LATEST FARM BILL NEWS

Public information regarding the new Farm Bill is very limited. Although speculation is abundant, there is not yet a program to present to producers. With the new bill, any information relating to program payments and provisions will not be available until regulations are written and sign-up is announced. Until then, other program areas directly affected by the farm bill cannot be addressed. Only the 2005-2007 Disaster Programs and 2008 Wool and Mohair program can be signed up at this time.

DATES TO REMEMBER

- January 31, 2008 Last day to request 2007 Wool and Mohair Loans and LDPs
- March 15, 2008 Deadline to purchase NAP coverage on spring non-insurable crops
- March 15, 2008 Deadline for accepting 2008 crop MAL and LDP requests for ungraded wool and mohair
- March 31, 2008 Deadline for 2007 Wheat and Honey loans and LDPs
- May 31, 2008 Final date to request 2007 Corn and Soybean Loans and LDPs

DISASTER PROGRAMS NOW INCLUDE THE 2007 CROP YEAR!

2005-2007 CROP DISASTER PROGRAM (CDP)

CDP provides benefits to farmers who suffered 35% quantity and 25% quality losses to 2005 or 2006 or 2007 crops. Producers who incurred qualifying losses in 2005, 2006 and 2007 will receive payment for the one year in which the benefit is the highest. Only producers who obtained crop insurance coverage or coverage under the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) for the year of loss will be eligible for CDP benefits.

Signup for the 2005-2007 CDP quantity losses began October 15, 2007. No deadline has been announced. Signup for CDP quality losses will be announced at a future date. A quality loss of 25% or greater is needed to qualify. In determining production, participants must supply verifiable and reliable production records to substantiate production to the FSA county committee. FSA uses RMA (crop insurance) loss records for insured crops where available and determined to be accurate. FSA includes all harvested production, unharvested appraised production, and assigned production for the total planted acreage of the crop unit to determine production under CDP. The maximum CDP benefits a person may receive is \$80,000. CDP requires a 35 percent loss of expected production; therefore, you may be eligible for a payment even if it was determined that the loss was not great enough under NAP or RMA coverage. LIVESTOCK COMPENSATION PROGRAM

A Livestock Compensation Program (LCP) is part of this disaster legislation. LCP compensates producers for feed losses resulting from natural disasters occurring between **January 1, 2005 and December 31, 2007**. To be eligible counties MUST have a *secretarial determination* for that specific weather event. You must have had a loss of pasture and/ or have receipts of purchased extra feed. Receipts must be signed by the vendor and must include vendor's name, address and telephone #. Type and quantity and cost of the feed purchased is required to be included on the receipt. These receipts must be original copies.

PLEASE NOTE: for future disaster program eligibility, it may be in your best interest to purchase NAP and/or crop insurance for 2008 and future crop years.

USDA - NATURAL RESOURCE CONSERVATION SERVICE STAFF CHANGES

If you have not visited the Natural Resources Conservation Service Office in the last year, you would not have noticed some new faces. They are Julius Pigott and Misa Cady. Julius transferred from Jackson County in January 2007 and Misa transferred from Pennsylvania in the summer of 2006. They have been busy administrating the various programs under the 2002 Farm Bills.

There are still opportunities for land owners or land users to take advantage of cost share assistance to construct Waste Storage Facilities, Agrichemical Containment Facilities, Grassed Waterways, Filter Strips and Buffer Strips. In addition, there are incentive payments to practice Nutrient and Pest Management, No-Till Farming and Prescribed Grazing.

INGHAM CONSERVATION DISTRICT OFFERS THE FARM*A*SYST PROGRAM TO AREA LANDOWNERS

The Farm*A*Syst Program is being offered through ICD to residents of Ingham and Livingston Counties. This program is available to anyone whom owns a farmstead (no matter what size, farms can be from $\frac{1}{2}$ acre to several thousand acres) in the service area. The program is designed to ensure you and your families are protected with an emergency plan in the event of an emergency such as a fire or chemical spill. Also, by participating you will discuss topics such as fuel, fertilizer and pesticide storage and usage, if applicable, at your farm. The technician has several items they can disperse at no-charge to help enhance your safety and your operation's efficiency. By participating landowners can learn about, and protect the environment as well. Some of the items that the technician can offer at no charge include: emergency tubes/plans, spill kits (fire extinguisher, tyvek suit, gloves, safety glasses, Dri-rite, shovel, broom/dustpan, and respirator), placards, fuels tank

labels, signs, triple rinse nozzles with bags and more. This is a great service that ICD encourages everyone to take advantage of. The service is paid for by taxes on fertilizers and is a <u>free and confidential</u> program. CLU CERTIFICATION

The Ingham/Livingston FSA staff is continuing to work on correcting the CLU maps and updating Farm Records. We are making good progress and appreciate your patience during this long and detailed process. The certification process involves many steps including cross referencing existing Farm Records with the data from the imagery. Some records are accurate and need very little adjustment, however others need considerable adjusting. We are making the corrections on a farm by farm basis, land owners and/or operators will receive notification of any needed action as we proceed. Acreage may increase, decrease, or stay the same after CLU is certified. If the acreage changes, the change must be recorded in the system to ensure that farm records are properly maintained.

RECONSTITUTION REMINDER...

What Are the Available Methods of Division?

Estate Method

The estate method is the division of bases for a parent farm among heirs in settling an estate.

Designation by Landowner Method

The designation by landowner method is the division of bases in the manner agreed to by the parent farm owner and purchaser or transferee.

DCP Cropland Method

The DCP cropland method is the division of bases in the same proportion that the DCP cropland for each resulting tract relates to the DCP cropland on the parent tract.

Default Method

The default method is the division of bases for a parent farm with each tract maintaining the bases attributed to the tract level when the reconstitution is initiated in the system.

REMEMBER TO NOTIFY FSA:

In order for us to serve you better, please contact our office with any record changes in your farming operation such as:

Development – any new parcels of land removed for houses needs to be reported.

Owner/Operator – report any changes in land ownership, tenants or crop share agreements. *Reconstitutions* – changes that require farm combinations or divisions due to sale of land or change in operators should be reported as soon as possible.

Farm Operating Plan – Any changes to the farming operation that my have an effect on "person"

and/or "actively engaged" determinations. *Update AD-1026* – when you pick up any new acreage, or plan to clear, drain, or put in tile on existing cropland. Making these changes without prior approval by NRCS can result in loss of USDA program benefits.

Address – Any contact information change should be updated for notification purposes.

Direct Deposit – If you have changed an accounts or bank, updates are needed to ensure payments are deposited correctly and in a timely manor.

WOOL AND MOHAIR



The final date to request a loan or LDP on wool or mohair harvested in 2007, is January 31, 2008. Since the market price has been below the loan rate there has been a loan deficiency payment in effect.

The 2008 wool and mohair season has started. Sheep owners must come in to sign a CCC-633EZ prior to selling their 2008 production. Please call for an appointment.

Foreign Landowners Reporting Requirement

The Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act (AFIDA) requires all foreign owners of U.S. agricultural land to report their holdings to the Secretary of Agriculture. The Farm Service Agency administers this program for USDA. Foreign persons who have purchased or sold agricultural land in the county are required to report the transaction to FSA within 90 days of the closing. Failure to submit the AFIDA form could result in civil penalties of up to 25% of the fair market value of the property. County government offices, realtors, attorneys and others involved in real estate transactions are reminded to notify foreign investors of these reporting requirements.

THINKING OF TILING OR CLEARING LAND?

Don't forget the Highly Erodible Land and Wetland Provisions. Bringing new land into production by **clearing trees, improving drainage by tiling or dredging are potential violations of the HEL/WC rules**. Before you begin any land conversion project, please come into the county office to file form AD-1026. Natural Resources Conservation Service will make an evaluation of your land to determine how to manage the wet areas of your land most efficiently. Checking ahead of time will help keep you eligible for USDA benefits.
