

Welcome to Independence

We celebrate July 4th as Independence Day, when the Continental Congress voted on the Declaration of Independence. But it took a month to complete the handwritten version on parchment. On August 2, 1776 in the Assembly room of Independence Hall, Benjamin Franklin and the other delegates led by John Hancock signed the formal copy. The silver inkstand they used is displayed in the West Wing of Independence Hall.

Signing the Declaration wasn't the only thing that Franklin did as part of a group, for he knew the effectiveness of working together for a common goal. In the park are many examples of what Franklin and his friends accomplished: a library, street lights, fire insurance and the American Philosophical Society – 262 years old, with a new public exhibit on American Explorers. At Franklin Court, in the museum, listen for the wondrous sound of the Glass Armonica – a musical instrument Franklin invented and often played for his friends.

The park is fortunate to have the **Friends of Independence** who contribute in many ways to the park. They provide volunteer guides for our free *Twilight Tours* at 6 p.m. each summer evening, they donated the reproduction glass Armonica used by the rangers, and they funded the innovative archeology exhibits in 318 Market Street – Franklin's rental property.



History Lives at Christ Church and Christ Church Burial Ground

years ago! Through the Colonial and Revolutionary eras, up through today, Christ Church has played an enduring role. The "Nation's Church" is noted as the spiritual home of George Washington, Betsy Ross, Bishop William White and Absalom Jones, and as the final resting place of Benjamin Franklin and six other signers of the Declaration of Independence. Visit the church and burial ground to gain a deeper understanding of our early history, the importance

of religious freedom and to learn about Revolutionary women and women who were revolutionary in their actions and ideas.

Tours at Christ Church, located at 2nd and Market Streets, are given throughout the day. The church is open Monday-Saturday from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. and on Sunday from 1 p.m.- 5 p.m. There is not an admission fee but donations are gratefully accepted.

Take the guided tour, *Revolutionary Women*, given every hour on the hour from 10 a.m.-3 p.m.

at Christ Church Burial Ground, located at 5th and Arch Streets. Meet Benjamin Franklin as he tells about his legendary life at Fridays with Franklin from 1 p.m.- 3 p.m. On Saturdays and Sundays in August, September, and October, the tour *Yellow Fever 1793* will be presented on the half hour. The burial ground is open Monday-Saturday from 10 a.m.-4 p.m., Sunday from Noon – 4 p.m., weather permitting. Admission fee is \$2/Adults, \$1/Children, \$10/Group up to 25 people. The butcher, the baker, and the candlestick maker...

earn about the lives of ordinary Philadelphians on Elfreth's Alley, a National Historic Landmark District off of 2nd Street between Arch and Race. The Alley was opened as a cartway between Front and 2nd Streets in 1702 and is lined by 32 rowhouses built between 1728 and 1836. The south side of the Alley is one of only three intact 18th-century working class street-scapes in America, and includes four of the oldest rowhouses still remaining in the city of Philadelphia.

Elfreth's Alley is unique because real people have been living here for more than 300 years. With the exception of Houses 124 and 126, which house the Elfreth's Alley Museum and Museum **Shop**, all of the houses are still privately owned and occupied! During the 18th century the Alley was home to dozens of working-class artisans, shopkeepers, and laborers. As America became an industrial nation in the mid-1800s, the Alley became one of the city's early immigrant communities, housing thousands of men and women from Germany, Ireland, Poland, Italy, and Russia. In the 1930s, the street was threatened with demolition and a group of neighbors rallied to save it,

forming one of the earliest preservation organizations in the country dedicated to preserving working-class communities.

The Elfreth's Alley Association offers tours of House 126
Tuesday-Sunday, along with self-guided tourbooks. Tickets and books are available in the Museum Shop in House 124.


Colonial Philadelphia Comes to Life at the Betsy Ross House








ooking for something differlent to do in the historic area? Look no further than Franklin Square, located at 6th & Race Streets! There is something for everyone.







Fill up on History at City Tavern!

N hen John Adams arrived in Philadelphia in August of 1774, to attend the First Continental Congress, he was greeted by leading citizens and taken immediately to the tavern he would later call "the most genteel tavern in America." The tavern Adams referred to, City Tavern, was not yet a year old and was already caught in momentous events. A few months earlier, Paul Revere had ridden up to the Tavern with the news of the closing of the port of Boston by the British Government. From that time until the close of the century, City Tavern knew the patronage of the great and near-great of the American Revolution. It became the practice of the members of the Second Continental Congress to dine together each Saturday at the Tavern.

The war years brought change and turmoil to City Tavern. There was grand entertainment, such as

the Continental Congress's first Fourth of July celebration in 1777. After the war, the Tavern served as the unofficial White House. Once again, these leaders enjoyed the hospitality of the City Tavern. It was fitting that after the adjournment of the convention in September, delegates gathered for one final dinner at the City Tavern.

Today Chef Walter Staib has taken over operation of City Tavern, returning to its 18th-century splendor. Enjoy a taste of history today. Serving lunch, dinner and cocktails daily from 11:30 a.m.

Historic Eyewitness Accounts at the National Constitution Center

rom the *Hindenburg* explosion and Pope John Paul II's first visit to the United States, to the Kennedy assassination and Apollo 8, landmark moments in history will forever remain in the hearts and minds of Americans. Through September 3rd, the National Constitution Center is hosting an exhibition of gripping eyewitness accounts of moments in U.S. history, *Eyewitness: American* Originals from the National Archives. Through letters, diaries, photographs, and audio and film recordings from the National Archives and its Presidential libraries, visitors to the Eyewitness exhibition will gain new and unique insights into our history in a way they never imagined possible.

The National Constitution Center

Gripping and emotional, the testimonies capture the exuberance, grief, joy, panic, or chaos that characterized the events described. History books explain the slaves' fight for freedom or the liberation of concentration camps at the end of World War II, but the power of the original accounts written or recorded by players in these dramas enable visitors to be transported back in time to these events, almost as if they are experiencing them firsthand.

Guests can hear Lady Bird Johnson's audio diary account of the Kennedy assassination; read John Lewis' testimony of the violence during the Civil Rights March from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama; watch footage

of a 1966 interview with Jeremiah Denton, an American POW in Vietnam; and much more. Because Philadelphia has such a rich history, the National Constitution Center is also presenting an exhibition of rare and important treasures from the collections of local libraries and museums, *Philadelphia Treasures*. This accompanying

exhibit tells important stories about our nation's history, just as Eyewitness does. *Philadelphia Treasures* features a wide array of artifacts pertaining to major local events, including the formation of the Underground Railroad, the outbreak of Yellow Fever, and the certification of the first United States Mint, among others.


