## PART I. HISTORICAL INFORMATION

A. Original and subsequent owners: Adam Vrooman; deeded to his son Johannes in 1726. Owned fox long time before 1932 by Judge whimore. Purchased by Philip Stanley in 1932.
B. Date of Erection: c. 1720 .
C. Original plans, construction, etc. Original portion about $20^{\prime} \times 20^{\prime}$, was on west, with gable facing street, with two rooms on each floor. It was extended northward at an undetermined date.
D. Notes on alterations and additions: Extended to east at an undetermined date. Rear stair removed (c. 1930?) for addition of bathrooms. Chimney removed from east portion in recent years. Hest front room on second floor widened toward north in recent years.

## PART II. ARCHECECTURAL INFORMALION

A. General Statement

1. Architectural character: A very early surviving example of a small house in this area.
2. Condition of fabric: Good.
B. Technical Description of Exterior
3. Over-all dimensions: About 35 ' frontage, about 28' depth. Tho stores; appoximatbly poctangular.
4. Foundations: Very low. Field stone, brick. if few sundried bricks are still visible in present central wall.
5. Mall construction: Clapboards, and novelty siding (obviously replacement); heavy timber frame with brick infilling.
6. Chimneys: Brick. One on west wall near iront, one on ridge to rear of center.
7. Openings:
a. Doorways and doors: Entrance has archturave trim, narrow transom light, four-panel doors.
b. Mindows and shutters: Double-hung sash, six over six lights. Architrave trim. Louvered shutters.
8. Roof:
a. Shape, covering: Gable, with gable fronting the street, on original (west) portion. Gable, with rioge parallel to street on east portion.
b. Comice: Simple wood comice with sinall ornanentel brackets on facade.
O. Technical Description of Interior
9. Floor plans: Original portion: fromt and rear room, each floor. Lded (east) portion similer Central stairvay.
10. Staimays: Enclosed; 12 risers.
11. Flooring: $9^{\prime \prime} \times 11^{*}$ joists laid flat, $5^{\prime}$ on centers. Sash-sam floox boards up to $15^{\prime \prime}$ wide in older portion. All surfaces now covered with narrow boards or linoleum.
12. Wall and ceiling finish: Plaster, painted. Ceiling height of second floor is $7^{\prime-617}$.
13. Doors: 0ld portion, four-penel doors, simple. New portion, six-panel doows.
14. Tria: Old portion, architrave trin, wood. New portion, simple trim, wood. Simple wood base.
15. Door hardmare: Iwo cast iron butbs, cast iron box locks.
16. Heating: Fireplaces added in recent times.
D. Site: Faces south. Built near sidewalk with narrow side yards.
