

GOVERNMENT NEWS & LEGISLATION Connie Dobrin

OMB PROJECTS A 3.6 PERCENT PAY RAISE FOR FEDS - Based on new figures recently released by the Office of Management and Budget, it appears that federal employees may be slated to receive a 3.6 percent pay raise next year, and a 3.9 percent pay raise for each of the following four years. OMB issued the numbers in connection with an amendment to OMB Circular A-76, which sets out the procedure agencies must use when deciding whether to contract out federal jobs. Agencies use OMB's pay raise figures to compute the cost of keeping the work "in-house," or being performed by federal employees instead of contractors. The amendment can be found in the March 14th Federal Register.

CONGRESSMAN CALLS FOR FREEZE IN CONTRACTING - Concerned that federal dollars are

being wasted contracting out services that could be performed for less money by federal employees, Rep. Albert Wynn (D-Maryland) has reintroduced a bill this session that would freeze federal jobs being contracted out until agencies can substantiate that the move will save taxpayers money. The bill introduced during this Congressional session is H.R. 721. It has been co-sponsored by more than 100 representatives. Last year, Rep. Wynn introduced a similar bill that received the support of more than 200 co-sponsors, but did not make much progress. Several federal employee groups and unions - such as the American Federation of Government Employees (AFGE) and the Federal Managers Association (FMA) - strongly support the legislation.

BUSH BUDGET то REMOVE **FEHBP** CONTRACEPTIVE COVERAGE - The proposed budget submitted to Congress by President Bush contains an item that has several groups up in arms specifically; it proposes to repeal a 1998 provision requiring health insurance companies participating in the Federal Employees Health Benefits Program (FEHBP) to offer coverage for several different kinds of prescription contraceptives. Currently, health plans under the FEHBP must cover five kinds of contraceptives - Norplant, the Pill, Depo-Provera, the IUD, and the diaphragm. Under the Bush proposal, insurance companies would no longer have to cover these contraceptives. Even if the proposal is enacted, however, OPM officials have stated that insurance companies under the FEHBP would likely continue to cover one or more of the methods. The Bush proposal has met with some serious opposition from some on Capitol Hill, notably from Sen. Olympia Snowe (R-Maine) and Rep. Nina Lowey (D-New York), who have vowed to fight the measure.

GOVERNMENT MAY PICK UP LARGER PORTION **OF FEHBP PREMIUMS** - Under a bill introduced by Representative Steny Hoyer (D-Maryland), the federal government would pay a larger portion of federal employees' health insurance premiums. Currently, the federal government pays an average of between 72 and 75 percent of the premium cost, with employees paying the remainder. If H.R. 1307 becomes law, government-paid portion would however, the increase, so that the federal government would pay 80 percent of the health insurance premium cost. Two factors driving the legislation are the significant annual increases in the cost of Federal Employee Health Benefit Program (FEHBP) premiums, and the need to make federal employees' pay and benefits packages competitive for recruitment purposes. FEHBP health insurance premiums have risen more than 9 percent each year since 1999.

DOD CONTRACTORS OUTNUMBER CIVILIAN WORKERS - The Department of Defense reported to Congress last month that it previously underestimated the size of its contractor workforce. In fact, DoD says, in 1999 it had the equivalent of 734,000 contract workers performing services. Last August, DoD advised Congress that it estimated approximately 476,000 contractor personnel provided it with services in 1999. The larger, more accurate figure is the result of improvements in data collection and methodology. With 640,000 DoD civilian employees, the department now has more service contract workers than it does employees.

C Fund Posts Worst 12-Month Showing in its History - The most recent 12-month count of returns in the Thrift Savings Plan's common stock (C) fund was the worst since the fund's inception in 1988, showing a 21.63 percent loss in that period after the fund dropped 6.33 percent in March. The C fund has suffered eight losing months in the last 12. The most recent 12-month accounting was down significantly from the previous 12-month accounting (an 8.19 percent loss) in part because the March loss included in the latest count replaced the 9.74 percent gain of March 2000 that was in the previous accounting. Meanwhile, the bond (F) fund gained 0.51 percent last month for a 12-month gain of 12.61 percent while the government securities (G) fund gained 0.45 percent for a 12-month gain of 6.09 percent.

PUBLIC SERVICE RECOGNITION WEEK COMING

SOON! - Mark your calendars for May 10-13, 2001 those are the dates for this year's Public Service Recognition Week. Sponsored by the Public Employees Roundtable (PER), the four-day event will feature more than 100 government agencies, nonprofit organizations, and private companies all celebrating public employees' innovation and dedication. Participants will be entertained by marching bands, jazz combos, and barbershop quartets. Kids can meet Smokey the Bear, climb aboard an F-16, and take home free coloring posters, maps, and puzzles. Government workers will be on hand to answer questions about what they do and why they chose public service careers. The main event will be held on the Mall in Washington, D.C. More Women, Minorities Found in SES - The General Accounting Office has reported that more women and minorities were in the career Senior Executive Service during the 1990s. This occurred during a period of more downsizing across the government. The career SES ranged in size from

7,583 members in 1992 to 6,183 in 1998, the GAO found. But the proportion of women went from 9.5 percent in 1990 to 21.8 percent in 1999. Minorities grew from 7.4 percent to 13 percent over the same time. Due to retirements and replacement, the dominant position of white males in the ranks of the SES diminished proportionally, from 84 percent in 1990 to 69 percent in 1999. The number of women arew from 626 in 1990 to 1.352 in 1999, and the number of minorities increased from 487 to 807, according to the report. It said African Americans increased from 4.6 percent to 7.8 percent of the career SES during the 1990s. In addition, the number of Native Americans increased from 0.6 percent to 1.1 percent. The proportions of Asian Americans and Hispanics over the period studied were slightly more than the percentage of Native Americans. At the same time, the numbers of white women increased from 8.2 percent to 17.6 percent during the 1990s. African American women grew from just under 1 percent to 2.7 percent.

IF YOU LOSE YOUR PURSE OR WALLET Article Submitted by Debbie Ward

We've all heard horror stories about fraud that's committed using your name, address, SS#, etc. Unfortunately I have first hand knowledge, because my wallet was stolen last month and within a week they'd ordered an expensive monthly cell phone package, applied for a VISA credit card had a credit line approved to buy a Gateway computer, received a PIN number from DMV to change my driving record info online, and more. Here's some critical info, to limit the damage in case this happens to you or someone you know.

As everyone always advises, cancel your credit cards immediately, but the key is having the toll free numbers and your card numbers handy so you know whom to call. Keep those where you can find them easily (having to hunt for them is additional stress you WON'T need at that point!).

File a police report immediately in the jurisdiction where it was stolen, this proves to credit providers you were diligent, and is a first step toward an investigation (if there ever is one).

But here's what is perhaps most important: Call the three national credit reporting organizations immediately to place a fraud alert on your name and SS#. I had never heard of doing that until advised by a bank that called to tell me an application for credit was made over the Internet in my name. The alert means any company that checks your credit knows your info was stolen and they have to contact you by phone to authorize new credit. By the time I was advised to do this [almost 2 weeks after the theft all the damage had been done (there are records of all the credit checks initiated by the thieves' purchases, none of which I knew about before placing the alert). Since then, no additional damage has been done, and the thieves threw my wallet away this weekend (someone turned it in). It seems to have stopped them in their tracks.

2002 FEW National Training Program (NTP) Clara Anderson

The 2002 NTP Team has been busy this past month. We have a contract with the Sheraton World Hotel (just south of the Beeline on I-Drive) to provide 600 overflow hotel rooms. Patt Franc, the Chair of the NTP Advisory Team (NAT), negotiated a good deal for us. We have forwarded our recommendation for the exhibit decorator contract to the NAT and are awaiting approval from the FEW President All we need to complete our Exhibit, Advertisement and Sponsorship book is the layout for the exhibit space. The Statement of Work for the Registration Service contract went to the NAT in March. We are waiting for comments before proceeding to the next step, which will be submitting our own proposal to carry out the registration services. HEALTH CORNER Submitted by Vickie Hall

Let's say it's 6:15 p.m. and you're driving home (alone of course), after an unusually hard day on the job. You're really tired, upset and frustrated. Suddenly you start experiencing severe pain in your chest that starts to radiate out into your arm and up into your jaw. You are only about five miles from the hospital nearest your home, unfortunately you don't know if you'll be able to make it that far. What can you do? You've been trained in CPR but the guy [~] that taught the course neglected to tell you how to perform it on yourself.

HOW TO SURVIVE A HEART ATTACK WHEN **ALONE:** Since many people are alone when they suffer a heart attack, this article seemed in order. Without help, the person whose heart stops beating properly and who begins to feel faint, has only about 10 seconds left before losing consciousness. However, these victims can help themselves by coughing repeatedly and very vigorously. A deep breath should be taken before each cough, and the cough must be deep and prolonged, as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest. A breath and a cough must be repeated about every two seconds without letting up until help arrives, or until the heart is to be beating normally again. Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating. The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it regain normal rhythm. In this way, heart attack victims can get to a hospital. Tell as many other people as possible about this - it could save their lives!
