AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE TO H.R. 1717

OFFERED BY MR. LANGEVIN OF RHODE ISLAND

Strike all after the enacting clause and insert the following:

1 SECTION 1. NATIONAL BIO- AND AGRO-DEFENSE FACILITY.

2 (a) IN GENERAL.— Title III of the Homeland Secu3 rity Act of 2002 (6. U.S.C. 181 et seq.) is amended by
4 adding at the end the following new section:

5 "SEC. 316. NATIONAL BIO- AND AGRO-DEFENSE FACILITY.

6 "(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is in the Department
7 a National Bio- and Agro-defense Facility (referred to in
8 this section as the 'NBAF'), which shall be headed by a
9 Director who shall be appointed by the Secretary.

10 "(b) Purposes.—

11 "(1) IN GENERAL.—The NBAF shall be an in-12 tegrated foreign-animal and zoonotic disease re-13 search, development, testing, and evaluation facility, 14 the purpose of which is to support the Department, 15 the Department of Agriculture, and the Department 16 of Health and Human Services in defending against 17 the threat of potential acts of agroterrorism and 18 natural-occurring incidents related to agriculture

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with the potential to adversely impact animal health,
 public health, and the economy, or may otherwise
 impact homeland security.
 "(2) KNOWLEDGE PRODUCTION AND SHAR-

5 ING.—The NBAF shall produce and share knowl-6 edge and technology for the purpose of protecting 7 animal health and public health and reducing eco-8 nomic losses caused by foreign-animal, zoonotic, and, 9 as appropriate, endemic animal diseases of livestock 10 and poultry.

11 "(c) RESPONSIBILITIES.—The Secretary, acting12 through the Director, shall—

"(1) manage, operate, and maintain the NBAF;
"(2) establish priorities and develop a joint
strategy with the Secretary of Agriculture for foreign animal disease, including foot and mouth disease, and zoonotic disease research, development,
testing, and evaluation, and diagnostic activities undertaken at the NBAF, including—

20 "(A) developing countermeasures for for21 eign-animal, zoonotic, and, as appropriate,
22 other endemic animal diseases, including
23 diagnostics, vaccines and therapeutics;

24 "(B) providing advanced test and evalua-25 tion capability for threat detection, vulner-

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1	ability, and countermeasure assessment for for-
2	eign-animal, zoonotic, and, as appropriate, en-
3	demic animal diseases;
4	"(C) conducting animal model development
5	and testing and evaluation under the Food and
6	Drug Administration's Animal Rule as defined
7	in parts 314 and 601 of title 22, Code of Fed-
8	eral Regulations, to support the development of
9	human medical countermeasures by the Depart-
10	ment of Human Services under the Public
11	Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 201 et seq);
12	"(D) establishing for the NBAF informa-
13	tion-sharing mechanisms or using existing in-
14	formation-sharing mechanisms of the Depart-
15	ment of Agriculture to share information with
16	relevant stakeholders, including the National
17	Animal Health Laboratory Network; and
18	"(E) identifying and promoting uniform
19	national standards for animal disease
20	diagnostics;
21	"(3) implement the Department's responsibil-

22 ities at the NBAF with respect to the strategy devel23 oped under paragraph (2);

24 "(4) facilitate the coordination of Federal,25 State, and local governmental research and develop-

ment efforts and resources relating to protecting
 animal health and public health from foreign-animal,
 zoonotic, and, as appropriate, other endemic animal
 diseases;

5 "(5) develop an emergency response plan under 6 which emergency response providers in the sur-7 rounding community are sufficiently prepared and 8 trained to respond effectively and given sufficient 9 notice to allow for an effective response;

10 "(6) ensure NBAF site and facility security;

"(7) provide training to research and technical
staff at the NBAF to equip them with the requisite
skills and expertise necessary to contribute to and
carry out operations at the NBAF; and

15 "(8) leverage the expertise of academic institu-16 tions, food, agriculture, and other industries, the De-17 partment of Energy National Laboratories, State 18 and local governmental resources, and professional 19 organizations involved in veterinary, medical and 20 public health, and agriculture issues to carry out activities described in paragraph (2).

"(d) REQUIREMENTS.—The Secretary, in designing
and constructing the NBAF, shall ensure that the facility
meets the following requirements:

1 "(1) The NBAF shall consist of state-of-the-art 2 biocontainment laboratories capable of performing 3 research and activities at Biosafety Level 3 and 4. 4 "(2) The NBAF shall be of sufficient size in 5 terms of acreage and laboratory capacity and shall 6 be accessible to supporting infrastructure to enable 7 the Secretary to carry out the responsibilities under 8 subsection (c). 9 "(3) The NBAF shall be located at a site that 10 has been subject to an Environmental Impact State-11 ment under the National Environmental Policy Act 12 of 1969. 13 "(e) Authorization to Procure Real Property AND ACCEPT IN KIND DONATIONS FOR THE NBAF 14 15 SITE.—The Secretary may acquire real property for the NBAF through purchase or donation and may accept and 16 use in-kind donations of personal property, laboratory and 17 office space, utility services, and infrastructure upgrades 18 to carry out the purposes of this section. 19 20 "(f) LIVE VIRUS OF FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE RE-

20 (1) LIVE VILUS OF FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE RE21 SEARCH.—The Secretary shall enable the study of live
22 virus of foot and mouth disease at the NBAF, wherever
23 it is sited, in accordance with the Agricultural Bioter24 rorism Protection Act of 2002 (7 U.S.C. 8401 note), not25 withstanding section 113a of title 21, United States Code,

or any other provision of law that limits the study of the
 live virus of foot and mouth disease on the mainland of
 the United States.

- 4 "(g) COORDINATION.—
- 5 "(1) INTERAGENCY AGREEMENTS.—

6 "(A) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall 7 seek to enter into understandings or agree-8 ments with the heads of appropriate Federal 9 departments and agencies, including the Sec-10 retary of Agriculture and the Secretary of 11 Health and Human Services, or shall use exist-12 ing understandings or agreements, to define the 13 respective roles and responsibilities of each De-14 in carrying out foreign-animal, partment 15 zoonotic, and endemic animal disease research 16 and development at the NBAF to protect public 17 health and animal health.

18 "(B) DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE.—At 19 least one of the understandings or agreements 20 referred to in subparagraph (A) between the 21 Secretary and the Secretary of Agriculture shall 22 include a provision describing research, develop-23 ment, testing, and evaluation programs and 24 functions of the Department of Agriculture and 25 the Department of Homeland Security, includ-

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ing those research programs and functions to be transferred from the Plum Island Animal Disease Center to the NBAF.

4 "(C) DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES.—At least one of the under-5 6 standings or agreements referred to in subpara-7 graph (A) between the Secretary and the Sec-8 retary of Health and Human Services shall de-9 scribe research, development, testing, and eval-10 uation programs of the Department of Health 11 and Human Services that relate to work con-12 ducted at the NBAF.

13 "(2) COOPERATIVE RELATIONSHIPS.—The Sec-14 retary, in coordination with the Secretary of Agri-15 culture, shall form cooperative relationships with the 16 National Animal Health Laboratory Network and 17 American Association of Veterinary Laboratory Di-18 agnosticians to connect with the network of Federal 19 and State resources intended to enable an inte-20 grated, rapid, and sufficient response to animal 21 health emergencies.

22 "(h) NBAF ADVISORY COMMITTEE.—

23 "(1) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary, in co24 ordination with the Secretary of Agriculture and, as
25 appropriate, the Secretary of Health and Human

1 Services, shall establish the National Bio- and Agro-2 Defense Advisory Committee (referred to in this sec-3 tion as the 'Advisory Committee') to provide expert 4 advice and guidance on the priorities and the strat-5 egy referred to in subsection (c)(1) for research, de-6 velopment, testing, and evaluation activities under-7 taken at the NBAF relating the foreign animal, 8 zoonotic, and, as appropriate, endemic animal dis-9 eases, and on other NBAF related matters identified 10 by the Secretary.

11 "(2) MEMBERSHIP.—The members of the Advi-12 sory Committee shall be individuals selected by the 13 Secretary in coordination with the Secretary of Agri-14 culture, who represent the Nation's leading experts 15 foreign animal and zoonotic disease, public on 16 health, and countermeasure research and develop-17 ment. Such individuals will be selected from Federal 18 and State governments, academia, and private in-19 dustry, and shall include relevant stakeholders from 20 the food, agriculture, and pharmaceutical industries.

21 "(3) EXEMPTION FROM FEDERAL ADVISORY
22 COMMITTEE ACT.—Section 14 of the Federal Advi23 sory Committee Act (5 U.S.C. App.) shall not apply
24 to the Advisory Committee.

"(4) TERMINATION.—The Advisory Committee
 shall terminate five years after the date on which
 the NBAF becomes operational.

4 "(i) Relationship to Other Departments and 5 AGENCIES.—The authority of the Secretary under this section shall not affect any authority or responsibility of 6 7 any other Federal department or agency with respect to 8 any program administered by that department or agency, 9 notwithstanding subsection (f), unless otherwise agreed to in an understanding or agreement referred to in sub-10 11 section (g)(1).".

(b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of contents
in section 1(b) of such Act is amended by adding at the
end of the items relating to title III the following:

"Sec. 316. National Bio- and Agro-defense Facility.".

Amend the title so as to read: "To amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to establish a National Bio- and Agro-defense Facility".
