The descendants of John A. Weisse and Jane L. Hunt are: Fanenil Dunkin Weisse, M.D., born August 27th, 1842; and Eugenia Bethune Weisse, born Dec. 6th, 1843.

## PERSONAL APPEARANCE OF THE HUNTS.

The Hunts have been blonds; very fair; pink color in the face; large blue eyes; brown, curling, soft hair; Grecian profile, nose never highly Roman or aquiline. Rather large, handsome mouth. In person they have been full sized and tall; the men measuring six feet, the women five feet four, or about that. Their figure decidedly English. There are some fine specimens of them in the Dixwell family.

William Hunt, of Watertown, born 1750, was a true Hunt in appearance, and a very handsome man. His son, George Bethune Hunt, was considered the handsomest man in Cambridge when he graduated there in 1810. William Prescot, the historian, was thought to resemble him. Charles Hunt, who died 1805, was of the same type of great personal beauty.

There are few now living that look like Hunts; they rather resemble the Fessendens. Ruth Fessenden, Mrs. John Hunt, of Watertown, born 1717, died 1800, was a remarkably beautiful woman; she looked like an Italian; very dark eyes, rather near together; arched eyebrows; very white complexion; perfectly oval face; delicate Grecian nose; small mouth; beautiful teeth, and a round, graceful figure, with pretty feet and hands. This type of beauty has passed down through the descendants of Col. Thomas Hunt, who resembled his mother. The three children of William Hunt, of Watertown, and Jane Bethune, who leave descendants, resemble their mother's family, there is nothing of the blue-eyed blond among them.
