MAGISTRATE JUDGES' WORKLOAD

In addition to their numerous duties and responsibilities, the two magistrate judges are also assigned approximately 30% of all Southern civil cases for all purposes, including trial and entry of judgment, under the Magistrate Judge Opt-Out Program. During 2000, there were many "across the board" workload increases for the magistrate judges, as reflected by the following statistics. The magistrate judges also conducted twenty four settlement conferences last year, with over a 60% success ratio.

- A. Chief Magistrate Judge Boyle's Workload The number of civil consent cases under § 636(c) increased 16% during 2000. Likewise, additional civil duties under § 636(b) rose by 40%, with the largest increases attributable to dispositive motions, 67% and non-dispositive motions, 44%. On the criminal side, under 28 U.S.C. § 636(a) duties, search warrants increased 87%, grand jury sessions went up 75% while initial appearances rose 15%. Under 28 U.S.C. § 636(b) duties (felonies), non-dispositive motions increased by 111%, writs went up 29% and probation/ supervised released hearings rose 24%.
- **B.** Magistrate Judge Williams' Workload There was a dramatic 21% increase in additional civil duties under § 636(b). Some of the individual elements, which accounted for this growth included a 288% increase in social security appeals, a 35% increase in non-dispositive motions and a 22% increase in dispositive motions. Also, under the supplemental civil consent category, the number of motions increased some 64%. Although criminal duties under 28 U.S.C. § 636(a) dropped 7% overall, there were significant increases in areas such as arraignments, which skyrocketed 867%, summonses, which went up 75%, and "other" that escalated 152%.



C. <u>Magistrate Judge Court Hours</u> During 2000, the number of Magistrate Judge court hours decreased by 10%. Although approximately 63% of the magistrate court proceedings took place in Boise, both magistrate judges routinely conducted court proceedings in Pocatello, Moscow, and Coeur d'Alene. In fact, the amount of court hours conducted at divisional offices rose dramatically during the past year, especially Pocatello, which increased 152% and accounted for 21% of the total magistrate court hours.
