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Introduction

Foreign trade data can span whole continents or focus on a single port; topics range from base bullion to man-made fibers; and the uses of the data are just as varied.

The Federal Government uses such statistics in developing merchandise trade figures for its balance-of-payments

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accounts; in analyzing trends in international trade; in planning and evaluating such programs as export expansion, agricultural development and assistance, and work under the Foreign Assistance and Merchant Marine Acts; and in measuring the impact of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) or the Generalized System of Preferences (GSP). The foreign trade data also help implement and analyze operations under such international agreements as the Long-Term Cotton Textile Arrangement and the U.S.-Canadian Automotive Products Trade Agreement.

In industry, finance, and research, the data help in appraising the general trade situation and outlook, in share-of-the-market and market penetration studies, in product and market development, and in measuring the impact of competition. Carriers, by sea and air, use the data to plan facilities.

Data Collection Requirements

In 1790, the Federal Government began publishing annual general statistics on U.S. foreign commerce and navigation. It has continued ever since, except for 1946 to 1963, when it published quarterly data instead. Since 1866 it has compiled the data monthly as well. The task of compiling these statistics from figures submitted by customs collectors was first given to the Treasury Department, but later to the Department of Commerce. Since 1941, the Census Bureau has been doing the job, as currently authorized by the Foreign Trade Statistics Regulation, Title 15, Part 30, Code of Federal Regulations (following Ch. 9, Title 13 of the United States Code.)

The Trade Act of 1974 requires a direct comparison between U.S. exports, U.S. imports, and the domestic output. As a result, a revised Schedule B (Statistical Classification of Commodities Exported from the United States), based on the framework of the Tariff Schedules of the United States Annotated (TSUSA), was introduced, on January 1, 1978. Both schedules now contain additional detail for easier comparison with the standard industrial classification (SIC) system used in compiling production data in the Bureau's economic censuses and surveys elsewhere by the government.

Comparisons With Other Countries

The Bureau also made trade figures for the United States comparable with its trading partners. To do this, the Bureau recast the detailed classifications in Schedule B and TSUSA to match the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC), developed by the United Nations and used by most of the world trading community. So SITC-based data appears in terms of Schedule E for exports and Schedule A for imports. Presentation of basic data by classification code also lets users rearrange the figures for end use categories and to meet other needs.

Beginning with data for January 1989, the Census Bureau began using new export and import commodity schedules based on the international Harmonized Commodity Description and Coding System (HS). Under HS, both exported and imported data carry the same codes to six digits. These schedules have been designed to make our data more comparable to trade data produced by other countries. The HS export and import data is also recast into Standard International Trade Classification—Revision 3 (SITC—Rev. 3) for those users wishing to use SITC data. See abstract numbers 502.7 and 504.

But how are the data collected?

Data on exports to all countries,
except Canada, are collected from
Shipper's Exports Declarations (SED's)
filed with Customs officials and subsequently transmitted to the Census Bureau.
Qualified exporters, forwarders, or carriers
submit SED data by automated means

directly to the Census Bureau.

Data on exports to Canada are compiled from Canadian import statistics under a 1987 Memorandum of Understanding signed by the Census Bureau, U.S. Customs Service, Canadian Customs, and Statistics Canada. Similarly, under this Memorandum of Understanding, Canada is substituting U.S. import statistics for Canadian exports to the United States. (See abstract number 12 in the General and Reference chapter for a comparison of standard industrial codes for the United States and Canada.)

Data on imports are collected primarily from automated data submitted through the Customs Automated Commercial System and from various import entry forms filed with Customs officials. Data include the dollar value and net quantity (in metric units) of commodities exported and imported by all methods of transportation combined, as well as the value and shipping weight of shipments by vessel and by air. Separate statistics cover trade with Puerto Rico and U.S. possessions.

Scope of Export and Import Data

In general, export statistics record the physical movement of merchandise from the United States and Puerto Rico to foreign countries, whether a commercial transaction is involved or not. They exclude shipments to, between, or from any outlying areas of the United States (U.S. trade with its outlying areas is reported separately); certain shipments made by the Federal Government; monetary gold and issued coins; merchandise in transit between countries; and fuel for use on departing vessels, planes, or other carriers (also reported separately). The statistics, however, do include commodities for foreign aid, military sales, and agricultural assistance; intracompany shipments; foreign purchases; and U.S. vessels sold abroad. As of January 1989, the data include exports of electricity.

Dollar values reported usually refer to the free-alongside-ship (f.a.s.) values at the U.S. port of export. Data, by commodity classification, cover net quantity, destination (country and world area), U.S. customs district of export, method of transportation, and month of export.

The import statistics reflect the physical movement of both government and other merchandise into U.S. customs territory (including Puerto Rico), whether or not a commercial transaction is involved. They exclude shipments in transit, or from or between Puerto Rico and/or any U.S. outlying area; monetary gold and issued coins; and American merchandise brought back to this country by members of the U.S. Armed Forces. As of January 1989, the data include imports of electricity.

The Bureau reports value in two ways: by c.i.f. (cost, insurance, and freight) and dutiable (customs) value. Data, by commodity classification, cover net quantity, dutiable status and rate, country and area of origin, customs district of entry, method of transportation, and month of import.

Seasonal Adjustment

The Census Bureau reintroduced seasonal adjustment of monthly trade data with the release of the April 1988 trade statistics (dated June 16). Before 1986, the Census Bureau seasonally adjusted the monthly data. However, "carry-over" (that portion of the monthly data actually occurring in previous months) prevented an accurate measure of seasonality in 1986 and later.

Both the U.S. Customs Service (which collects the trade documentation) and the Census Bureau (which tabulates the data) took steps to reduce the carry-over from its high of over 50 percent to a relatively constant 2-3 percent, enabling the Census Bureau to return to seasonal adjustment of the monthly data. (In addition, reports continue to provide data that have not been seasonally adjusted.)

Exporters

Statistics profiling the U.S. exporter population are available through a project known as the Exporter Data Base (EDB).

These statistics come from a research project conducted by the Census Bureau with the International Trade Administration FOREIGN TRADE 87

of the U.S. Department of Commerce. The project created a data base on the number of exporters—in cities, States, and the Nation—and their economic characteristics.

The EDB project was undertaken to measure small business participation in exporting, assist the planning of export promotion programs, determine the importance of exports to State and local economies, and improve the accuracy of U.S. international trade statistics.

The EDB links commodity data from millions of U.S. export declarations to the Census Bureau's various data bases presenting the business characteristics of U.S. firms and establishments. Initial efforts were directed at developing detailed benchmark statistics on U.S. exporters from 1987, an economic censuses year.

Data Products

The titles of data products appear under a number of headings, for example, "Reference Products," "Classifications," and "Regulations." These headings cover items without statistical tables except, of course, for illustration. (Contact Foreign Trade Division for information about the most recent guide.)

Products under the other headings do include statistics. They include "Trade with Puerto Rico and U.S. Possessions" as well as "Transportation," which covers waterborne transport and vessel entrances and clearances. The remaining headings, including "Summary Reports," cover products with both import and export data.

The export statistics are first compiled to reflect Schedule B, Statistical Classifications of Domestic and Foreign Commodities Exported From the United States. Import data are first compiled to reflect Harmonized Tariff Schedules of the United States Annotated (HTSUSA).

These data appear in monthly published reports for commodity classifications derived from the SITC—Rev. 3. In addition, the Bureau produces data files of classifications such as the *Harmonized Commodity Master Tape*.

Monthly and annual data in different arrangements and greater detail than in the reports appear on microfiche or computer tape, or in excerpts from these tabulations. Compact discs, however, provide data in the greatest detail available. The two principal discs are *U.S. Exports of Merchandise on CD-ROM* and *U.S. Imports of Merchandise on CD-ROM* (abstract numbers 508.5 and 523.5, respectively).

Also, the Bureau, at the users' request and expense, makes special tabulations of foreign trade data on tape, paper, microfiche, and—most recently—diskettes (that is, "floppy disks") for personal computers.

In addition to Census Bureau sources, users may refer to the National Trade Data Bank. It provides monthly data selected from a number of Federal agencies. Intended to promote overseas trade by the United States, the program includes foreign trade and international economics. These data are on CD-ROM (compact disk-read only memory.) In addition, data on computer tape are available from the National Technical Information Service. For CD-ROM's, call 703-487-4650 for single copies, 703-487-4630 for annual subscriptions.

Data users may refer to some foreign trade materials at the Department of Commerce, International Trade Administration (ITA) offices, noted in appendix B of this Catalog. In addition, the United States International Trade Commission issues the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States (1990) Annotated for Statistical Reporting Purposes (HTS) available in print from the Government Printing Office and on diskette from the National Technical Information Service.

For recent references to foreign trade data products, see abstract number 500 in the section entitled Data Products Issued October-December 1995. Listings of subsequent releases appear in the *Monthly Product Announcement* and the *Daily List* (see abstract numbers 44 and 15.5, respectively.).



Subject content—Presents statistical information on the relation between U.S. domestic output and U.S. commodity exports and imports in terms of a commodity classification based on the SIC system. Such a classification facilitates the comparison of exports and imports with a large body of data on the domestic economy—for example, employment, payrolls, inventories, production, shipments, orders, capital assets, and size and location of producing units, all organized much like the SIC.

Exports, imports, and calculated import duty are also provided at the commodity division level for 1958 through 1991.

Shippers' declarations are submitted by exporters or their agents to the exporting carrier and by the carrier, in turn, to U.S. Customs Service Officers at U.S. ports. (In the case of mail shipments, the declarations are presented to the postmasters.) Customs officers at each port transmit the documents to the Bureau of the Census as they come in. In addition to processing these forms, the Bureau compiles statistics directly from monthly summary export declarations or computer tapes submitted by qualified exporters.

For characteristics for exporting firms and establishments, see the heading "Exporters" in the introduction to this chapter.



EXPORT AND IMPORT DATA REVISIONS

The Foreign Trade Division issues annual reports showing revisions in the data for exports and imports. Those who would like to know about any corrections or other changes in the data for specific export and import products should contact Foreign Trade Division.

The Foreign Trade Division compiles U.S. import statistics from copies of Foreign Trade Zone documents, the import entry and warehouse withdrawal forms which the law requires importers to file with Customs officials. Customs officials verify country of origin, net quantity, value, and commodity classification on entries. These entries are used for customs' appraisals. The copies are subject to statistical correction. Some statistical data are transmitted directly onto computer tape.






