Monuments and Memorials

Continuing tribute has been paid to the Wrights in the building and dedication of markers, memorials, and monuments in their honor—in France at Auvours, Hunaudières, Le Mans, and Pau and in the United States at Dayton, Ohio, Governors Island, New York, Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, and New Castle, Indiana.

The Auvours monument, a simple stone marker erected in 1913 bearing Wilbur's name with a bird poised in flight above, commemorating Wilbur's flights at Camp d'Auvours, France, in 1908, front and three-quarter front view.

Légion d'honneur, v. 1, Apr. 1933: 209

Wilbur Wright monument at Le Mans, France, the work of sculptor Paul Landowski and architect Paul Bigot, which was dedicated July 17, 1920. Views of the large gathering of prominent Frenchmen and Americans at the unveiling of the forty-foot-high monument in the Place des Jacobins, with the Cathedral of St. Julien in the background. The figures of Wilbur and Orville are carved in bas-relief at the base and, at the summit, is an allegorical figure, a man reaching to the skies, as if straining to overcome the restrictions of earth.

Wright brothers monument, Pau, France, dedicated January 30, 1932, to commemorate the first flights of Wilbur at Pau in 1909 and the training of the first French aviators there. The monument, a slender shaft, was the work of the Pau sculptor Ernest Gagard and shows the likenesses of Wilbur and Orville and a representation of one of their first machines in flight. The inscription reads, "Ici, en 1909, Wilbur Wright fit ses premiers vols."

Memorial tablet honoring Wilbur at Henry County Memorial Park, New Castle, Ind. Erected by the Phi Delta Kappa Fraternity on April 15, 1923, the marker is located on the spot where the farmhouse of Bishop Milton Wright originally stood. The inscription reads, "Wilbur Wright—aeronaut and pioneer of heavier-than-air aviation."

Bronze and granite marker unveiled on December 17, 1954, on Governors Island, N.Y., by Early Birds to commemorate historic flights to and from Governors Island, the first by Wilbur on September 29, 1909. A bronze propeller cast from a wooden one used by the Wrights in 1909 is mounted on one side of the monument.
