Local TV and radio stations, Channel 2 SEMO and K103 FM/960 KZIM interviewed staffers about the future of space transportation. Teachers visited the exhibit and were provided educational materials and special tours were provided for youth groups. Outside the

exhibit, students were able to walk through a scale model demonstration of the solar system called, "Walking from Pluto to Earth." The St. Louis stop had 2000 visitors, which included five schools. A special lecture titled, "Women Can Be Rocket Scientists, Too," was presented to 200 eighth grade (female) students. The Columbia stop focused on college students. The Kansas City stop hosted the most successful kickoff reception with 130 local business leaders and University management present and 19 media interviews supported. The Springfield stop hosted the highest attendance with 2600 people, including several VIPs present at the kickoff reception.

Staff from the <u>San Jose Mercury News</u> toured the exhibit and took pictures. Visitors of note included Ames employees and employees from the FAA, Raytheon, Lockheed Martin (Sunnyvale). Tuskeegee Airmen, the celebration's featured guests, and several students and teachers toured the exhibit more than once. At the chabot, approximately 2800

visitors toured the exhibit. Sixteen schools, two home school groups, one church group and 25 members of the Aventureros, a Mexican American youth group, toured. Visitors of note included members of the Society of Hispanic Professional Engineers, Silicon Valley Chapter; Chabot Challenger School instructors and members from the museum's Grants/Procurement office; and some consultants from Integraph. Chabot staff members commented that the Starship 2040 exhibit has been one of the most well received exhibits to visit the center. In Sacramento, we staffed a trade show display inside and the Starship 2040 trailer outside of the convention center for League of California Cities. We answered questions from the Sacramento Bee about the intent of the exhibit and it's relevance to the future of space transportation.
