products is required by the Postal Accountability and Enhancement Act. Congress tasked the Postal Regulatory Commission with the job of implementing that system. This system of regulations is the Commission's implementation of that congressional directive.

**Legal Basis:** The Postal Accountability and Enhancement Act section 201 states that "the Postal Regulatory Commission shall . . . by regulation establish (and may from time to time thereafter by regulation revise) a modern system for regulating rates and classes for market-dominant products."

**Alternatives:** There are no alternative methods of complying with the requirements of Postal Accountability and Enhancement Act section 201 other than by issuing regulations.

**Costs and Benefits:** The streamlined modern system of rate regulation for market dominant products is expected to reduce litigation costs for the Postal Service and its stakeholders. It is also expected to give the Postal Service more pricing flexibility and less volatility in ratemaking than under prior law.

**Risks:** There are no known risks to this regulatory action.

**Regulatory Plan:** 

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**Statement of Need:** The Postal Accountability and Enhancement Act directs the Commission to promulgate regulations to appropriately bound the Postal Service's discretion in setting rates for competitive products. This system of regulations is the Commission's implementation of that congressional directive.

**Legal Basis:** The Postal Accountability and Enhancement Act section 202 directs that "the Postal Regulatory Commission shall . . . promulgate (and may from time to time thereafter revise) regulations" to ensure that competitive products contribute their fair share to the Postal Service's finances.

**Alternatives:** There are no alternative methods of complying with the requirements of Postal Accountability and Enhancement Act section 202 other than by issuing regulations.

**Costs and Benefits:** The competitive products regulations are expected to make sure that the Postal Service is an effective competitor in the marketplace and that it has appropriate tools to carry out this task. The regulations are expected to reduce litigation costs for the Postal Service and its stakeholders and give more pricing flexibility and less volatility in ratemaking than under prior law.

Risks: There are no known risks to this regulatory action.
