

CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE COST ESTIMATE

S. 1646

A bill to identify certain routes in the states of Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, and New Mexico as part of the Ports-to-Plains Corridor, a high-priority corridor on the National Highway System

As ordered reported by the Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works on April 25, 2002

Current law identifies certain roadways as high-priority corridors, and states are authorized to spend a portion of their grants from the Federal-Aid Highway program on the construction of those corridors. S. 1646 would clarify the description of the Ports-to-Plains Corridor, a group of roadways identified as a high-priority corridor under current law.

- S. 1646 would not authorize additional spending on the Ports-to-Plains corridor, and CBO estimates that implementing the bill would not have a significant impact on the federal budget. The bill would not affect direct spending or receipts; therefore, pay-as-you-go procedures do not apply.
- S. 1646 contains no intergovernmental or private-sector mandates as defined in the Unfunded Mandates Reform Act and would impose no costs on state, local, or tribal governments.
