**MEMORANDUM ON PROPOSED TARIFF LEGISLATION
of the 110th Congress¹**

[Date approved: May 14, 2008]²

Bill No. and sponsor: H.R. 4765 (Mr. Robert C. “Bobby” Scott of Virginia).

Proponent name,³ location: Hamilton Beach Brands, Inc., Glenn Allen, VA.

Other bills on product (110th Congress only): None.

Nature of bill: Extension of temporary duty suspension through December 31, 2011.

Retroactive effect: None.

Suggested article description(s) for enactment (including appropriate HTS subheading(s)):

Open-top electric grills designed for indoor use (provided for in subheading 8516.60.60).

Product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports:


An open-top electric indoor grill consists of a plastic housing and drip tray, a non-stick heating surface, and a slightly slanted grated surface which permits fat and other coagulants to sluice down and away from the primary grilling items. Open-top electric indoor grills can be used for preparing various types of meats such as hamburgers, chicken, turkey, or grilled sandwiches. The proponent’s open-top grill can be used indoors or outdoors for preparation of various types of foods, including those that are too delicate for use in a traditional electric two-sided contact grill. Unlike clamshell-design grills, this open-top grill consists of plastic handles and a variable heat dial for maximum grilling control, and resembles an outdoor grill in that food must be turned to assure even grilling results. The principal import source of electric indoor grills is China, which shipped approximately \$156.4 million of the \$166.3 million in total dutiable imports under HTS subheading 8516.60.60 in 2007.

A BILL

To extend the temporary suspension of duty on open top, electric indoor grills.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. OPEN TOP, ELECTRIC INDOOR GRILLS.**

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—Heading 9902.23.45 of the Har-
5 monized Tariff Schedule of the United States is amended
6 by striking “12/31/2009” and inserting “12/31/2011”.

7 (b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendment made by
8 subsection (a) applies with respect to goods entered, or

- 1 withdrawn from warehouse for consumption, on or after
- 2 the 15th day after the date of the enactment of this Act.

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
