#### Introduction

Community Service Employment for Older Americans (CSEOA), authorized by title V of the Older Americans Act, is a federally-sponsored employment and training program that targets low-income older individuals who want to remain in or re-enter the workforce. Participants must be 55 years of age or older with incomes no more than 125 percent of the federal poverty level. The program, known as the Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP), offers participants work-based community service training at non-profit agencies so that they can gain on-the-job experience and prepare to re-enter the workforce. The ultimate goal of the program is to move SCSEP participants into unsubsidized employment so that they can achieve economic self-sufficiency.

#### **FY 2008**

The FY 2008 request proposes a decrease in funding for CSEOA. This program was rated "Ineffective" when assessed by the Department of Labor and the Office of Management and Budget, largely due to inadequate competition in the grants process, lack of data on program performance and impact, and duplication of other federal programs.

In addition, changes made by the Older Americans Act of 2006 allow the Department to use funds more efficiently than possible under prior law to serve workers. It should also be noted that many employers are finding that their demand for skilled workers exceeds the available

labor supply, and thus are increasingly eager to hire older workers. These employers value the experience, maturity and reliability of older workers. Therefore, in FY 2008, the workforce investment system will play a stronger role in placing older workers in unsubsidized employment rather than SCSEP placing them in subsidized employment.

The Department has taken several steps in the last year to ensure One-Stop Career Centers can provide quality employment and training services to older workers. SCSEP is a required partner in the One-Stop Career Centers, and the Department has encouraged closer integration of SCSEP and WIA programs. The Department has issued a Protocol for Serving Older Workers in the workforce investment system. The goal of this protocol is to enhance the services provided to older workers, and to infuse the One-Stop Career Center system with innovative strategies for tapping into this labor pool. Proposed action steps were identified for six major stakeholders, including One-Stop Career Centers. The Department also plans to fund demonstrations and disseminate best practices to encourage better services for older workers at One-Stop Career Centers.

The streamlining of the administration of the program should enable national program grantees to administer their projects more efficiently, thus freeing up additional funds to serve participants. The reauthorized program also included changes sought by the Department to more quickly move participants into unsubsidized employment, allowing the program to serve more participants with the same number of slots. In addition, the selection of national grantees in the Program Year (PY) 2006 competition was based on criteria that, among other factors, gauged the efficacy of their program and grant management systems as well as their financial management systems. This should also improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the program.

At the requested level of funding, SCSEP will authorize approximately 39,260 positions, based on an estimated unit cost of \$8,915, in FY2008, and SCSEP will served approximately 59,000 low-income older workers in part time work-based training opportunities. It is important to note that this figure accounts for new costs associated with the <u>Fair Minimum Wage Act of 2007</u> proposed by the House of Representatives as well as changes to state minimum wage levels.

#### **FY 2007**

The FY 2007 Budget request for CSEOA assumed a sixteenth reauthorization of the Older Americans Act in 2006. The reauthorization included Title V changes involving: 1) targeting resources on those most in need; 2) competing the national grants at regular intervals to ensure the best service providers and 3) capping participant tenure to maximize use of available slots. CSEOA has provided for 60,050 authorized positions. With the savings achieved through program reforms, CSEOA will support over 100,000 low-income workers through these positions in FY 2007.

#### **FY 2006**

In FY 2006, CSEOA undertook the following initiatives:

- ETA competed the PY 2006 national grants to streamline the program through consolidation of service areas and improve administration of the program, which will improve program performance and reduce administrative costs. Eighteen grants were awarded on July 31, 2006—12 incumbents and 6 new grantees.
- ETA worked with the Congress to address the Older American Act reauthorization principles set forth by the Department in 2005 as the Congress developed the Older Americans Act of 2006. These principles were to help meet employers' demands for skilled workers by attracting moreolder workers into the labor force, to encourage others to remain in the workforce, and to offer opportunities for older workers to update their skills.
- ETA continued to make One-Stop Career Centers effective and accessible to older workers who could not be served by CSEOA. This allowed the targeting of CSEOA resources to those older workers most in need.

Funding in FY 2006 provided for 60,050 authorized positions nationwide to be administered through a combination of competitively selected national non-profit organizations and state agencies. The slots supported approximately 92,300 low-income older workers.

<u>Applicable Performance Goal</u>: Performance Goal 2F – Assist older workers to participate in a demand-driven economy through the Senior Community Service Employment Program.

**Requested Resources:** \$350,000,000, a decrease of \$82,311,000 from FY 2007.

Rationale/Strategy and Performance Impact Related to Resource Decrease: This program was rated "Ineffective" when assessed by the Department of Labor and the Office of Management and Budget, largely due to inadequate competition in the grants process, lack of data on program performance and impact, and duplication with other federal programs. Since the last PART assessment, the Older Americans Act of 2006 has allowed the Department to use funds more efficiently than possible under prior law to serve workers.

In FY 2008, the workforce investment system will play a stronger role in placing older workers in unsubsidized employment rather than SCSEP placing them in subsidized employment. The FY 2008 request will support approximately 59,000 low-income elderly.
