A BILL

- To establish a Science and Technology Scholarship Program to award scholarships to recruit and prepare students for careers in the National Weather Service and in National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration marine research, atmospheric research, and satellite programs.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY SCHOLARSHIP 4 PROGRAM.

- 5 (a) ESTABLISHMENT OF PROGRAM.—
- 6 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Administrator is au-7 thorized to establish a Science and Technology

Scholarship Program to award scholarships to indi viduals that is designed to recruit and prepare stu dents for careers in the National Weather Service
 and in Administration marine research, atmospheric
 research, and satellite programs.

6 (2) COMPETITIVE PROCESS.—Individuals shall 7 be selected to receive scholarships under this section 8 through a competitive process primarily on the basis 9 of academic merit, with consideration given to finan-10 cial need and the goal of promoting the participation 11 of individuals identified in section 33 or 34 of the 12 Science and Engineering Equal Opportunities Act 13 (42 U.S.C. 1885a or 1885b).

14 (3) SERVICE AGREEMENTS.—To carry out the 15 scholarship program, the Administrator shall enter 16 into contractual agreements with individuals selected 17 under paragraph (2) under which the individuals 18 agree to serve as full-time employees of the Adminis-19 tration, for the period described in subsection (f)(1), 20 in positions needed by the Administration in fields 21 described in paragraph (1) and for which the indi-22 viduals are qualified, in exchange for receiving a 23 scholarship.

(b) SCHOLARSHIP ELIGIBILITY.—In order to be eligi ble to participate in the scholarship program, an individual
 shall—

4 (1) be enrolled or accepted for enrollment as a
5 full-time student at an institution of higher edu6 cation in an academic program or field of study de7 scribed in the list made available under subsection
8 (d);

9 (2) be a United States citizen or permanent10 resident; and

(3) at the time of the initial scholarship award,
not be a Federal employee as defined in section
2105 of title 5 of the United States Code.

(c) APPLICATION REQUIRED.—An individual seeking
a scholarship under this section shall submit an application to the Administrator at such time, in such manner,
and containing such information, agreements, or assurances as the Administrator may require to carry out this
section.

20 (d) ELIGIBLE ACADEMIC PROGRAMS.—The Adminis21 trator shall make publicly available a list of academic pro22 grams and fields of study for which scholarships may be
23 utilized in fields described in subsection (a)(1), and shall
24 update the list as necessary.

25 (e) Scholarship Requirement.—

1 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Administrator may pro-2 vide a scholarship under the scholarship program for 3 an academic year if the individual applying for the 4 scholarship has submitted to the Administrator, as 5 part of the application required under subsection (c), 6 a proposed academic program leading to a degree in 7 a program or field of study on the list made avail-8 able under subsection (d).

9 (2) DURATION OF ELIGIBILITY.—An individual
10 may not receive a scholarship under this section for
11 more than 4 academic years, unless the Adminis12 trator grants a waiver.

(3) SCHOLARSHIP AMOUNT.—The dollar
amount of a scholarship under this section for an
academic year shall be determined under regulations
issued by the Administrator, but shall in no case exceed the cost of attendance.

(4) AUTHORIZED USES.—A scholarship provided under this section may be expended for tuition,
fees, and other authorized expenses as established by
the Administrator by regulation.

(5) CONTRACTS REGARDING DIRECT PAYMENTS
TO INSTITUTIONS.—The Administrator may enter
into a contractual agreement with an institution of
higher education under which the amounts provided

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for a scholarship under this section for tuition, fees,
 and other authorized expenses are paid directly to
 the institution with respect to which the scholarship
 is provided.

5 (f) Period of Obligated Service.—

6 (1) DURATION OF SERVICE.—Except as pro-7 vided in subsection (h)(2), the period of service for 8 which an individual shall be obligated to serve as an 9 employee of the Administration shall be 24 months 10 for each academic year for which a scholarship 11 under this section is provided.

12 (2) Schedule for service.—

(A) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in
subparagraph (B), obligated service under paragraph (1) shall begin not later than 60 days
after the individual obtains the educational degree for which the scholarship was provided.

18 (B) DEFERRAL.—The Administrator may 19 defer the obligation of an individual to provide 20 a period of service under paragraph (1) if the 21 Administrator determines that such a deferral 22 is appropriate. The Administrator shall pre-23 scribe the terms and conditions under which a 24 service obligation may be deferred through reg-25 ulation.

1 (g) Penalties for Breach of Scholarship 2 Agreement.—

3 (1) FAILURE TO COMPLETE ACADEMIC TRAIN-ING.—Scholarship recipients who fail to maintain a 4 5 high level of academic standing, as defined by the 6 Administrator by regulation, who are dismissed from 7 their educational institutions for disciplinary rea-8 sons, or who voluntarily terminate academic training 9 before graduation from the educational program for 10 which the scholarship was awarded, shall be in 11 breach of their contractual agreement and, in lieu of 12 any service obligation arising under such agreement, 13 shall be liable to the United States for repayment 14 not later than 1 year after the date of default of all 15 scholarship funds paid to them and to the institution 16 of higher education on their behalf under the agree-17 ment, except as provided in subsection (h)(2). The 18 repayment period may be extended by the Adminis-19 trator when determined to be necessary, as estab-20 lished by regulation.

(2) FAILURE TO BEGIN OR COMPLETE THE
SERVICE OBLIGATION OR MEET THE TERMS AND
CONDITIONS OF DEFERMENT.—A scholarship recipient who, for any reason, fails to begin or complete
a service obligation under this section after comple-

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1	tion of academic training, or fails to comply with the
2	terms and conditions of deferment established by the
3	Administrator pursuant to subsection $(f)(2)(B)$,
4	shall be in breach of the contractual agreement.
5	When a recipient breaches an agreement for the rea-
6	sons stated in the preceding sentence, the recipient
7	shall be liable to the United States for an amount
8	equal to—
9	(A) the total amount of scholarships re-
10	ceived by such individual under this section;
11	plus
12	(B) the interest on the amounts of such
13	awards which would be payable if at the time
14	the awards were received they were loans bear-
15	ing interest at the maximum legal prevailing
16	rate, as determined by the Treasurer of the
17	United States.
18	(h) WAIVER OR SUSPENSION OF OBLIGATION.—
19	(1) DEATH OF INDIVIDUAL.—Any obligation of
20	an individual incurred under the scholarship pro-
21	gram (or a contractual agreement thereunder) for
22	service or payment shall be canceled upon the death
23	of the individual.
24	(2) Impossibility or extreme hardship.—
25	The Administrator shall by regulation provide for

the partial or total waiver or suspension of any obli-
gation of service or payment incurred by an indi-
vidual under the scholarship program (or a contrac-
tual agreement thereunder) whenever compliance by
the individual is impossible or would involve extreme
hardship to the individual, or if enforcement of such
obligation with respect to the individual would be
contrary to the best interests of the Government.
(i) DEFINITIONS.—In this Act the following defini-
tions apply:
(1) Administration.—The term "Administra-
tion" means the National Oceanic and Atmospheric
Administration.
(2) Administrator.—The term "Adminis-
trator" means the Administrator of the National
Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.
(3) Cost of attendance.—The term "cost of
attendance" has the meaning given that term in sec-
tion 472 of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 $$
U.S.C. 1087ll).
(4) INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION.—The
term "institution of higher education" has the
meaning given that term in section 101(a) of the

(5) SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM.—The term "schol arship program" means the Science and Technology
 Scholarship Program established under this section.

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
