Week Ending 2-14-55

WEATHER Temperatures averaged about 10° below normal over the northeastern portion of the State to near or slightly below in the southwest. There were two cold waves which came in with fresh to strong northerly winds over the eastern and northern portions of the State, but they were much less severe in the couthwest. A little light snow fell over most of the eastern and southern portions of the State Wednesday night, but the southwest received only scattered flurries.

<u>CROPS</u> Reports on winter wheat continue favorable. The snow last week was too light to be of material benefit and there was more or less blowing. Snow had disappeared over much of western Nebraska, where temperatures did not get as low as in eastern Nebraska, where fields are still covered with snow. Moisture in the fields should minimize the effects of low temperatures.

Due to the stormy weather, there was little farm activity except caring for livestock. Little inquiry for seed cats and barley was made. There was some demand for hay.


The present soil moisture condition is good over much of the State. Most of the castern two-thirds of the State still had ample snow covering from the previous week for protection against the low temperatures of the past week. The western third of the State needs more moisture to check the development of dust-bowl conditions.

LIVESTOCK More care was given to livestock during the past week due to the lowest temperatures of the year. Heat lamps were used to save the newly born pigs. Some calving was reported. More hay and feed were required due to the drop in temperatures.

A few counties reported grain feed supplies short but most of the counties have supplies ranging from ample to surplus. Concentrates are generally reported amplo. A few counties reported the hay supply short but generally the reports range from ample to surplus. Due to the snow covering, very little range feed was available last week.
