## AMHERST COUNTY

2002 U.S. Census of Agriculture

Amherst County is situated in the west-central Piedmont Plateau and is bordered on the west by the Blue Ridge Mountains. Formed form part of Albemarle in 1761, the county was named in honor of General Amherst, who successfully commanded the British troops in America during the French and ndian war.

Since the county includes the foothills and mountain ranges of the Blue Ridge, elevations move upward from about 500 feet in the James Rive Valley to over 4,000 feet on the higher peaks. Also included in Amherst are 226,454 acres of woodland. The nearest weather stations are at Lynchburg and Bedford, where temperatures average about 38 degrees in January and 76 in July. The frost-free growing season extends from around April 15 to about October 25. Annual precipitation averages 43 inches. Agriculture is booming industry in Amherst, and income from the sale of farm commoditie in 1992 amounted to over 4.2 million dollars. Of this total, roughly 80 percen came from livestock, including dairy and poultry products. Cattle and calves were the leading source, contributing 65 percent of this amount. Apples and peaches accounted for another 1 percent of the 1992 farm income.
