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G. P. O. TROUBLES MAY GO TO COURT

Suspicion Regarding Holdings of Stock. That certain phases of the Government Printing Office muddle may receive attention of a grand jury is intimated in quarters which make claim to being in touch with both the Keep Commission and the general conditions at the office.

Although there has been no expression so far as is known, from any members of the commission to indicate what particular set of conditions the commissioners consider entitled to the consideration of a grand jury, it is understood that the stockholding interests of some families in a typesetting machine company have been of especial interest to the commissioners.

Big Holdings of Stock. Between 1,500 and 2,000 shares of this stock are understood, at the printing office, to be held by members of the families of people in the employ of the printer. This would represent from \$23,500 to \$30,000 cash value at the quotation of \$16 per share.

Terms on which these holdings were acquired have had a particular interest for people at the office who are not interested in any such investments. This story that the contract would be sustained was based on the understanding that when the President raised his objections to further procedure, and ordered the investigation, the prize had already been divided in by the Lanston people. The question then concerns the legal status of the contract.

It is supposed that there will be no more public proceedings in the matter for at least a month or two. In the case have till July 25 to prepare their briefs. There will be a special meeting of the school board at Franklin School tomorrow night at 8 o'clock, for the purpose of disposing of the Swartzell-Wilson case, which has aroused so much interest.

Petition From Alumni. A petition from the alumni of Central was sent last week and also one from the pupils and patrons of the school. Persons interested in the welfare of the public schools who have no immediate connection with Central or Eastern, have added their names to the list of those protesting against the transfer of Mr. Wilson, and if public sentiment is taken into account the board will at a meeting decide to leave Mr. Wilson where he is.

What is to become of F. F. Swartzell, the principal of Eastern, cannot be learned from his own report, but his administration has not been successful, and for that reason, the board is desirous of getting rid of him. Mr. Wilson's past record is not so good, but he has been in the Central during the past three years and the suggestion that he be sent to Eastern is being considered.

So vigorous has been the opposition, however, from almost every quarter, that it is believed that the school board will not make some other disposition of Mr. Swartzell.

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JEROME RECEIVES HENDRICKS REPORT

District Attorney Will Now See What He Can Find in It as Basis for Criminal Proceedings. NEW YORK, July 17.—The much-awaited copy of the evidence taken by Superintendent of Insurance Hendricks, in his investigation of the Equitable Life Assurance Society, for which District Attorney Jerome has been fighting for several days, was forwarded to the district attorney's office this morning.

The papers were sent by Robert H. Hunter, deputy state superintendent, who had refused all demands for the evidence. It was sent by special messenger, Assistant District Attorney Garvin, who received the report, signed a receipt for it.

The evidence is wanted by District Attorney Jerome, who is being kept in the dark as to whether any of the information counted with the Equitable can be held under criminal proceedings for the state of affairs disclosed by the investigation of the scandal.

JUDGE WRIGHT DENIES SOLDIER'S PETITION. Justice Wright today denied the petition of Alexander M. Willis, who sought to secure his release from St. Elizabeth's Hospital for the Insane through habeas corpus proceedings. Willis was a volunteer soldier in the United States army, during the Civil War. He was several years ago admitted to the Soldiers' National Home, and from there was transferred to St. Elizabeth's Hospital for treatment, because of his alleged insanity.

In the petition for his release Willis stated that he had never been insane, and that he had never been committed to a hospital. The court directed that Willis' mental condition be determined by a jury July 26 instant. Edwin M. Forrest appeared as counsel for the petitioner and Assistant District Attorney Kelgwin represented the Government.

POLICE SURGEON VALE HANDS IN RESIGNATION. Dr. F. P. Vale, of the Board of Police and Fire Surgeons, has resigned, and his resignation has been accepted by the Commissioners, to take effect today. Under the order made by the Commissioners, August 1, 1933, the vacancy will be filled by a doctor of medicine, to be appointed by the United States Civil Service Commission.

Arrangements were made in August, 1932, by Commissioner Macfarland, with the Civil Service Commission so as to have such examinations made, as a matter of course, to the Commissioners, for there is no law providing for them.

The last appointment to the Board of Police and Fire Surgeons was Dr. Joseph S. Wall, which was made as the result of a competitive examination held at that time when Dr. Wall headed the list of eligibles.

Whole List Shows Strength at Advancing Figures.

LONDON BOUGHT HEAVILY. Union and Southern Pacific and Copper Score Advances—Advances in First Hour Up to One Point.

NEW YORK, July 17.—The stock market opened stronger on a moderate volume. Tennessee Coal and Iron advanced 1/2 and Metropolitan Street Railway 3/4. Illinois Central and Union Pacific gained a maximum of 1/2. Amalgamated Copper rose 3/4, but Anaconda gained 1/2 per cent. Steel common was the only stock nominally lower, but the preferred gained 3/4. Brooklyn Rapid Transit rose 1/2, Ontario and Western 3/4, and Smelters 1/2.

There has been a general demonstration of strength all through the list since the opening, with the buying orders scattered. London was a buyer of stocks, including Union Pacific, Baltimore and Ohio, Erie, and Ontario and Western. Union Pacific, Southern Pacific and Amalgamated Copper were bought on anticipated developments at the coming meetings this week. Among the gossip on the Street is a story that United Copper will be absorbed by Amalgamated, Metropolitan Street Railway was strong and advanced to 137 1/2. Prices of many issues advanced in the first hour 1/2 to 1 point over the opening figures. Government bonds unchanged, railroad and other bonds firm.
