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USDA RURAL DEVELOPMENT INJECTS NEARLY \$636,000 INTO RURAL NEBRASKA

--ENERGY, ESSENTIAL COMMUNITY FACILITIES & BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT BENEFIT

Lincoln, Neb., September 21, 2005—The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Development recently funded 43 projects throughout Nebraska totaling \$635,878 that will impact rural areas in matters of energy, business development and essential community facilities.

"Dollars invested into rural Nebraska are dollars well spent," stated Nebraska State Director Scot Blehm, USDA Rural Development. "USDA Rural Development is pleased to be able to assist in projects that will help strengthen Nebraska's rural economy. Conservation of energy, business development, facilities that offer increased protection to our rural residents and those that promote community involvement are all important to strengthening and growing rural communities."

Energy Efficiency Improvements and Renewable Energy Systems grants are awarded to farmers, ranchers, and for-profit small businesses to provide assistance in the development of renewable energy such as wind, solar, biomass, biogas and geothermal; and energy efficiency improvement projects such as insulation, windows, doors, HVAC, refrigeration, lighting, pumping/air/motor systems. *Nebraska received \$418,348 in energy efficiency improvements and renewable energy systems grants. - <u>Vulpes Corporation</u>-Broken Bow-\$6,630-new 10 ton high efficiency heat pump to provide heating and cooling for theatre in Broken Bow.
- <u>Wahoo Locker, LLC</u>-Wahoo-\$19,610-new energy efficient locker equipment.
- <u>Wallen Farms INC</u>-McCook-\$6,890-convert irrigation wells to electric motors.

Rural Business Enterprise Grants (RBEG) are awarded to public bodies, non-profits, and Indian Tribes to facilitate and finance development of small and emerging private business enterprises in rural areas. Rural Business Opportunity Grants (RBOG) are awarded to public bodies, non-profits, Indian Tribes and cooperatives to provide technical assistance for business development and to conduct economic planning in rural areas. *Nebraska received RBEG and RBOG funds totaling \$127,700. Recipients include:*

- <u>Loup Basin RC&D Council</u> awarded \$83,000 in RBEG funds to purchase equipment for an Information Technology Center that will provide training and educational opportunities for small business development, youth, organizations, emergency personnel and health service professionals in a nine county area of the state.
- <u>Nebraska Grain and Feed Association</u> received \$44,700 in RBOG funds to design, implement, evaluate and replicate a Hunting and Recreation Cooperative in Nebraska.

Economic Impact Initiative grants are available to non-profit groups, public entities and Indian Tribes to develop essential community facilities in rural communities with extreme high unemployment and severe economic depression. *Nebraska received \$89,830 in economic impact initiative grants. Recipients include:*

- <u>Village of Ragan</u> awarded \$27,000 for community/fire hall improvements benefiting 46 rural residents.
- <u>Lynch Rural Fire District received</u> \$19,330 for the purchase of a grass fire truck that will serve 854 rural residents of a 7 township area.
- <u>Sandhills Development Corporation</u> received \$24,500 to acquire medical equipment for the Sandhills Development Corporation medical facility serving primarily the nearly 500 rural residents of Mullen with secondary service area consisting of rural areas of all or part of Hooker, Grant, Thomas and McPherson counties.
- <u>Village of Cotesfield</u> awarded \$19,000 to develop a well for fire protection serving 66 rural residents.
