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Kansas Family Chronicles More Than 100 Years of Weather Observations

NWS Dodge City, KS, honored four generations of Herlan S. Jennison's family in a ceremony marking the family's 104 years of volunteer weather observations. The Jennisons were recognized as "Heritage" volunteer observers for their more than 100 years of service at Healy, KS.

"The millions of bits of weather data collected by volunteer observers around the country have enabled weather scientists and researchers to analyize U.S. weather and climate records vital to short and long term forecasting," said Brig. Gen.

(Ret.) David L. Johnson, Director of NOAA's National Weather Service.

"Before we can understand how the world's climate functions, we have to know how the climate functions in our own country. The availability of information collected for 100 years and more is a prime example of the determination and spirit Americans have demonstrated since the country was founded by a group of forefathers that included

weather observers," said Johnson.

Larry Ruthi, NWS Meteorologist in Charge (MIC) and John Orgler, Data Acquisition Program Manager (DAPM), NWS Dodge City, KS, presented the Family Heritage Award to the Jennison family at a ceremony held on December 6.

"Volunteers like the Jennison family are crucial to NWS operations," Ruthi said. "Of the more than 10,000 volunteer observers around

the country contributing to the daily collection of weather data needed to maintain forecasting parameters and climatological records, only a select few have been in operation for 100 years or more. That is a small amount of time when compared to the planet's existence, but covers a significant portion of North American history."

Since 1901, Herlan S. Jennison and his descendents have provided the nation's weather forecasters with precipitation/temperature data for the Healy observing station. Since the station was created, some 16 family members have taken part in the volunteer program to maintain an unbroken record

of weather observations. Jennison established the original observing station in 1901 at Farnsworth, about 4 miles northeast of Healy, and kept records until August 1903.

Herlan, then 24-years-old, ceded duties to his brother, Charles Jennison, from 1903 to 1914. Charles remained in Farnsworth while Herlan moved to Healy to help establish the First Bank

What's It Take to Win a Dick Hagemeyer and Thomas Jefferson Award in One Day?

Dr. Dalias Price, observer at Charleston, IL, for the past 45 years, was presented the Thomas Jefferson Award and the Dick Hagemeyer Award by NWS Lincoln, IL, MIC Ernie Goetsch. The presentation was made at Cooperative Observer Appreciation Day this fall with many fellow observers and family members in attendance.

Price, 92, has operated the Charleston observing station since April 23, 1960, recording daily precipitation and temperature data. An instructor of meteorology, climatology and geography at Eastern Illinois University, Price has not missed

a single observation in his more than 45 years as a cooperative observer.

Weather records retain their importance through time. Long and continuous records provide an accurate picture of a locale's normal weather and give climatologists and others a basis for predicting future trends. These data are invaluable for scientists studying floods, droughts and heat and cold waves.

The first extensive network of cooperative stations was formed as part of the newly established U.S. Weather Bureau, created in an 1890 act of Congress. Many of the stations have even longer histories. John Campanius Holm's weather records, taken without benefit of instruments in 1644 and 1645, were the earliest recorded U.S. observations.

Many historic figures maintained weather records, including Benjamin Franklin, George Washington and Thomas Jefferson.

Jefferson maintained an almost unbroken record of observations between 1776 and 1816. The Holm and Jefferson Awards are named for these weather observation pioneers. **Z**

of Healy. Herlan resumed observations when the station was moved back to Healy in 1914. Herlan's wife Katherine and his six children served as backups.

In 1944, Herlan's son Robert took over the station with his wife Tillie and their two children as backups. When Robert died in 1977, Tillie agreed to be the primary observer with Robert's brother Harold as substitute. In 1980, Tillie passed the job on to Harold's son-in-law, Stephen Fenster. Stephen's wife Lois and son Kurt served as assistants.

Vowing to continue the family's record-setting volunteer service, Stephen and Lois are the current volunteer observers at Healy, reporting daily temperature, precipitation and snow data. Copies of all the family's weather observations, dating back to 1902, are stored at the First Bank of Healy.

Stephen and Lois received their 25 Year Service Award with their Family Heritage Award. Aaron Von Schriltz, Lois's cousin, received his 15 Year Award as a back-up observer. Aaron is keeping weather data collection history in the family. **Z**

Butch Morgison Hits 55 and 100

Weather Instruments Broken? Try Chickweed

The following article was published in the Orleans Sentinel Standard, July 11, 1856.

Natural Barometers: Chickweed is an excellent barometer. When the flower expands fully, we are not to expect rain for several hours; should it continue in that state, no rain will disturb the summer's day. When it half conceals its miniature flower, the day is generally showery; but if it entirely shuts up, or veils the white flower with its green mantle, let the traveler put on his great coat. The different species of Trefols always contract their leaves at the approach of a storm; so certainly does this take place, that these plants acquired the name of the husbandman's barometer.

The tulip, and several of the compound yellow flowers, all close before rain. There is a species of wood sorrel, which doubles its leaves before storms. The Bauhinia, or mountain ebony, capital and sensitive plants, observe the same habits. **Z**

Thomas Jefferson Award

Recognizing almost 58 Years of service, NWS has named Seymour, IN, resident Ruth E. Everhart a recipient of the Thomas Jefferson Award for outstanding service in the Cooperative Weather Observer Program. This award is the agency's most prestigious. In 2005, only nine Jefferson Awards were presented to volunteer weather observers across the country.

MIC John Ogren, NWS Indianapolis, presented the award to Ruth at her home. In attendance were Ruth's husband Bud and her entire family, along with NWS Indianapolis staff members Michael Shartran and Albert Shipe. Albert has worked closely with Ruth since early in his career and nominated her for the award.

Ruth, 85, established the Seymour station on November 1947, recording daily precipitation and temperature data as well as providing stage levels on the East Fork White River when needed. Known as the area weather expert, Ruth has provided weather information to generations of Seymour area residents. **Z**


