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Report Highlights:

The Indonesian poultry industry is staging a remarkable comeback after being severely shaken by the economic crisis which struck in mid 1997. FAS/Jakarta forecasts that MY01 poultry production will reach 800,000 mt with corresponding feed demand of 4.8 mmt. MY00 poultry production is estimated at 734,000 mt, up 18 percent from MY99 production which was 622,430 mt. Imports are also up significantly, to 20,000 mt in MY01 following an increase of 124 percent in MY00 to 10,000 mt. FAS/Jakarta forecast egg production for MY01 at 11.0 billion pieces and imports at 500 mt.

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I. SITUATION AND OUTLOOK

POULTRY MEAT

Production

After experiencing a major set back during the crisis, which bottomed out in 1998, the poultry industry has shown faster than anticipated recovery. Assuming economic and political stability, Post forecasts that poultry meat production will reach 800,000 mt in MY01. This is still below pre crisis level of 890,000 mt. Reflecting increased production of Day Old Chicks (DOC), the forecast for broiler meat production in MY00 is 734,000 mt, which is 56 percent of the total national meat supply, 1.3 mmt. The production in MY00 increased a remarkable 18 percent from MY99 (622,430 mt). Of that total of poultry meat produced, 47 percent was broiler meat, 46 percent was indigenous chicken meat, followed by spent layer meat 4 percent and 3 percent duck meat. Seventy percent of poultry production is carried out through contract or partnership and 30 percent by independent farmers.

Large poultry integrators (own poultry farms and feed production facility) such as Charoen Phokpand, Japfa, Anwar Sierad, Cimanggis, Cipendawa, Wonokoyo and Cibadak, are among the few survivors of the crisis. To the victors go the spoils : more than 80 percent of the poultry market. Whereas, many small farms have closed or are still struggling to rebuild their capital to return to the business.

Naturally, the recovery of the poultry industry has a strong effect on the growth of the feed mill industry. Eighty percent of the cost of production in the poultry industry is from feed and about 40 percent of the feed ingredients are imported. Therefore, feed millers are still greatly affected by fluctuations in the dollar - rupiah exchange rate, which continues to move erratically. For example in 2000, the exchange rate has ranged from Rp 7,400 to Rp 9200 / US \$ 1.

Based on reports from the industry, post forecasts feed production will reach up to 6 mmt in MY01 surpassing the precrisis level of about 4.8 mmt in 1997. This is still only 50 percent of the total national capacity of the industry which is 10 mmt. Thus leaving plenty of room for continued growth. Post estimates that Indonesia's feed consumption for MY00 will be 4.2 mmt, up 15 percent from last year, or 3.6 mmt.

DOC production has also shown great improvement this year after a major shortage of DOCs in 1999 both in layer and broiler DOC terms. With respect to broilers, production for MY00 is estimated to increase by about 50 percent compared to MY99 production, to approximately 15 million head/week. That brings DOC - broiler production up to 70 percent of the pre-crisis level (22 million head/week). Based on current trends and reports from the industry, Post forecasts that MY01 production of DOC- broilers will be 20 million head/week.

It is estimated that 700,000 birds/day are slaughtered. Out of that, only about 20 percent go to slaughter houses and the rest go directly to the wet market. The average weight of live birds to be slaughtered is relatively low at between 1.3 to 1.5 kg. There are limited numbers of chicken slaughtering and processing facilities, whether medium or large scale. Only about 14 slaughter houses exist and these modern chicken slaughter houses are usually located far from the center of distribution. Their products tend to be marketed to supermarkets, restaurants and hotels, not yet to traditional

markets because they can not compete in price. In addition, there is still a preference among low to middle income Indonesians to purchase a live chicken for slaughter at the wet market.

Consumption

The MY01 forecast is 820,000 mt (or 3.8 kg/capita/year), based on expectation of economic growth. Expectations of moderate growth and evidence that poultry meat is being used as a substitute for beef lead Post to forecast poultry consumption of chicken meat in Indonesia at 741,000 mt (or 3.5 - 3.6 kg/capita/year) in MY00, notably higher than consumption during the crisis, 448,000 mt (or 2.2-2.4 kg/capita/year). For a city like Jakarta, in which more people have greater purchasing power, consumption is as much as 20 kg/capita/year. The growth of fast food outlets has encouraged a strong demand for chicken products.

Trade

The increasing demand for poultry meat, together with lower supply of local product and competitive prices of imported broiler meat have created an opportunity for chicken importers to enter the market. It is forecast that poultry imports for MY01 will increase dramatically to 20,000 mt, double MY00 imports. For MY00, importers report that more poultry meat will be imported, given that imports are more competitively priced than local poultry. Thus, if the currency is stable at Rp 8,000 / US\$ 1, Post forecasts MY00 imports of around 10,000 mt, with 90 percent chicken parts. Poultry imports for MY1999 reached 4,462 mt (691 mt whole birds and 3,771 mt chicken parts), 6 times MY98 imports, or 738 mt (541 mt whole birds and 197 tons chicken parts). Major suppliers included the United States (76%), Australia (8%) and Brazil (7%). The United States is the major importer country because of its high quality and competitive prices. Preliminary data indicate that during the first 3 months of MY00 (January-March) poultry meat imports have reached 1,400 mt (164 mt whole birds and 1,236 mt chicken parts), almost double that of the same period last year, or 722 mt.

Poultry exports are limited due to domestic use and relatively low production efficiency. In MY01, Post forecasts only 3,000 mt of exports, this is on par with MY00 exports of 2,859. About eighty percent of total exports went to Japan in the form of chicken parts.

Prices

Farm gate prices for live broilers reportedly dropped by 23 percent from Rp 7,565 (Jan 2000) to Rp 6,100 (Aug 00) at the Jakarta market. The retail prices at the traditional market in Jakarta for chicken meat also declined from Rp 12,525/kg (Jan 00) to Rp 10,800/kg (Aug 00) and at supermarkets in Jakarta from Rp 14,788/kg (Jan 00) to Rp 13,608/kg (July 00).

In December 1999, the price of poultry meat was about Rp 12,000-14,000/kg for local and about Rp 7,000 - 9,000/kg for imported product. However, the first week of August 2000 shows that local product is about Rp 9,000 - 10,000/kg for both local and imported products. It is anticipated that the local price will increase again in line with the increasing price of poultry feed if the Rupiah weakens.

DOC broiler prices are still very fragile. Prices fluctuate dramatically, for instance they bounced from Rp 3,000 to Rp 500 in the first quarter of 2000. Currently prices are hovering around Rp 2,000.

Policy

The import tax on poultry meat remains at 5 percent. According to the Ministry of Agriculture's Directorate General (DG) for Livestock, import approval from the DG is no longer required. As of November 1999, general importers are allowed to import poultry and its products. However they still must inform DG : the type of chicken imported, volume, original country, port and market destination and the code number of slaughtering house.

Although the Government of Indonesia (GOI) reports no change in import policy for the last ten years, there has been a noticeable increase in inspection of poultry imports for Halal certification in MY00. The Ministry of Agriculture's Directorate General (DG) for livestock recently announced the addition of one U.S. Islamic Center to the approved list. Currently from U.S centers are approved including: Islamic Food and Nutrition Council of America (IFANCA), Islamic Food Authority, Inc. USA, Islamic Center of Omaha, and International Institute of Islamic Thought c/q Marjac Abbatoir. The GOI also maintains control over the internal distribution of poultry away from traditional markets in an effort to protect domestic producers. Thus, imported poultry is only allowed to be distributed to the food industry (i.e. supermarkets), hotels or restaurants.

Since 1999, poultry farm companies are free to diversify and expand business. The poultry farming business was removed from the Negative Investment List (a list which limits or prohibits foreign investment) as the GOI and domestic investors lack the investment capital. This now opens the door for foreign investors to establish breeding farms or feedmills in West Java, East Java or Central Java. This could help local companies who want to integrate their businesses from upstream to downstream lines of business.

In a separate action, in July 2000, the GOI released a Presidential Decree (No 85/2000) that revoked a requirement on foreign poultry producers to export 65 percent of production. Now foreign companies can invest without any requirements on exports.

Investment

Recently, most local investors are not expanding their plants. They are reportedly waiting for the domestic political and economy situation to settle. The stability of the rupiah, in particular, is being watched very closely.

Poultry Eggs

Production

Poultry egg production is expected to increase dramatically in MY01. Post forecasts total production will reach 11.0 billion pieces (including indigenous eggs and layer eggs). This would bring production close to the pre-crisis level. It is estimated that egg production for MY00 is increasing to 9.0 billion, up 10 percent compared to the production in

MY99 of 7.9 billion eggs and 70 percent from MY98. The production of DOC layer for MY00 is estimated to reach 1.15 million/week, slightly higher than the previous year which was 1.10 million/week.

During the shortage of DOC in MY99, egg prices were very good and profitable for farmers. However, after the domestic stock was renewed, egg prices has dropped 30 percent, from Rp 7,500/kg (Jan 00) to Rp 5,300/kg.

The layer farming business is still not attractive for most farmers due to the slow turn over compared to broiler farms. The first semester of MY00 showed that the DOC layer price was relatively stable at Rp 4,500. However it went down gradually to Rp 2,500, due to the increased stock of layers. According to industry sources, layer farms will be facing heavy losses this year unless both breeding and layer farm scales down their operations for the rest of 2000.

Consumption

Post forecast egg consumption in Indonesia for MY01 will reach 11.0 billion pieces (or 52 pieces/capita/year) for MY01. This is slightly lower than the consumption before crisis in MY96, which was about 11.5 billion pieces (or 65 pieces/capita/year). Egg consumption for MY00 will reach 9.0 billion pieces (or 42 pieces/capita/year), 14 percent higher than the previous year of 7.9 billion pieces (or 38 pieces/capita/year). Compared to other animal protein sources, eggs are still the cheapest, although eggs are still more expensive than tofu and tempe as protein sources. Therefore, when the price of eggs drops and purchasing power improves, egg consumption will increase.

Trade

Egg imports are expected to decline in MY00 and MY01 after playing catch up in MY99. Imports for MY01 are forecast at 500 mt. Based on imports as of March 2000 of 209 mt, the MY00 estimate is 600 mt. This comes after steep imports of 2,709 mt of eggs in MY99, reportedly in an effort to speed up DOC production to meet growing demand for poultry. Of the total 2,709 mt of eggs, 62 percent is fresh eggs for hatching, 30 percent is fresh eggs not for hatching and 8 percent is processed eggs . That compares to egg imports of 240-350 mt in 1997-1998. Major suppliers in MY99 were the Netherlands with 50 percent market share (1,355 mt) and Malaysia with 20 percent (557 mt).
