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WILDLIFE RESTORATION ACT TURNS 50; STATES TO RECEIVE OVER \$180 MILLION IN FEDERAL SPORT FISH AND WILDLIFE RESTORATION FUNDS

Federal sport fish and wildlife restoration programs, which began 50 years ago with the signing of the Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Act, will make over \$180 million available to states, commonwealths, and territories through the preliminary apportionment for fiscal year 1988, Secretary of the Interior Don Hodel announced today.

The Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Act, commonly called the Pittman-Robertson Act after its sponsors Senator Key Pittman (Nevada) and Congressman A. Willis Robertson (Virginia), was signed into law September 2, 1937. Since then, more than \$1.5 billion has been distributed to states to help finance wildlife restoration and hunter education programs.

An additional \$700 million has been distributed for fishery programs through the Federal Aid in Sport Fish Restoration Act since it was signed in 1950. The wildlife and fishery restoration programs are financed by hunters and anglers through excise taxes on sporting equipment such as firearms, ammunition, and fishing tackle and are administered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

According to Secretary Hodel, "Pittman-Robertson funding is the mainstay behind modern wildlife management programs. During the last 50 years, it has made possible the restoration of many of this country's most popular wildlife species, including the white-tailed deer and wild turkey. In addition, other species, such as the wood duck and pronghorn antelope, that were nearing extinction a half-century ago, have been brought back to relative abundance-by this program." The preliminary apportionment for wildlife restoration and hunter education programs for fiscal year 1988 is \$71,900,000. This money comes from an 11-percent excise tax on sporting arms and ammunition, a 10-percent tax on pistols and revolvers, and an 11-percent tax on certain archery equipment. One-half of the taxes on handguns and archery equipment is earmarked for state hunter education programs.

The preliminary apportionment for sport fish restoration for fiscal year 1988 totals \$108,700,000. This money comes from a 10-percent excise tax on fishing equipment and a 3-percent tax on electric trolling motors and sonar fish finders. The "Wallop-Breaux" expansion legislation of 1984 increased the tax base for sport fish restoration to include a portion of the Federal motorboat fuels tax and import duties on fishing tackle and pleasure boats.

Distribution of sport fish restoration funds to the states is based on the land and water area and the number of fishing license holders in each state. Wildlife restoration funds are made available based on land area and the number of hunting license holders in each state. Distribution of hunter education funds is based on the relative population of each state.

The attached tables show the allocation of the preliminary apportionments for fiscal year 1988. The final apportionment will be announced in the spring of 1988.
