Press Release from The Active District Judges of the United States District Court for the District of Nebraska

We make this unusual statement because we care deeply about the ability of our court to do the work that the Constitution and the Congress have given us. When Congress adjourns this week, Nebraska will have no replacement for its lost fourth judgeship.

For the past 5 years, we have been telling Congress of the need to make permanent the fourth district judgeship for Nebraska. We specifically cautioned Congress that when Judge Shanahan took senior status in May of 2004, Nebraska would revert to only three active district judges, and, given the extraordinary criminal caseload, such a reduction would be disastrous. In January of this year, we met with Chairman Sensenbrenner of the House Judiciary Committee to impress upon him the urgency of the situation.

On Tuesday, October 6, 2004, the House passed a judgeship bill that contained a number of "poison pills," which will cause it to be killed in the Senate. As a result, the District of Nebraska will not have a fourth active district judge in the foreseeable future.

Unfortunately, even if this bill were passed, Congressman Sensenbrenner insured that Nebraska would not receive immediate relief. During floor debate, he amended the bill to delay authorization of Nebraska's judgeship until Fiscal Year 2007.


This failure of Congressional leadership will cause Nebraskans to continue suffering inordinate delays in criminal and civil cases. The Constitution provides that every criminal defendant is entitled to a speedy trial. Our court is gravely concerned that some criminal cases will be dismissed due to the application of the federal Speedy Trial Act. Further, Nebraskans will continue to have a significant portion of their civil cases decided by judges from outside the state.


Our court firmly believes that Nebraskans deserve better treatment than this.


