"...The Anti-Spamming Act would amend 18 U.S.C. Sec. 1030 [] to address fraudulent unsolicited electronic mail. It would add to the substantive conduct prohibited by 18 U.S.C. Sec. 1030(a), both the intentional and unauthorized sending of unsolicited e-mail that is known by the sender to contain

information that falsely identifies the source or routing information of the e-maill, and the intentional sale or distribution of any computer program designed to conceal the source or routing information of such e-mail. This legislation would subject those who commit such prohibited conduct to a criminal fine [] In addition, prohibited conduct that results in damage to a 'protected computer' (as defined in 18 U.S.C. Sec. 1030(e)(2)) would be punishable by a fine under Title 18 or by imprisonment for up to one year..."
