

Waterfowl artists from around the nation enter work in this prestigious annual competition, in hopes that their piece will be selected as the following year's Federal Duck Stamp. Duck stamps are purchased by hunters and sought after by stamp collectors. Since the program's inception, duck stamp sales have raised more than half a billion dollars to conserve some 5 million acres of wildlife habitat, making this one of the most successful conservation programs ever initiated.

A panel of noted art, waterfowl, and philatelic authorities is appointed by the Secretary of the Interior to judge the competition. Winners receive no compen-





sation for their work but they may sell prints of their designs, which are highly-sought after by hunters, conservationists, and art collectors.

The Family Day on Saturday September 30 at Memphis College of Art is also free, and will feature duck calling lessons, arts and wildlife activities, a special appearance by the famous Peabody Hotel ducks, information on the Junior Duck Stamp Program, and much more. A variety of artist lectures, tours, and workshops are also scheduled.

Stamp collectors and waterfowl enthusiasts alike will enjoy the opportunity to see rare items from Jeanette C. Rudy's private Federal Duck Stamp collection, previously exhibited at the Smithsonian's National Postal Museum. The first rounds of judging on Friday, October 6 will also be exciting, as the prestigious panel of judges begins the live review of more than 200 contest entries. At the same time, waterfowl decoy appraisals will be offered by Guyette & Schmidt, the world's largest antique decoy auction firm. These events are free and open to the public.
