April Programs Offered at Saguaro National Park

Saguaro National Park is offering a series of programs this spring that will explore the wonderful natural and cultural history of the park. Join naturalists for an evening walk in the park or join a local expert for a presentation in the visitor center. Programs will be offered at both districts. There is no charge for interpretive programs, but park entrance fees apply.

Special Programs offered at the Rincon Mountain District (Saguaro East) include:

April 1 8:30 a.m. Desert Bird Walk

Bring your binoculars and join the quest for desert birds. This easy 2-hour, 1-mile walk will introduce you to some of the birds that call Saguaro National Park home. Reserve a space on this walk by calling the visitor center at (520) 733-5153. *This program will also be offered on April 8.*

April 1 9:00 a.m. Desert Morning Hike

Join a park naturalist for this 3–hour, 4-mile exploration of Saguaro National Park. Wear sturdy hiking shoes and bring water and a trail snack. Advance registration is recommended; call the visitor center at (520) 733-5153 to sign up. *This program will also be offered on 2, 8, 9, 15 and 16.*

April 5 10:00 Fiesta de Saguaro

This special event, which begins at 10:00 am and concludes at 4:00 pm, celebrates the area's Hispanic heritage and culture. The event will include guest speakers, exhibits, craft demonstrators, children's activities, Folklorico dancers and a mariachi band w. Vendors will also be on site preparing and selling traditional food. A fee shuttle service will be provided from the Sahuaro Baptist Church, located at Old Spanish Trail (at Houghton Road). April 6 10:00 a.m. 1933 to Today: Saguaro National Park

This year Saguaro National Park celebrates its 75th Birthday. To celebrate, the park is offering a special series of programs highlighting important park themes. April 12 7:00 – 10:30 a.m. Buffelgrass Weed Pull (Rincon Mtn District)

Volunteers will work with Park staff to remove a patch of buffelgrass, an invasive non-native plant which threatens the Sonoran Desert. We will be meeting at the Visitors Center and then carpool to the Javelina picnic area work site. Please park in the Administrative Parking Lot (1st right after entering the park, follow around to lot just south of Visitor Center Parking Lot). Wear sturdy hiking shoes, long pants and a hat. Bring water and gloves (if you have them); tools and gloves will be provided. Following the event, we will relax over snacks and beverages. April 17 7:00 p.m. Strange Looking Plants in Saguaro National Park

April 3 1:45 p.m. Messages from the Past

People have lived in the Sonoran Desert area for 11,000 years. Come along on a Ranger-guided walk to Signal Hill to view and enjoy some of the evidence people of the past have left behind. ¹/₂ mile, 1 ¹/₂ hours. This program is offered April 3, 10 and 17th at 1:45 p.m.

April 4 11:45 a.m. and 2:15 p.m. CCC and Saguaro National Park

Learn the history of the Civilian Conservation Corps workers in the Tucson Mountains, the projects they undertook and their lasting legacy as both the CCC and Saguaro National Park celebrate 75 years since their creation. The program consists of a brief (15-20 min) slide show. This program is also given on the following dates and times: April 11 and 12 at 11:45 a.m. and 3:15 p.m. each day. Program is accessible.

April 5 7:00 a.m. Bird Walk

Join experienced birding guide John Higgins to see some of the twenty five species of birds that are year-round residents of Saguaro National Park. Meet at the Red Hills Visitor Center, 2700 N. Kinney Road. The group will caravan to several nearby locations. The walking is considered easy, on flat but dirt and rocky trails. Persons of all ages, with or without bird watching experience, are welcome. Participants are encouraged to bring water and sun protection, and binoculars and bird guides if you have them. April 5 10:45 a.m. Homesteading Adventures in the Desert

Help us celebrate 75 years of Saguaro National Park as a park ranger presents the oral history surrounding Mexican American homesteader's adventures in and around our Saguaro National Park. This program also given April 6, 7 at 10:45 a.m. and April 9 at 11:45 a.m. Program is accessible.

April 5 2:15 p.m. Snakes, Lizards and Desert Tortoises

A 40 min. patio presentation on communication skills, special adaptations and defense systems of these often misunderstood creatures. A little bit of folk lore is also shared. **This program is also given at 2:15 p.m. on April 6**, **7**, **8** and **9**th. <u>Program is accessible.</u>

April 5 4:45 p.m. Twilight Hike

These hikes are 2 to 2½ miles and 2 to 2½ hours in length. They are scheduled to begin approximately one hour before sunset. The terrain is sandy, with some rock outcroppings. Some of these can be skirted, but some must be climbed. We will return to the parking area in the fading light after sunset on an alternate trail or along a rocky old mining road. As space is limited, <u>advance registration is required</u> and can be made by calling the visitor center at (520) 733-5158. *This program will also be offered on April 19 at 5:00 p.m.*

April 6 1:15 p.m. Masters of Microscopes: 75 Years to Decode the Desert

Our understanding of saguaro cactus ecology today is thanks to several fearless botanists who made their home at the edge of the Tucson Mountains in 1909, to count cacti and watch the desert grow. In the program, meet these few, whose investigations first made sense of the Sonoran Desert's thorny bewildering life forms and whose fierce love for the desert made Saguaro National Park more than just a conservationist's daydream.

April 6 3:15 p.m. Thelma's World: Meet the Desert Tortoise

Spy on the tortoises's private life and learn to track them with radiotelemetry.

April 7 1:15 p.m. A Hohokam Woman's Day

Take a 30 minute, 100 yard walk in our Cactus Garden Walk to discover how a Hohokam Woman may have used the plants for medicinal solutions and food for her family. <u>Program is accessible</u>. **Also offered April 8 at 11:45 a.m.**

Because it is National Park Week, **a special tour** of the site of Camp Pima, a CCC camp located in Saguaro National Park West, will be offered after the talk. Approx. 2 hours.

April 26 10:30 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. National Junior Ranger Day

Help celebrate National Junior Ranger Day 2008. Join a park ranger for a two-hour, one-mile guided hike in Javelina Wash. Hikes are scheduled at 10:30 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. There will be a graduation ceremony in the Visitor Center Auditorium following the hike. Dress for the weather, bring water, wear comfortable hiking shoes, and a hat. This event is for ages 6-13 and families must attend with the Junior Rangers.
