The Games Through the Eyes of Our Children

ayne Auburn "Trrey" Jones III, 14, from Chattanooga, Tenn., sits patiently, aiming his camera for the perfect shot while his grandfather prepares his air gun for his first round of competition. Although he's used to seeing his grandfather hold a rifle because the two deer hunt together, this time he's a little more anxious because he wants to see him medal in air guns.

Wayne Jones, an Army veteran of Vietnam from Elizabethton, Tenn., is participating in his seventh National Veterans Wheelchair Games. Wayne is competing in bowling, archery and air guns, and he's proud to have grandson Trrey by his side for the second time.

"My grandfather loves to compete so the Games are great for him," Trrey said, smiling. "He absolutely hates to lose at anything. When we bowl, he always beats me. He usually bowls about 145 to my 100. And the whole time we go back and forth at each other. I can never pick up a spare because I always throw gutter balls. He always tells me I couldn't hit the broad side of a barn."

That bantering spirit continues as Wayne turns and adds, "Most people let the kids win, but not me. Life is not easy. If you make it easy for them they expect it to be easy all the time. If he ever beats me, he beats me fair and square and he knows he deserves the win."

Trrey nods his head in agreement. "Last year when we went to St. Louis, I expected Grandfather to medal in each of his events. He came home with two out of three so that wasn't bad," Trrey said. "This

year, I expect he will medal in everything. He's gotten into a rhythm now." For both Joneses, training for the Games includes many hours of air guns and practicing archery. "My job when we practice archery is shagging (retrieving arrows) and helping him adjust his bow direction," said Trrey. "I watch to see where the arrows go so he can adjust his sites to direct the arrows better to the target."

The Games are really neat," Trrey said. "It's similar to the





Durable Medical Equipment: Located in the Hilton Hotel, Carver Room, second level. Open today from noon–10 p.m., and tomorrow from 5–11 a.m.

Internet Café: The Internet Café is located in Room 101G at the Convention Center. It will be closing at 1 p.m. today. Ten computers and one printer are available, compliments of longtime Games sponsor Hewlett-Packard. Be sure to tell your friends and family back home about the Games web site. Results, news releases and photos are posted at *www.wheelchairgames.org*.

Medical Emergencies and Assistance: The medical suite is located in Room 101F of the Convention Center. It is open from 7 a.m. until all events are completed. The medical staff treats athletes for minor injuries or illnesses. A life-threatening emergency requires an emergency call to 911. Medical support at the Hilton Hotel is in Room 1636 from 7:30 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. Please note, there are no "house calls" to athletes' rooms. A Games physician and registered nurse are on call each night *for athletes only* and can be reached by calling the hotel operator. In the event of a life-threatening emergency, ask the hotel operator to dial 911. Medical staff are also present at each Games venue, easily identified by their red shirts with a white cross on the back. Severe injuries or illnesses will be referred to the Minneapolis VA Medical Center or a local emergency facility, if necessary.

Wheelchair Repair: Located at the Hilton Hotel, Hennepin Room, second level, through today, from 8 a.m. until all events are over, and tomorrow at the hotel and at the airport until all athletes have departed.

Departure Information



HILTON AND HYATT HOTELS NORTHWEST AIRLINES PASSENGER DEPARTURE PROCESS

For those departing tomorrow, Northwest Airlines agents will be present starting today at 6:30 p.m. to affix flight tags to your luggage and to issue you and your traveling party boarding passes. This procedure will ensure that your gear will be brought directly to Northwest Airlines. Once you arrive at the airport, you will be able to go directly to security and the departure gate. So to take advantage of this process, please do the following:

1. Set all of your luggage and equipment outside your door between 5 and 7 p.m. today. Hotel staff will take it to the Marquette/LaSalle room at the Hilton Hotel.

2. After 7 p.m., go to the Marquette/LaSalle Room at the Hilton to identify your luggage so that it can be tagged with your flight number and you may receive your boarding pass. You must have identification with you and you must bring all who are traveling with you to receive their boarding passes.

3. Tomorrow, plan to take the bus to the airport to arrive at the Transit Center at least two hours before your scheduled flight departs. With your boarding pass you will be able to go to security for check-in and then go directly to your departure gate.

FOR PASSENGERS FLYING OTHER THAN NORTHWEST AIRLINES, FOLLOW PROCESS BELOW FOR YOUR JULY 2 DEPARTURE:

1. Please have your luggage outside your rooms between 5 and 7 p.m. today. Hotel staff will pick up your luggage and equipment and take it to the airport.

2. Tomorrow, plan to take the bus to the airport to arrive at the Transit Center at least three hours before your scheduled flight departs. A volunteer will escort you to your airline ticket counter to identify your luggage and issue your boarding pass.

Great Games on a Great Lake in 2007

Make plans to join your fellow athletes at "the gathering place by the waters," June 18-24, 2007. The city of Milwaukee will host the 27th National Veterans Wheelchair Games.

Since Milwaukee hosted the 2nd Games back in 1982, this will be a return visit for some our longtime athletes. It was again chosen as a host in recognition of the VA medical center's long-standing tradition of care for spinal cord injured veterans, and its strong partnership with the Wisconsin Chapter of the Paralyzed Veterans of America.

Among the top 20 largest cities in the United States, Milwaukee borders the western shore of Lake Michigan just 90 miles north of Chicago. Its skilled workforce and concentration of industry, cultural resources and educational institutions make it one of the nation's most vibrant metropolitan areas.

While Milwaukee offers much to do and see, it is distinguished by the genuine hospitality of its people. The city celebrates its melting pot heritage throughout the year with ethnic and cultural festivals that are colorful tributes to a cherished past. Mid- to late June is an especially great time to visit, since a number of special activities and festivals take place at that time.

One is the start of *Summerfest*, the world's largest music festival. The eleven-day event features a variety of music from national headline acts to up-and-comers, on 12 different stages. *Jazz in the Park* is held at Cathedral Square Park every Thursday evening.

The Riverwalk on the Milwaukee River features boat

docks, pavilions and promenades. Here, you can enjoy gondola rides, river cruises, great food and concerts. Or you can relax at one of the many microbreweries and brew pubs, or take a tour of the Miller Brewing Company.

Located minutes from downtown Milwaukee, Potawatomi Bingo Casino is a showcase for high stakes bingo, offering the nation's highest daily payouts, blackjack, craps, roulette and more than 1,000 slot machines.

Miller Park is the home of the **Milwaukee Brewers.** This state-of-the-art ballpark reflects the architectural heritage of the city and Wisconsin, while keeping a sense of baseball's rich traditions.

Legacy Lifts Up Richmond Veteran

Novice athlete Rodney Sample had a little extra help getting to his first National Veterans Wheelchair Games this year.

Sample has been awarded this year's Rosenberg Athletic Scholarship, a grant of up to \$1,000 that is given each year to a first-time athlete receiving care at a VA facility who would not otherwise be able to participate in his or her first Games. The recipient is selected each year by the Director of the National Veterans Wheelchair Games and VA's Under Secretary for Health, based on recommendations of a formal selection committee. Now in its third year, the Rosenberg Athletic Scholarship is based not on potential to win, but on enthusiasm, a proven record of positive therapeutic performance and "guts."

"I'm honored and shocked to receive this scholarship," said Sample, when he learned of his selection. "I don't think I would be in Minneapolis if it hadn't been for this generosity. I've been anxiously looking forward to getting to Minneapolis, competing, meeting new friends and taking part in the camaraderie. I'd like to thank my two special recreation therapists for all their guidance, help and motivation for helping me get here ... it means so much to me."

One supporter, who was thrilled about Sample's selection, is Megan Brandis, one of his recreation therapists at the McGuire VA Medical Center in Richmond, Va. "Rodney absolutely deserves this scholarship," Brandis said. "Rodney has a very steady disposition. He's relaxed, friendly, positive and always dedicated to his rehabilitation."

Brandis finds Sample to be an inspiration to work with. "First and foremost, he is competitive with himself," she said. "He has an intellectual maturity with a magnetic personality and beautiful smile... this scholarship will help continue in those gains. I'm so happy that he is the recipient and will be at the Wheelchair Games."

The scholarship was established in 2002 by the Honorable Robin L. Higgins, VA's former Under Secretary for Memorial Affairs, in honor of her grandfather, Michael Rosenberg, and her father, Dr. Norman Ross. Rosenberg was a WWII veteran who was a triple amputee. He received care in both military and VA facilities, and bravely supported his family until he succumbed to his wounds in 1933 at the age of 34. His son, Dr. Norman Ross, went on to serve in the Navy in WWII, and, despite being a disabled veteran himself, received three degrees under the GI Bill. Ross spent his lifetime giving back to society as a teacher and a coach.

An award application was developed and is now included in the Games' registration package. Applications can be submitted by a VA doctor, therapist, or team coach to the National Director of the Wheelchair Games.

Dear Dr. Dan:


I have only been injured for less than a year. I used to be active in sports, but I've been wondering if it is such a good idea to try sports from a wheelchair. What are the real health benefits in doing this?

- Wondering in Waco

Dear Wondering:

It's a wonderful idea for you to continue your sports activities after your injury. Physical activity is a very important part of rehabilitation, both physically and mentally. Plus, playing sports has great health benefits for everyone, whether they use a wheelchair or not.

Sports allow you to better condition your body by enhancing cardiovascular function, toning muscles and controlling your weight. Sports activities also add strength, balance and stamina to the mix. These lead to a quicker rehabilitation process overall.

An Artist's Perspective

Artist Debra Ferrell attended her first National Veterans Wheelchair Games last year in St. Louis. At the time, she volunteered to assist her husband Don, who was serving as cochair of the local Transportation Committee. Although she spent much of her time on the busses, she met many athletes throughout the week and was impressed with their abilities and strong competitive spirits.

Ferrell was even more impressed when she underwent ankle surgery this past year, requiring the use of a wheelchair, walker and crutches over a six-month period of recuperation. "I was very appreciative of the effort required on a daily basis just to maneuver around," she said. "I quickly concluded that I would not be able to accomplish what many of these athletes do."

As an artist who enjoys painting murals, Ferrell noticed a large mural on display in St. Louis that depicted veterans in military actions. She learned that, while local artists from the host cities sometimes donate pieces for display, the Games had no artwork of their own to exhibit every year. Then, she had a thought ... wouldn't it be great to see a mural depicting the history of the Wheelchair Games, especially with the 25th year of the event coming up in 2005? She decided to approach the event's organizers and received a positive response.

"Over the last 25 years, many people and events have helped make the Games what they have become today," said Tom Brown, Director of the National Veterans Wheelchair Games. "When Debra Ferrell offered to paint the history of the Games, I thought it was a neat way to remind everyone where we started, and the many events that have helped shape our history. Since a picture says a thousand words, the mural would rekindle some memories of past Games, great competitions, and most of all lasting friendships."
