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## ABSTRACT

This selected bibliography on language learners' systems and error analysis is divided into five sections. Section 1 deals with the notion of approximative or intermediate systems and interlanguage, and with more classical studies on contrastive analysis. Section 2 focuses on the concept and definition of learner errors and includes items dealing with their elicitation and classification. Section 3 lists some of the most important items in the fields of first language acquisition and the use of the first language by children and groups speaking nonstandard dialects. Studies of language contact are the focus in Section 4. The final part, Section 5, contains references to works dealing with second language learning with particular reference to error analysis or learners' systems. (Author/AH)

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## FOREWORD

This bibliography grew out of a seminar in applied linguistics taught by Albert Valdman and Harry Gradman at Indiana University during the spring of 1974, as well as from correspondence and exchange of papers with such researchers in the area of second language acquisition as Marina K. Burt, S. Pit Corder, Victor Hanzeli, John Schumann, Larry Selinker, and Merrill Swain. It was also fostered by two sessions on "error analysis" held at the 1974 and 1975 annual meetings of the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages.

The term "error analysis" is surely inappropriate for one of the most promising and dynamic currents of research in second language acquisition. Learner errors are significant in this type of research only insofar as they direct the applied linguist's attention to hypotheses formulated by learners and to processes involved in the acquisition of linguistic and communicative competence in a second language. As this bibliography shows, the collection and analysis of errors antedate such well established areas of applied linguistics as contrastive analysis. Skillful teachers have always let observed errors guide their pedagogical practice; what is new is the significance that attaches to errors and the view that they reflect the normal course of second language acquisition rather than pathological manifestations that must be eradicated at all costs.

Various names have been given to the deviations from well-formed second language utterances produced by learners' approximative systems: intermediate systems, idiosyncratic systems, interlanguage, etc. We have chosen the most neutral term, learners' systems.

In an evolving field it is difficult to find principles on which to base the classification of bibliographical entries, and the categories chosen here are admittedly somewhat arbitrary. Section I (Theoretical Bases) groups items dealing with the notion of approximative or intermediate systems and interlanguage, and more classical studies on contrastive analysis. Section II focuses on the concept and definition of learner errors and includes items dealing with their elicitation and classification. The observation of learner systems, particularly their longitudinal development, has revealed striking similarities between first and second language acquisition. Native speakers of a language also show various types of deviations relative to some standard norm, some of which bear comparison with second language learners' errors. For that reason, Part III lists some of the most important items in the fields of first language acquisition and the use of the first language by children and groups speaking non-standard dialects; most of the studies cited deal with English. Part IV surveys studies on language contact, with the exclusion of problems of pidginization and creolization; (the latter constitute a rapidly developing specialized field whose literature is overwhelming). The final section, Part V, contains references to works dealing with second language learning with particular reference to error analysis or learners' systems.

Grateful acknowledgement is made to Harry Gradman and Michel Lange, who provided specialized bibliographies, and to Janusz Arabski, whose own bibliography on error analysis published in Errata formed the starting point for this work, and who also made valuable comments and suggestions concerning classification. The preparation of the manuscript was expertly handled by Marilyn Marshall.
