Coalition Status and Sustainability

- Current Status
 - Coordinator is very part-time
- Membership Structure/Strategies
 - Anyone who indicates interest is added to our mailing list
 - News articles, meeting and event announcements, grant opportunities are passed on
 - Membership dues requested for 2008Sponsor: \$500/yr Partner: \$200/yr Individual: \$25/yr
- Steps to Become Self-Sustaining
 - Search for a dedicated coordinator within an existing organization
 - Collection of dues



Significant/Noteworthy Vehicle Projects

- Allied Waste increased biodiesel use
- City of Nampa added biodiesel
- Boise City Twenty Mile South Farm trying to add biodiesel
- Ada County Highway District considering biodiesel







Significant/Noteworthy Fueling Infrastructure Projects

- 2006 DOE biodiesel grant; \$289,000 for infrastructure projects; 10+ stations in the Treasure Valley and about 5 in northern Idaho
- 2007 Idaho grant (BIG) program established; \$690,000 for biofuel infrastructure projects; expect about 25 new fueling locations statewide; 3 in the Treasure Valley
- New E85 station in the Treasure Valley; 1 in Lewiston, ID
- Interest in opening "green" fuel stations

Significant/Noteworthy Coalition Outreach Activities

- E85 pump opening promotion
- Outreach to teachers
- Tours of the ethanol and biodiesel plants



- Presentations to agricultural groups (Idaho Oilseed Commission, Idaho & E. Oregon Seed Association)
- Developed a flier for fuel distributors on biofuel information in the 2007 energy bill
- INL presentation on cellulosic ethanol technology
- U of Idaho presentation on its biodiesel research efforts



Significant/Noteworthy Expanded Portfolio Activities

- Hybrids added to fleets
 Idaho State
 Boise City
- E10 offered at more public stations; from 21 to 77 stations
- E10 being substituted for gasoline in Boise City Public Works tanks



Partnerships/Lessons Learned

- Coordinated with Yellowstone-Teton Coalition to discuss biofuels with Idaho Legislature and in public forums during the legislative session
- Will be promoting biofuels during Air Quality Awareness Week
- Will be working more closely with the State Purchasing Department
