On March 24th, staff from the NOAA Marine Debris Program partnered with the <u>Olympic Coast National</u> <u>Marine Sanctuary</u> (OCNMS) to give a presentation on marine debris sources, impacts, and cleanup efforts. The presentation was held at the flagship Seattle location of the local outdoor co-operative REI. Afterwards, NOAA staff answered questions and distributed informational materials on marine debris.

This presentation was coordinated with partners of the upcoming <u>Washington Coast Cleanup Day</u>, to be held on April 26th. This annual event, held in conjunction with Earth Day, is coordinated by the Washington Clean Coast Alliance, an organization initially established with support from the NOAA Marine Debris Program, and now a partner organization. Last year, over 700 volunteers conducted cleanups on over 30 beaches across the Washington coast, removing over 20 tons of debris.


The NOAA ship OSCAR ELTON SETTE is currently making its way due north from the island of Oahu, HI towards the Subtropical Convergence Zone in the North Pacific in search of marine debris. Exerpts:

from March 28, 2008 - "...It helped that the sea was extracalm today. At one point we were seeing so much debris that the data entry person was back-logged. It was just one patch, and you couldn't say it was debris-filled, but instead of seeing a piece of debris every half hour, we saw



something every 5 or 10 minutes. You hate to be excited to see debris, but it's nice to get the practice in."


from March 27, 2008 - "...Today, we spotted 3 or 4 buoys, one with a bird floating on it. I'm including a photo of one so you can see how challenging it is to see with the naked eye. Naturally, the magnification is not real—I just blew it up in Photoshop. But you can get an idea of how important the binoculars' magnification is. It's also tough to see anything just below the surface of the water unless you're almost on top of it, between the sun reflecting on ripples and the whitecaps. Today the seas were much calmer than yesterday, so the whitecaps weren't nearly as big a challenge."

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North Pacific Marine Debris Research Cruise Completed

The NOAA ship OSCAR ELTON SETTE returned to port on April 9th from a voyage to the North Pacific. Marine debris observations and tagging, and testing of a new unmanned aerial vehicle were among the various missions for this cruise, led by the <u>Ecosystems and Oceanography</u> <u>Division</u> of the NOAA Pacific Islands Fisheries Science Center (PIFSC). Partners in this successful effort and project include: NOAA PIFSC, Papahanaumokuakea Marine National Monument, Airborne Technologies, Inc., NOAA Southwest Fisheries Science Center, NOAA National Environmental Satellite, Data, and Information Service, and the NOAA Marine Debris Program.



Exerpts from blog: from April 6, 2008 - "...This whole UAS concept grew out of the <u>GhostNet</u> project, which began around 2001 to explore the use of remote sensing, from satellites and aircraft, to map marine debris in the North Pacific Ocean. It

was a partnership of ATI, Inc., and part of NOAA Satellites, Fisheries, and Research. The satellite imagery was used to map the oceanographic conditions that would concentrate debris, and the airborne remote sensing would spot the debris..."

from April 2, 2008 - "...The unanimous feeling was that this particular piece of debris would be more valuable staying in the water and telling us where it moves than on board in the pink container. A tracking buoy can communicate its location for an indefinite period of time; it's powered by solar panels..."

from March 29, 2008 - "...The idea is something like this: the DELI maps will indicate where we should aim, the ship's fluorometer counts will indicate when we hit the high-chlorophyll areas identified on the DELI maps, the Big Eyes will signal when we're actually seeing a lot of debris, and the Malolo I will fly over areas that seem to have high debris density to compare what can be seen from the air with what can be seen from the flying bridge of the ship. When one of these platforms (the Malolo or the Big Eyes crew) spots a good-sized bundle of fishing gear, one of the small boats will approach it and truly ground-truth (oceantruth?) the observations. ."

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
Volunteers Learn Connection between Land-Based Trash and Marine Debris

On Saturday, April 26th, the NOAA Marine Debris Program will join volunteer teams representing 70 local organizations at Frederick, **Maryland's 7th annual BIG Sweep**. The BIG Sweep is a collaborative walk-a-thon to raise funds for area non-profit community groups, but instead of just walking, teams of volunteers clean up roadsides and parks throughout Frederick County. Each year BIG Sweep teams collectively raise nearly \$50,000 to support their causes and clean up as much as 22 tons of trash and 600 tires. The NOAA Marine Debris Program will be kicking off the event with a presentation to BIG Sweep clean-up volunteers about the connection between land-based trash and marine debris, and its devastating effects on marine wildlife and ecosystems. The goal of the presentation is to help volunteers realize that their clean-up efforts have a far greater impact than just beautifying their local roadways, and will help to reduce and prevent the occurrence of debris in coastal Maryland and the Chesapeake Bay.

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Washington Coast Cleanup Day



April 26th is Washington Coast Cleanup Day when hundreds of volunteers have registered to participate in this Earth Day weekend effort to remove marine debris from the beaches of Washington's Outer Coast. The NOAA Marine Debris Program is involved in this cleanup, which is coordinated by the Washington Clean Coast Alliance, of which Olympic Coast National Marine Sanctuary is an active member. Formation of the Washington Clean Coast Alliance resulted from a strategic planning effort funded by a grant from the NOAA Marine Debris Program. Jacqueline Laverdure, sanctuary Education Specialist, will be providing programs at Kalaloch Beach on Friday night and Saturday. Other sanctuary staff, including Norma Klein, Carol Bernthal, and Liam Antrim, will be coordinating volunteers are different segments of the coast.

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Ship Wreck Removal Ongoing in Rota, CNMI



The Island of Rota in the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands recently initiated a vessel debris removal project with support and funding from the NOAA Office of Response and Restoration, the NOAA Marine Debris Program, and the NOAA Coral Conservation Program. The 140-foot F/V Nam Sung #62 wrecked on Rota in 1982. Salvage attempts failed and the vessel slowly deteriorated, scattering jagged steel debris along the shoreline and adjacent coral reefs. The OR&R Abandoned Vessel Project surveyed the vessel and debris field in 2003 and recommended that the vessel should be a high priority for removal because of the sensitive habitats and public uses of the area. In 2007 the local Coastal Zone Management Office developed a cooperative project with other local agencies, a local construction firm, donated labor, and community volunteers to remove the wreckage. A small NOAA grant from the NOAA Marine Debris Program helped to offset the cost of fuel and materials. Thus far approximately 80 tons of steel debris have been removed from the shoreline and lagoon. 

"New Hampshire has only 18 miles of coastline, yet in 2006, more than 11,000 pounds of trash were collected during cleanups of area beaches. according to marine debris research done at the University of New Hampshire. Marine debris research began at UNH in 2006 with grants from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Marine Debris Program. Researchers worked closely with Jen Kennedy, of the Blue Ocean Society for Marine Conservation, and Ken LaValley, of New Hampshire Sea Grant... During a three-to-five year period, volunteers from Blue Ocean Society's Adopt-a-Beach Program had collected litter and debris from 14 beaches that UNH researchers have since examined for trends. The waste was divided into three categories: land, ocean and general..."

More than 70% of British beach debris is plastic
