Medals and Trophies

After the successful flights of the Wrights in France, where Wilbur won many cups and trophies, numerous awards and honors were conferred on Wilbur and Orville for their achievements, first in France and then in Great Britain. On their triumphant return from Europe in 1909, national, state, and city medals were awarded them in the United States.

Aero Club of America gold medals voted Wrights at a meeting of the Aero Club, November 2, 1908, and presented to them at a White House ceremony on June 10, 1909. The medals were designed by sculptor Victor D. Brenner and were struck at the Philadelphia Mint. The obverse side bears busts of Wilbur and Orville with their names and the dates and places of their most successful individual flights. The reverse shows one of the Wright airplanes in flight with the seal of the Aero Club at the bottom.

Congressional Medal awarded to the Wrights on March 4, 1909, and presented to them at a ceremony in Dayton, June 18, 1909. The obverse of the gold medal, designed by Charles E. Barber and George T. Morgan of the United States Mint, shows busts of the Wright brothers, their names, and the inscription "in recognition and appreciation of their ability, courage, and success in navigating the air." The reverse shows a winged figure with a torch, the Genius of Aviation, in flight and the inscription "shall mount up with wings as eagles."

The Langley Medal designed by J. C. Chaplain and awarded the Wrights by the Smithsonian Institution, February 10, 1909, "for advancing the science of aerodromics in its application to aviation by their successful investigations and demonstrations of the practicality of mechanical flight by man" and presented to them in a ceremony at the Smithsonian Institution, February 10. 1910. Obverse has names of Wilbur and Orville in center, the year 1909, and "Aerodromics." The reverse has words "per Orbem."

Wright Brothers Memorial Trophy, to be awarded annually in memory of the Wright brothers by the National Aeronautic Association, is presented for the first time on December 17, 1948. The trophy is a miniature silver replica of the Wright brothers' 1903 powered airplane, mounted on a replica of the commemorative boulder at Kitty Hawk that marks the takeoff point for the Wrights' first flights.
