♦ South Dakota was the 39<sup>th</sup> or 40<sup>th</sup> State admitted to the Union, since it took place the same day as North Dakota on November 2, 1889. It was part of Dakota Tarritory before statehood

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Territory before statehood.

• South Dakota is the home of the Dakota, Lakota and Nakota tribes, which make up the Sioux Nation.

• The name "Black Hills" comes from the Lakota words *Paha Sapa*, which mean "hills that are black." Seen from a distance, these pine-covered hills, rising several thousand feet above the sur• The U.S.S. South Dakota was the most decorated battleship during World War II.

• Sturgis, S.D., is home of the annual Black Hills Classic Motorcycle Rally.

# The Honorable Gordon Mansfield Attends The Festival


For the next two days, we will have a very special guest from Washington, D.C., the Honorable Gordon H. Mansfield, Deputy Secretary of Veterans Affairs.

Deputy Secretary Mansfield is an Army veteran who served two tours in Vietnam as company commander with the 101<sup>st</sup> Airborne Division. He was wounded during the Tet Offensive of 1968, where he sustained a spinal cord injury. For his actions while his unit was under fire, he was decorated with the Distin-



guished Service Cross. He was medically retired by the U.S. Army at the rank of Captain. Mansfield's other combat decorations include the Bronze Star, two Purple Hearts, the Combat Infantryman's Badge and the Presidential Unit Citation.

A returning visitor to the Creative Arts Festival, the Deputy Secretary looks forward to meeting with his fellow veterans while he is here. He will also speak at tonight's Opening Ceremonies in the Rushmore Room, Convention

# Tonight's Inspirational Speaker – Ralph Vencill



Please welcome Ralph Vencill to the National Veterans Creative Arts Festival. He will be a featured speaker at the Opening Ceremonies tonight and he is very excited about his first Festival experience. "I've seen videos of past years' performances and

exhibits and am just amazed with the talent these veterans possess," said Vencill. "I'm really looking forward to speaking to such a wonderful group and seeing firsthand the creativity they have to offer."

Vencill, 39, was born and raised in the small farming community of West Alexandria, Ohio. He attended Eugene Bible School and graduated with a Bachelor's degree in 1990. He went on to earn his Masters in Divinity and is currently working on his Doctorate. Vencill has worked as a pastor for more than 20 years in Oregon, Kentucky and South Dakota, and currently serves as the Senior Pastor of the Sturgis Open Bible Church. He is very involved with his surrounding community as the site coordinator for the after school program at the Stagebarn School in Piedmont, S.D. Vencill was invited to the 2006 Creative Arts Festival by Kim Matz, a local organizing committee team member. Matz met Vencill through area youth sporting events that Vencill helps referee. She also heard Vencill speak at various church services and realized that there was something very special about the way he communicates with people. "He has such a positive attitude about life, and knowing that the Opening Ceremonies remarks need to be inspirational, I felt that he would be perfect," she said.

Vencill has never spoken in front of a group of veterans before, but feels his personal experiences will resonate with the audience. "I was born blind in one eye and learned to overcome many obstacles at an early age," he said. "I was told that I couldn't play sports because I lacked depth perception." Sports were something that Vencill was determined to enjoy, and through his incredible perseverance he's been playing them his entire life. "I won't allow my disability to be disabling," he said. "I won't let it overcome my life."

For Vencill, sports were his outlet to overcoming disability and challenge. For our veterans this week, it is the arts. For all, it's accepting life's challenges and making good use of our own special talents. Ralph Vencill, we welcome you to the 2006 Creative Arts Festival.

◆ Badlands National Park consists of nearly 244,000 acres of sharply eroded buttes, pinnacles and spires blended with the largest, protected mixed grass prairie in the United States. The park contains the world's richest Oligocene epoch fossil beds, dating 23 to 35 million years.

• Black Hills National Cemetery "The Arlington of the West," is a final resting place for our nation's veterans.

• The site of a rich gold strike in 1875, Deadwood retains its mining town atmosphere. While Deadwood is one of the most highly publicized mining towns of the trans-Mississippi West, much of its fame rests on the famous (or infamous) characters who passed through it.

• The Capitol of South Dakota is Pierre. Its largest cities are Sioux Falls, Rapid City and Aberdeen.

• South Dakota consists of 77,121 square miles. Nearly 75,900 are land, and 1,224 are water.

• The State motto is: "Under God the people rule."

◆ The State flower is the Pasque Flower, which grows wild throughout the state. Its blooming is one of the first signs of spring in South Dakota. A member of the buttercup family, the pasque is a small, lavender flower. The White Spruce is the State tree.

• Famous South Dakotans:

Sparky Anderson — baseball manager, Bridgewater Tom Brokaw — TV newscaster, Webster Crazy Horse — Oglala chief Hubert H. Humphrey — senator and vice president, Wallace Cheryl Ladd — actress, Huron George McGovern — politician, Avon Red Cloud — Oglala Sioux chief Sitting Bull — Hunkpappa Sioux chief

• South Dakota is the land of the famous Sioux or Dacotah Indians. Dakota Territory and later South Dakotans were named for that tribe.

# Home Town News at the Creative Arts Festival

The Hometown News program at all of VA's national events is a public affairs effort that provides a news

release to the local newspapers of our participants, letting them know about your attendance this year. (A news release is a written document that is sent to the news media to let them know about a good story idea.) At the Festival, all news releases are placed on our Festival Web site for all veterans who requested one. We also notify local media across the country by phone and e-mail to let them know that a veteran from their area is here.

If your phone number is listed on your news release, you may get a phone call from your local newspaper when you get home requesting an interview about the Festival. Some of you may have asked that your phone number not be listed on your news release on the Festival Web site, and we will certainly honor any of these requests. Please know, however, that if your local media should contact us and want to interview you when you get home, we will provide them with your phone number so they may call you directly.

The Hometown News program is a wonderful way to let your communities know about their local veterans' star status! It is also a very good way to tell other talented veterans out there about the creative arts program and other services that may be available to them at their local VA medical centers. We hope to have all of this year's news releases posted on the Web site by mid-week (see <u>www.creativeartsfestival.org</u> under "Participant Information"). We will also be taking many photos while you are rehearsing or displaying your artwork, and hope to have the best photos on the Web site by Friday or Saturday. We will provide one 4"x6" print of that photo for you, as well as a copy of your own personal news release.

We hope that you have also brought along your own cameras so you can ask your friends or Festival volunteers to take additional photos of you performing, rehearsing, displaying your artwork, attending workshops or touring local areas of interest.

During the 2006 National Veterans Creative Arts Festival, the Department of Veterans Affairs and the Library of Congress invite all veterans to again take part in the Veterans History Project (VHP).

This historic project honors our nation's veterans by creating a lasting legacy of their military experience. Regardless of branch or period of service, age, military career or experience, all veterans are invited to share it with our VHP program staff this week. At last year's Creative Arts Festival, 69 interviews took place, which is the largest number of interviews ever recorded at a VA national event.

As part of this project, a 45-minute interview with each veteran will be videotaped and given to the Library of Congress, to become part of our Nation's official historical records. Each participant will also receive a VHP tote bag and a DVD copy of their interview.

Interviews begin tomorrow (Tuesday), October 17, and will continue through Saturday, October 21. Please sign up at the VHP registration area during registration today, or stop by the VHP interview room (Needles Room, Convention Center I). The VHP interviews will be conducted this week by Butch Miller and videotaped by Bill Browning from the VA medical center in Detroit, Mich.

The schedule for VHP interviews this week is: Tuesday, October 17 through Saturday, October 21: 8 a.m. – noon; and 1 – 5 p.m.

Only you can tell your story, and it's a story worth preserving and sharing with future
