## S. 2034 Copper Salmon Wilderness Act

As ordered reported by the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources on January 30, 2008

S. 2034 would designate 13,700 acres of land in the Siskiyou National Forest in Oregon as the Copper Salmon Wilderness. The bill also would designate certain segments of the north and south forks of the Elk River in Oregon as wild or scenic rivers.

Assuming the availability of appropriated funds, CBO estimates that discretionary costs would increase by less than \$1 million to implement the bill. The funds would be used to survey and mark the wilderness area as well as remove existing culverts and roads.

In addition, because a small portion of the affected area has had an environmental assessment completed, timber harvesting could occur in this area during the next 10 years under current law. Because the bill would designate the land as wilderness, some of that timber harvesting would not occur, leading to a loss of offsetting receipts. According to the Forest Service, any such activities would likely be done through the use of stewardship contracts, a program that allows the Forest Service to use proceeds from such sales, without appropriation, for various purposes. Thus, while the bill would lead to a small loss of offsetting receipts (less than \$500,000 over the 2009-2018 period), those losses would be offset by a corresponding reduction in direct spending. On balance, CBO estimates that enacting this legislation would have no net impact on direct spending and would not affect revenues.

S. 2034 contains no intergovernmental or private-sector mandates as defined in the Unfunded Mandates Reform Act and would not affect the budgets of state, local, or tribal governments.
