1.	<u>Introduction</u> . This supplement describes two variances in the Short Term Forecast po	olicy

- 2. <u>Short Term Forecast (product category NOW)</u>.
- 2.2 <u>Issuance Guidelines</u>. In the Alaska Region, Short Term Forecasts will be produced by WSOs in coordination with their area Weather Forecast Office (WFO). The zone areas for which WSOs will issue Short Term Forecast products are given in Appendix A.

Coordination and collaboration between WFOs and WSOs is important. WFOs should be mindful of the Short Term Forecasts prepared by WSOs within their area of responsibility to ensure consistency between zone and short term forecasts. Coordination is required if a WSO intends to issue a Short Term Forecast that will contain information that conflicts with the WFO zone forecast.

2.2.2 <u>Issuance Criteria</u>. WFOs and WSOs should issue Short Term Forecasts to discuss the evolution of precipitation, convective events, winter weather, fog, significant winds, blowing dust, and extreme temperatures within their geographic area of responsibility. Local policy may require Short Term Forecasts to be issued routinely, rather than on an event-driven basis, to address local customer and partner requirements. These procedures for Short Term Forecast issuance will be documented locally by the WFO meteorologist in charge.

- 2.3 <u>Technical Description</u>.
- 2.3.3 <u>Content</u>. In addition to the guidance provided in NWSI 10-517, Alaska Region WSOs and WFOs should include a time reference in each Short Term Forecast product to help ensure clarity in the short term trend being forecast. The time reference may be general, i.e., "BY LATE MORNING," but specificity is encouraged, i.e., "BY 11 AM." Refer to Appendix B for additional examples.
