Dear Secretary Slater:

I am writing in strong support of Representative James C. Greenwood of Pennsylvania, and Senators Spector and Santorum. These distinguished gentlemen have requested acceleration of the issuance of final rule on Truck Trailer Conspicuity, as provided for in the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century (TEA-21, formerly **ISTEA**), signed by President Clinton on June 9, 1998. **Title IV**, Motor Carrier Safety, **Sec 4025** of the transportation bill provides for a one year decision period on tractor-trailer conspicuity (lights/reflective tape), but this window is too long.

It is of the utmost importance that this ruling be made as soon as possible. Statistics provided by the Department of Transportation, National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), Research and Development Section, for 1996 show that 4,072 people were killed in crashes involving large trucks. Figures for 1997 were not available but totals for each of the prior ten years show the fatality rate is over 4,000 each year. This is unacceptable and can't be allowed to continue.

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Thank you for your time and attention to this important matter.. It is imperative that truck safety becomes a priority for this country.

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It is of the utmost importance that this ruling be made as soon as possible. Statistics recently provided by Citizens for Reliable and Safe Highways (CRASH) for 1996, show that there were 393,000 truck crashes in the United States resulting in 5,126 fatalities and 130,000 injuries, a far higher number than that previously quoted in Department of Transportation (DOT) statistics; one out of every eight fatalities in 1996 resulted from a collision with a large truck; when trucks and cars collided, 98% of the deaths were to car occupants; 615 truck drivers were killed on the job in 1996, making truck driving one of the most dangerous occupations in the country; and preliminary statistics show a 16% increase in truck occupant fatalities for 1997 (Sources: U.S. Department of Transportation, National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (NHTSA), Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, U.S. Department of Labor, 1996). This is unacceptable and can't be allowed to continue.
