H.R. 1104

A bill to authorize the Secretary of the Interior to transfer administrative jurisdiction over land within the boundaries of the Home of Franklin D. Roosevelt National Historic Site to the Archivist of the United States for the construction of a visitor center

As ordered reported by the House Committee on Resources on May 5, 1999

CBO estimates that implementing H.R. 1104 would have no significant impact on the federal budget. The bill would not affect direct spending or receipts; therefore, pay-as-you-go procedures would not apply. H.R. 1104 contains no private-sector or intergovernmental mandates as defined in the Unfunded Mandates Reform Act and would not affect the budgets of state, local, or tribal governments.

H.R. 1104 would authorize the National Park Service to transfer to the National Archives administrative jurisdiction of about one acre of land at the Home of Franklin D. Roosevelt National Historic Site. The Archives would use the transferred parcel to construct a visitor center that would jointly serve the historic site and the Franklin D. Roosevelt Presidential Library.

Because authority to construct the visitor center already exists, implementing H.R. 1104 would have no significant effect on the federal budget. The National Archives has already received over \$8 million in federal appropriations for this purpose.
