Welcome to Fall in Philadelphia! You have chosen the perfect time to explore "America's most historic square mile." A great place to start your adventure is at the Independence Visitor Center on 6th & Market Streets. Here you can browse through several one-of-a-kind exhibits, pick up your free tickets to Independence Hall (be sure to come early because these free tickets go fast!), purchase tickets to an array of Philadelphia attractions and events, or grab a snack at the Pennsylvania General Store to fuel up for the rest of your busy day.

Once you are out and about, you may choose to visit the Betsy Ross House, home of the famous seamstress. Tour this historic home, meet Betsy herself, or catch a free performance in the cobblestone courtyard (see page 6 for more info). If you continue heading down Arch Street, make a left onto 2nd Street and escape the bustling 21stcentury city life for a few moments as you head down Elfreth's Alley. This quaint cobblestone alley is the oldest continuously inhabited street in all of America! If you continue back down 2nd Street you will see the Steeple of Christ Church. Once the tallest structure in North America, this church was the place of worship for many prominent Philadelphians including Benjamin Franklin. Not everything in Historic Philadelphia dates back to the 1800s. In fact, there are some modern day treasures just waiting for you to come and visit! One of these treasures is the National Constitution Center located on 5th & Arch Streets. This interactive museum takes a fresh look at the famous Colonial parchment and relates its words and ideas to each and every one of us. Starting from the founding of our country to modern day issues, the museum features many exhibits like the brand new 9/11: A Nation Remembers which opens on September 8th.

Directly across the street from the National Constitution Center is the historic district's newest addition,

Franklin Square (see page 6 for more info). This historic urban park recently underwent a huge transformation

from an abandoned square to the gem that it is today. Challenge your friends and family to Philly Mini Golf, an 18-hole miniature golf course featuring some of Philly's most beloved landmarks or take a ride on the Philadelphia Park Liberty Carousel. 

INDEPENDENCE HALL

To see Independence Hall, begin at the Independence Visitor Center and obtain your FREE, timed tickets to see the Hall. Early arrivals have the best chance of getting tickets for the time of their choice. Allow about 45 minutes to go through security in Old City Hall at 5th & Chestnut Streets. Note: use the restrooms in the Visitor Center or across the street from Old City Hall, because there are no restrooms inside the secure area.

SERVICES

The Independence Park Institute is now open. The park offers hands-on curriculum based education programs for grades K-12 in our innovative Learning Labs at the Independence Living History Center - 3rd and Chestnut Streets. Language Services

Franklin Printing Office

320-322 Market Street

Franklin made his fortune and influenced people through the power of the press. Park Rangers use a reproduction 18th-century printing press to demonstrate the art and craft of printing. Find out why Franklin was so successful as a printer and writer. View the restored Subscription office of his grandson, Benjamin Franklin Bache, a leading member of the opposition press during Washington's presidency. You can buy printings of Franklin's quotes; his "Join or Die" cartoon and other related broadsides. Handicapped accessible, restrooms nearby. Daily 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

B Free Franklin Post Office

316 Market Street

The United States Post Office operates this special postal station in honor of our first Post Master General-Benjamin Franklin. You can buy commemorative stamps and mail postcards or letters with their unique cancellation which uses a facsimile of Franklin's own signature. This is the only U.S. Post Office without a modern ZIP code.



Carpenters' Hall

320 Chestnut Street

Built in 1770, Carpenters' Hall hosted the First Continental Congress in September 1774. This relatively short meeting served as a necessary precursor to the Second Continental Congress and the *Declaration of Independence*. *Tues.-Sun. 10 a.m.-4 p.m.*

Bishop White House/Todd House

309 Walnut Street-Bishop White House 4th & Walnut Streets-Todd House

Ranger-led tours help visitors explore the social world of 18th-century Philadelphia through the eyes of the White and Todd families. Details on tours are available at the Independence Visitor Center.

City Tavern

2nd & Walnut Streets
