Type 2

There were over 60 Type 2 Southwest Fire Fighter (SWFF) crews sponsored by the USDA Forest Service and USDI Bureau of Indian Affairs during 2000. The majority of these crews came from the White Mountain Apache, Navajo, Hopi, Hualapai, Yavapai Apache, Tohono O'Odham, San Carlos, Jicarilla, Concho, Mescalero, Black Mesa, Santo Domingo, Jemez, Zia, Zuni, Acoma, Laguna, San Felipe, Isleta, and Ramah Indian tribes in Arizona, New Mexico, and Oklahoma. Each crew consists of 20 personnel, including a crew boss and three squad bosses.

In addition to the Indian crews, the Southwest Area also provides Type 2 crews from commercial contract services, as well as crews made up of regular federal employees.

Assignments

The fire season of 2000 provided a number of opportunities to assign Southwest Area Firefighter (SWFF) crews to incidents. Prescott Fire Cache

The National Interagency Support Cache at Prescott is located approximately 8 miles north of Prescott, AZ at the Prescott Fire Center and Henry Y. H. Kim Aviation Facility. Administered by the Prescott National Forest, the cache's service area includes Arizona and the southern portions of Utah and Nevada. The cache services suppression and preparedness planning orders from a wide variety of Federal and state agencies. Cooperators include the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Bureau of Land Management, National Park Service, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, as well as the states of Arizona, Utah, California, and the country of Mexico.

Like several other parts of the nation, the 2000 season at Prescott was one of high support activity levels. A Presidential visit to the Grand Canyon in March started the season. Large fire support began in eastern Arizona in April in the timbered higher elevations as well as in the lower southern deserts. In May and June fire activity increased and spread northward to the Utah border. In addition, Prescott was providing supplies both directly and indirectly to New Mexico, most notably to the Cerro Grande fire. Within the geographical area, the cache serviced ten Type 1 and Type 2 incidents. As large incident activity decreased within the cache's service area by the beginning of August, the bulk of Prescott's supplies and equipment were shipped to the Great Basin and Northern Rockies geographical areas. The La Paz flood response managed by the State of Arizona and the Federal Emergency Management Agency occupied cache personnel in October. The last few months of the 2000 season at Prescott were spent refurbishing and restocking the inventory.

Silver City Fire Cache

The Silver City Fire Cache is located about 20 miles south of Silver City, New Mexico at the Grant County Airport. The cache is administered through the Gila National Forest in Silver City, NM. It consists of approximately 10,000 square feet of floor space divided among seven buildings. The geographic area of coverage for the cache includes New Mexico, western Texas, and southeast Arizona. The Cache is involved in both suppression and pre-suppression orders. Cooperator agencies supported by the cache include the Bureau of Land Management, National Park Service, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Fish and Wildlife Service, as well as the States of New Mexico, Arizona, and Texas.

The 2000 fire season was preceded by drought conditions throughout the geographic area and we were expecting a very heavy fire season. As a result, we had one of the heaviest fire seasons on record.

During 2000 the cache supported six Type 1 and six Type 2 incidents in the Southwest Area, plus a multitude of Type III and Miscellaneous ABC incidents. After the rains came to the region, we began supporting other regions by shipping supplies and personnel to Colorado, Idaho, and Montana.
